PREPARATION	
exchange application process	I experienced the application process as easy. The International Office provides you with enough information and sends you the required documents that need to be filled in, so actually all the tools you need are handed over to you. It's up to yourself how fast you start "dealing" with these documents and thus start thinking about how you want to give shape to your period abroad.
counselling & support at Utrecht University	The International Office answers super fast and I did everything online. I've never been to the IO in person.
academic preparation	I didn't prepare much. I already knew from the beginning that I wanted to follow courses taught in English only. This made it easier to choose/pick courses, because there weren't that much left. Still there were enough nice anthropological courses left and you were also able to follow courses outside of the bachelor's programme as well as follow anthropological master courses. To create your own schedule and to decide which courses you want to follow and which not, takes time. The University of Vienna doesn't provide you with a schedule, you need to create your own and avoid overlap. Still, I found it quite fun because you, as I said, are free to choose whatever you want!
language preparation	I did not do any language preparation. I only followed courses that were taught in English. Also, a lot of people from abroad who did choose some courses taught in German, changed them. It's often quite difficult to understand everything word for word.
finances	My parents supported me with a small amount of money every month and I got the Erasmus Grant as well as the money from my OV. It didn't took a lot of preparation, you just need to fill in the documents, get the signatures and hand it in on time!

STUDY ABROAD PERIOD	
study programme (content and organisational issues)	One thing I didn't know before starting my exchange is that it was also able to follow a different bachelor than at your home university. However, looking back to the anthropology courses I followed in Vienna, I wouldn't have wanted to follow different ones. I actually really enjoyed all of my courses, also the ones from the Master



of Anthropology as well as the ones outside of the bachelor programme of Anthropology (e.g. STS, English Studies). The lectures are different than in the Netherlands in the sense that here I always was in some kind of "workgroup setting", with 12 or 20 persons attending the course. But I actually liked these small groups and didn't miss the lectures given in big halls as I know them from the Netherlands.

academic quality of education activities

The level of English was very good and the courses weren't too difficult. Still, the courses were challenging (in a positive way) and provided me with new insights, tools and skills.

counselling & support at receiving university abroad

The teachers are very willing to help, as well as the IO and the Department of Anthropology. The University of Vienna and its IO have a very useful internet website on which they acquire you with a lot of useful information for during your period abroad.

transfer of credits

I still have to hand in a paper in March even though I'm already back. So it will take a while before I will receive every grade. However, if I understand correctly, my grades will appear on some kind of Blackboard site (only then a different one from the University of Vienna of course), and from there I can download the document and send it to the University of Utrecht.

STUDENT LIFE

welcome & orientation programme

There was one orientation day, but that only was one hour. They introduced the school system and the possibilities of student networks and organizations (ESN), as well as organizational stuff. It was really helpful! I signed up at the ESN and EBN and those organizations provided further welcome activities (speed friending, hiking tours, welcome dinner etc.) and tours around the city and university, via which I met a lot of nice other internationals.

accommodation

I got my room via WIHAST. It was recommended on the webpage of the University of Vienna. I shared the kitchen with 5 others and the bathroom with one other girl. Internationals and locals were mixed, which was nice. It was comfortable and cheap (only 319 a month). It was close to the U-bahn (metro) which I really recommend as well!

leisure & culture

Vienna is very central in Europe so I traveled a lot in the weekends to other cities. Also, ESN and EBN organize a lot of nice activities where you can meet new people very easily and get to know the city as well. A lot of people think Vienna is the city of Opera and Classical Ballet etc. However, this is just one part of Vienna. There is a really creative, youthfull scene in Vienna as well, with a lot of partying (techno) and beautiful art and nature parcs!

suggestions/tips

Buy beer in the supermarket, because in the club a beer could cost 5 euros very quickly. You also have to pay entrance in clubs (around 10 euros). But for the rest I don't really experienced Vienna as being a super expensive city. The prices are comparable to Dutch ones. I just think that during your exchange you eat more in restaurants, do more cultural stuff like visitng museums or nearby cities, in comparison with your live in the NL. But Vienna is not like live in Prague or Budapest, where live is waaay more cheapier than in the NL.

CONCLUSIONS

would you recommend this university/destination abroad to others? please explain



YES! I didn't know anything about Vienna before I got there. It's a great and beautiful city with a lot of nice bars. At first I was scared, because I know Austria only from wintersport, and it was my first trip on my own. PREPARATION	
exchange application process	I orientated on destinations for an exchange, Vienna was my first choice so I wrote a motivational letter why I'd love to study there. I also made a studyplan, a financial plan and a plan how to prepare for the German language.
counselling & support at Utrecht University	I thought it was really nice to have a pre-departure meeting from IO UU. Here I met two girls who were also going to Vienna. We exchanged phone numbers and helped each other with all the preparations we had to make. Also the International Office responded really quick to the mails with questions we sent them, that was nice too.
academic preparation	I am a Psychology student and was going to follow subjects from Sociology. In my studyplan I choose some introduction courses, therefore I did not prepared much on academical level.
language preparation	I prepared the German language by playing a lot of Duo-Lingo. That was good for my knowledge of words but



you don't really study the grammar with that app. In Vienna I choose to do a language course. Before you start with that, you have to make a placement test. I guess when I'd studied the grammar a bit more I could be placed in a higher level. In the end it was quite sad: I was placed in a A2/2 group (not super bad) but you can only bring the course in when you followed a course in the B level.

finances

I worked during the summer holidays and applied for the Erasmus+ grant. I also made a deal with my parents when I'd have financial troubles they were going to lend me money. After my exchange I'll be working fulltime for half a year so then I could eventually start paying them the money back I eventually lent from them.

STUDY ABROAD PERIOD

study programme (content and organisational issues)

At first I thought there were a lot of courses to follow, but you have to make sure you read the course description very carefully. A lot of the courses were given in German and I must admit that I really underestimated the difficulties that'd bring. Normal German is quite okay for me, but academic German about a subject (sociology) I didn't know a lot about was really hard for me. Just your high school German is not automatically enough to follow the courses smoothly.

academic quality of education activities

I actually only took Voorlesungen (lectures) and didn't do any working group courses. The lectures were okay, but because of the language difficulties I sometimes didn't understand it all.

counselling & support at receiving university abroad

The International Office from Vienna was really helpful with all the questions. Also the mobility coordinator (the responsible person from your faculty) from sociology was very nice. Both parties organised a welcome meeting and from sociology I also signed up for a buddy programme. They linked me to an Austrian girl who also studied sociology in Vienna. She also helped me a lot with signing up for exams for example.

transfer of credits

When all my grades are in the moodle-system (some kind of blackboard), I can ask the International Office from Vienna if they could print it, sign & stamp it, scan it and then send to my IO in Utrecht. I have to ask them myself but they are really helpful so that wouldn't be a problem.

STUDENT LIFE

welcome & orientation programme

We had to sign up for a meeting (in september/begin of october) where we'd get a welcome word, our student card and some information. The IO also organised a welcome meeting, but it was in November so a bit late. The ESN (Erasmus Student Network) organised a welcome week for all the exchange students. During this week there were all kinds of activities to get to know each other, the city and the university better.

accommodation

I found my accommodation via housinganywhere, I had a flat with two other french girls. It was a nice flat with very spacious rooms. I was happy with the apartment. Some friends of me rented a room in a dorm, which was also really funny. I prefer to rent a 'normal' room in a flat and pay a bit more but I also understand it's something fun to have done for four months.

leisure & culture

The university has a sports centre, but the registrations for the lessons they give already open in September (Winter Semester)/february (Summer), so a lot of the courses were full already. Still I signed up for Jazzdance and for Hip-hop dance. It was not expensive and funny to do these courses. The teachers taught in German, but mostly I understood it all. After all the Kaiserschmarrn & Apfelstrudels I also committed to a gym and went



there two times a week.
 About the culture: there are a lot of thing to do in Vienna. Sometimes the ESN organises something nice, but mostly we organised it ourselves with my friends. If you don't have any inspiration there is this website (in English) which can help you: www.viennawurstelstand.com

suggestions/tips

If you have the time, you can start with an intensive german course in september / february. I didn't do it because I didn't had the time, but one of my friends did. They had German course every morning and in the afternoon the language centre organised a lot of fun activities!

exchange application process

I saved a lot of money plus the Erasmus grant

study programme (content and organisational issues)
In september I could apply for courses. They change every year so you can't look into the courses prior to september. Keep in mind that sometimes they can reject you for the course, so I would recommend that you sign up for as many courses possible, also from other studies (for example sociology). I found out that some courses were very vague and didn't want to do them, but if you sign up for many courses then you can choose which ones you would like to attend.
academic quality of education activities
The level of education in Vienna is pretty good. All courses are very differently organised from each other, so you have to figure out what they expect from you with every course. Some are very clear, some are not so.
counselling & support at receiving university abroad
The people from my uni were always helpful and if you werent sure about something you could always contact them and make an appointment.
transfer of credits

welcome & orientation programme
The ESN network is pretty big and active in Vienna so it was very easy to get in touch with fellow exchange students this was really nice. Not only ESN from Uni Vie, but also organisations from other universities in Vienna were very active and you could attend all activities from all organisations (ESN TU Wien, EBN WU). ESN organized 2 welcome weeks (september and october) for new students where they had an activity every day for a week. after that still a few things a week that was nice to meet people. I would suggest, just go to all the activities the first week and you will meet a lot of people and after that you can just hang out with them.
accommodation
I stayed in OEAD housing Molkereistrasse. The location of this dorm was perfect: close to the U2 metro which brings you to the University really fast. There were a lot of students in this dorm and mostly internationals. It is a nice place to stay and I would definetly recommend this accomodation.
leisure & culture



Vienna has a lot to offer, culturewise. Many museums and nice buildings and you won't get bored easily. there is always something to do here, culture and other leisure activities. Vienna is also very centrally located, so many weekend trip opportunities (Budapest, Bratislava, Prague, Salzburg, Skiing, etc.). Also clublife in Vienna is good, many different genres (Techno, house, disco, psytrance, drum n bass), but also many nice Erasmus parties and ofcourse Travelshack is nice to meet people and do karaoke etc.

suggestions/tips

If you like pool, The Lizard pub & billiards is a nice Irish bar where you can play pool and it's not expensive. Best club for techno: Grelle Forelle. Best cocktails (6 euros): Bar Mon Ami. Best for a Tuesday night: Travelshack. Best for beers: Beerstreet.

CONCLUSIONS

would you recommend this university/destination abroad to others? please explain

exchange application process

counselling & support at Utrecht University

I got enough support and I always had the possibility to come by the International Office with questions about the process. Besides that you could also easily make contact by email or telephone; they answered always really quick.

academic preparation

I did not really have any academic preparation.



language preparation
I followed an intensive German course in September in Vienna, one month before the start of the winter semester.
finances
I had my student loan, the Erasmus Grant, some savings myself and every month I received money from my parents. In my opinion this should be enough, but be prepared that it will cost you a lot of money since you'll probably make a lot more weekend trips than usual, do a lot more of sightseeing, lunches, going out for dinner and partying.

STUDY ABROAD PERIOD
study programme (content and organisational issues)
Sociology; I had to choose at least 15 ECTS within my own field of study (sociology) and the rest of the courses I could choose myself. The program to register yourself for courses and exams is easy to understand, but I would definitely recommend to choose courses in English instead of German. If your level of German is high enough, than ofcourse you can try to follow courses in German, but for me it was too difficult since the German accent in Austria is hard to understand.
academic quality of education activities
In general the quality can be compared with the academic quality of Utrecht University. Although I think it is a bit easier to receive an higher grade in Vienna than in Utrecht.
counselling & support at receiving university abroad
They were really welcoming and helped me during the semester with all my questions.
transfer of credits
I do not know this yet, since I still have to hand in some essays with a deadline in March, so I do not have all my grades back.

STUDENT LIFE
welcome & orientation programme
ESN (Erasmus Student Network) offered a welcome week in the beginning of September (and in October in case you did not follow a German course) with a lot of different kind of activities. I went to this week and after that I had met so many new people that we just started planning our own trips and activities. So definitely go there this first week to meet a lot of new people!
accommodation
First I stayed in an apartment which I found on Housing Anywhere with two other girls. After three months I moved to another accomodation, which was a room in a student dorm which I find via Oead.
leisure & culture
There are enough things to do and see in Vienna! From seeing all the beautiful culture, like museums, palaces, churches, to drinking beer in bars and pubs in the Bermuda Triangle and dancing and clubbing in the biggest clubs.
suggestions/tips
The best thing to do for finding a room is to register yourself at Oead. They offer accomodations for internationals in whole Vienna and after registering it is not that hard to find a room for a normal price.

PREPARATION

exchange application process

The exchange application process consisted out of a lot of documents, which had to be completed. I experienced it as a lot of organisation work and much to think about. However, the content was clear and the International Office provided a clear overview what to complete, before which date etc.

counselling & support at Utrecht University

The International Office helped me a lot with answering questions, getting stamps and providing a clear overview what to do, which step had to be followed. They were always available and replied quite fast.

academic preparation

My academic preparation was good to study at the university of Vienna. I could follow the courses really good. Sometimes I even felt like being a bit a head of my peer students, because I for example already had learned about a certain author or researcher.

language preparation

The main language in Vienna is german. I did the final exam of german (B1) in high school in the Netherlands, this was enough to study at the unversity of Vienna. To feel more confident and to have a little recap of german, I decided to take part of language course in september. It was a intensive language course of three weeks and it helped me to recall what I had learned in school. Especially with the grammars it was nice to repeat and practice. I finished the exam of B2/2.

finances

I do not have a really big budget and the grant of the Erasmus programme was not enough. Directly at the beginning of my stay in Vienna I looked for a job. It was quite easy to find something and already in the mid of september I could start with working in a cafe. I worked two days in the week beside my studies. Due to this I could finance myself much more easily.

STUDY ABROAD PERIOD



study programme (content and organisational issues)
At the beginning I was really confused because the university of Vienna provide a lot of small courses. This means that I had to take six or seven courses in one semester. As we ar having in Utrecht normally only two courses at the same time, I was quite a bit overwhelmed to focus on six courses at the same time. Furthermore, I had a few problems with my signing up for exams. In Vienna you have to sign up for the course and also for the exam. Somehow I missed this information and I did not sign up for my examns. With two exams it was no problem and I could still take the exam. Unfortunately, one exam I could not write because I was not on the list with names. They did not let me take part of the exam.
academic quality of education activities
The academic quality was not for all the courses on the same level. Some courses were in my opinion not so good or motivating. Only about a few courses I am content. The lectures are during in general 90 minutes without a break and I think that is quite exhausting. The quality of the course was really teacher depended. With some lectures I could not keep my attention, due to the language (German or even Austrian dialect, which was harder to understand) or the presentation of the teacher - for example to much text on the powerpoint. Most often I could not concentrated myself 90 minutes long without any break.
counselling & support at receiving university abroad
I did not got a lot in contact with my receiving university. I've been only twice at International Office, more was not necessary. Some really useful support I got from my buddy. I was linked to local student and he helped me especially in the beginning with signing up for courses, showing me where I could print or helped me with my questions.
transfer of credits
I am still in process of transferring my credits. I have to get two more marks, before I can transfer my credits. In my opinion the deadline of 1st of July for handing in my grades at university Utrecht is really unrealistic. Just three days before the deadline I still wrote exams and I have to hand in two more essays.

welcome & orientation programme	As I already stated before I was linked to a local student. My buddy welcomed me in Vienna and showed me a bit around, that was a really nice start. Furthemore, I was one month earlier in Vienna because of the language course. It was nice to have some time to explore the city and find a job before the semester started.
accommodation	I found quite easily a room via www.wg-gesucht.de . I skyped with my future flatmates and they chose me. The appartement was in the 16th district, a bit further away from the city centre but I could still reach everything easliy, because the public transport in the Vienna is really good and I bought directly a bike to transport myself. I had the room only for 6 months because the owner of the room was also staying abroad for those months. When I decided to extend my stay, I had to move to another place. Via friends I found another room in the 2nd district. I really like the 2nd district and everything is more close now.
leisure & culture	There is a lot to do in the Vienna. I joined every week a soccer game with friends of the university, I joined a painting course on Saturdays and I joined the choir of a colleage of my. Furthermore, there are a lot of musea, really cosy coffee places and nice clubs to explore and go on adventure. Also the nature in and around the city are really nice to explore. You could for example go for a swim in the Danube or hiking on the Kahlenberg and drink some self-made Viennese wine.
suggestions/tips	To get to know more people I think it is really helpful to participate in activities outside the lectures. For example joining a sport team, singing in a choir or something similar.

PREPARATION

exchange application process
The application process was some work, but in the end it's not that complicated as long as you make sure to really follow all the instructions. Just do your research and make sure that where you want to go is really where you want to go, because once you've made a decision it's pretty final. (And trust me, you don't want to go through the whole process again/mess something up and not be able to go.) Hand things in on time, be precise, and remember that it's all actually gonna be worth it.
counselling & support at Utrecht University
Utrecht university provides very clear instructions, and if you have any questions, just message the international office. The workers there are super helpful and normally respond within 2 days.
academic preparation
I didn't do much academic preparation, I didn't have to order any books, just had to figure out how to sign up for courses.
language preparation
If you're gonna study KSA like me, be prepared that almost all, if not all of your courses will in fact be in German! I did vwo German, which was fine, but looking back i think it would have been good for me to at least watch some German movies beforehand, just to get a feel for it again.
finances
I had my grant and saved up a little, but mostly my parents supported me a little. This was needed, otherwise i



would have had to borrow money for sure. Vienna is expensive. You'll probably end up spending more money than you intended to, but it's all up to you.

STUDY ABROAD PERIOD

study programme (content and organisational issues)

There are a LOT of courses to choose from and it's all very confusing at the beginning (actually still kind of is). So if you can't figure out on your own, you're not the only one and it's ok to ask for help. Also, be prepared to take a lot of courses compared to the Austrian students. I had 9, which people found crazy. The average is 4-6. Most of them will be in German, some will be (way) better organized than others. 9 courses is also a lot of work, especially for me seeing German isn't my first language. It gets easier over time, but be prepared. Also, sometimes I had 5/6 hour long seminars, which is very long and was kind of annoying at times. Still, my weeks weren't that packed though, just had to do a lot of studying at the end. Austrian students can choose to make their exams at different points throughout the year, but as an international I all had to do them in June, which was a lot of work in my last couple weeks.

Now on a more positive note, I did enjoy my courses! there is a lot to choose from which is actually also kinda nice (it's just a bit of a puzzle figuring out which ones to do/fit together.) Professors in most cases really do want to help you, you can always write your exams and papers in English, and although the lectures are quite different from the ones at UU, they're still (mostly) fun.

academic quality of education activities

I would say the level of the courses is definitely lower, as in, it's easier to pass. For me what made them difficult was the fact that they were all in German, which really was a challenge sometimes.

counselling & support at receiving university abroad

Uni Wien's KSA department gave me a buddy, which was really the best thing ever, because she explained so much to me. They also responded to emails pretty quick, and were very helpful overall.

transfer of credits

Has yet to be done.

STUDENT LIFE

welcome & orientation programme

Doesn't really exist, as in, the uni only provides an orientation session, which doesn't include everything. ESN uni wien does offer a lot of activities though.

accommodation

You can either live in a WG or studentenwohnheim. I chose the section option, and rented a place through OEAD in the 9th districts. Rent is about as much as in Utrecht, and I would say it's a little easier to arrange housing as well than it is here, but still to save yourself stress look into it on time.

leisure & culture

Vienna is so so so beautiful! It's a city of culture, with theaters, operas, art, rich history, many museums. It's truly such an amazing place, and I completely fell in love with it. The city really has everything, I always found something new to see and explore, and in addition to that it's really clean and safe as well.

suggestions/tips

- Sign up for super cheap sport courses at USI
- If you study KSA you'll have classes at the NIG, which is in the 9th district, so if you want to live close to uni, that's where you should go (or the 2nd, 1st, just do some research)
- Get a semester ticket for public transport cause it'll be much cheaper



-Keep up with all the fees you gotta pay in Austria and everything you gotta hand in for your grant

CONCLUSIONS

would you recommend this university/destination abroad to others? please explain

For sure! I had the most amazing time, completely fell in love with the city and its people, and am even considering going back there for my masters!

do you have any additional advice or comments?

Make sure your German's good enough, don't underestimate it, because academic german literature isn't that easy. I really like that because of all my German courses my German has greatly improved though! If you go do your erasmus, regardless, remember that you're doing this for you. You're not gonna make 200 friends and have the time of your life within a week (well maybe you will) but just remember that it takes time, and in the end you'll see you'll have made so many meaningful memories and connections. I am so glad I went to Vienna, and wouldn't trade/change my experience for the world.

exchange application process

exchange application process	The process went very well and quick. The University of Utrecht and Vienna responded quickly on my emails and signed all the documents on time.

STUDY ABROAD PERIOD

study programme (content and organisational issues)	The university of Vienna offers a wide range of courses. The only problem I had was that there were only a few courses in my study field (Sociology) in English, and my German is not that good, so in the end I also had to take some courses from other faculties. This takes some time and some courses also have limited places, so it is possible that you're placed on the waiting list. So my advice is to take your time for choosing your courses, because it takes some time to figure it all out! At the end I ended up with some courses that I didn't find that interesting (but they were in English so that was why I choose them) so I recommend you to also take a look at some German courses because in this way it offers you a lot more to choose from + you get a chance to improve your German!
academic quality of education activities	The academic quality of the courses was good! But comparing to the courses and education at the Utrecht



University it wasn't that hard I would say.
counselling & support at receiving university abroad
The University of Vienna offers great support, especially the International Office there. They were always friendly and prepared to help you with any questions or problems!
transfer of credits
They have another system of grading in Austria. They have a system from 1 to 5. I don't have my grades back yet so I don't know how they will be transferred. The ECTS from the University of Vienna however was transferred into the same ECTS at the University of Utrecht, so that was nice.

welcome & orientation programme
The welcome programme was really good in Vienna. ESN and EBN are student networks who organise a lot of events for exchange students, especially in the first week of the semester. In this way you meet a lot of new people, so I highly recommend you to join a lot of events from ESN/EBN in the first week! It is a great & easy opportunity to meet new people and get to know Vienna!
accommodation
During my semester abroad I stayed at a big student dorm from WIHAST. The location was a bit out of the city centre, but there live many other students, and the dorm is quite cheap for Vienna. I would have preferred to stay more in the city centre and in a smaller house, but I started my search for an accomodation too late. I advice you too start your search for an accomadation in Vienna on time, you have a lot more options than! It depends on what you are searching for of course, there are many options: dorms, student houses, particular houses etc. Most of my friends rented a room from another student for a couple of months, and most of them had a really nice room on a good location, so I recommend you to search for something like that on 'WGgesucht.de' for example. But the public transport is really good in Vienna so if you live a little further from the city centre it is also not a problem (in the weekend the Metro network goes on the entire night).
leisure & culture
Vienna is really beautiful and has an amazing culture, there is so much to do! For example in the winter around christmas time, they have christmas markets everywhere, and you can go ice skating on several places. I really liked the ambiance in Vienna. Vienna offers everything you can search for in a city: restaurants, bars, lot of places to go out, musea, parks etc. ESN and EBN also organise a lot of activities and trips during the semester. PREPARATION

exchange application process

I experienced the application process as intense: the deadline came quick, you needed to hand in a lot of documents and there were many choices you needed to make. It put a lot of pressure on me to combine the application with studying and working. After I got my final destination I thought most of the work was done. This was although not the case and there was a lot of work to do to get documents signed, find a place to live and preparing my departure. After all, this was all totally worth it since it made me able to study abroad.

counselling & support at Utrecht University

The counselling in the application process was okay I would say. The people in the International Office were always very willing to help, but could not always give the right information. Because of this I needed to find a 3th destination on the day of the application deadline, this was very stressfull. After this application period the International Office did a wonderfull job and answered their e-mails always very quick and signed document wihtin a couple of days.

academic preparation

I did not do much academic preparation before I left. I knew I would have courses within Social Sciences and in English, therefore I did not feel the urge to prepare myself any further.

language preparation

Since I knew I would only take courses in English, I did not do any language preparation. I knew my english level was good enough to fulfill studying abroad.

finances

I spend as much money I expected to do on beforehand. Living in Vienna costed around €450-€500 a month. My incomes were: I saved €1000, got €200 a month from my parents, €280 a month from the government and an erasmus scholarship. The living costs in Vienna were a bit higher than in the Netherlands; doing groceries was quiet expensive. Besides your regular costs I spended my money on sportingclasses, going out for dinner and making trips around Europe. Sporting classes were very cheap at the USI (sport accomodation of the university), I paid €26 for an entire semester to have 1 lesson a week. The nightlife in Vienna is pretty expensive; for most clubs you pay €10 entrance (although this is mostly worth it). Going out for dinner is cheap compared to the Netherlands. Travelling around Europe is cheap from Vienna; a lot of nice cities are close and traveling is easy and cheap.

STUDY ABROAD PERIOD

study programme (content and organisational issues)



Because I was nominated by the field of sociology, the university of Vienna made me do at least 15 ECTS in sociology courses. I was not very happy with that because I was totally unfamiliar with sociology and find my own studyfield of child psychology the most interesting. To get 30 ECTS in 1 semester I needed to take 7 courses; 4 of sociology department, 2 of the linguistic department and 1 of the educational sciences department. After all I really enjoyed all the courses of linguistics and educational sciences and was very unhappy with my sociology courses. The sociology courses were difficult, uninteresting and took a lot of effort. Although I heard from the other students they did like these classes. The organisation in Vienna was well organized; I was easy to apply for courses, all the department coordinators were helpful and all the teachers very pleased to welcome erasmus students.

academic quality of education activities

The quality of the education was good; the teachers knew a lot about their topic and were very friendly. The amount of studywork was okay and there was enough time to enjoy the city. The only thing that was very different compared to the Netherlands was, how much information there was provided by the teachers of the course about the requierments in the course. With every course it did not became clear what the exact assignment was and/or what needs to be studied for the exam. Although the teachers were very helpful, they were sometimes unclear and let you quiet on your own in assignments. Luckily everything mostly worked out in the end.

counselling & support at receiving university abroad

The counselling and support of the University in Vienna was okay. They were mostly helpful but there were a lot of unnecesairy rules you needed to follow as a student. For example when I wanted to get my learning agreement signed, I needed to go to 4 different people to get my signature. They were also quiet strict about the rules and always answered their email extremly slow. In some occasions this was very annoying but I managed to fulfill all the requierments.

transfer of credits

I do not know how my credits will be transferred and how my grades gets translated to the Dutch university system. I find it unfair they are not open about this from the beginning. Thereby are most of my courses graded as being a level 1 course which I would now state as very untrue. The courses graded as level 1 were extremely difficult were my courses graded at level 2 were easy. I understand it is difficult for the examination committee to decide this from the Netherlands, but now I feel like my credits are not worth what they should be.

STUDENT LIFE

welcome & orientation programme

The welcoming programme of the university was a welcome word where they provided all the information you needed during your stay. This was very helpful and you could start with all the actions you needed to do, right away. I was happy after all I choose to have this welcome programme 2 days after my arrival, so I had enough time to fulfill al the actions needed to be done. Thereby organized the ESN community a entire welcome week with a lot of activities and oppportunities to meet new people.

accommodation

I started looking for my accommodation in the end of june when on the housing site wg-gesucht.de a lot of temporary appartments came online. I was very very happy with my apartment since it was very modern, it contained a big livingroom, everything was clean and it was in the 8th district. I lived together with 2 austrian boys which was very nice too. Any new students going to Vienna I would recommened to also look for privat housingsites in stead of big dormitries because they were never very nice I have seen and heard.

leisure & culture

The culture in Vienna is amazing; the architecture everywere was so beautiful and there plenty of cultural activities to do like visiting the opera of a museum. Thereby is the erasmus community in Vienna really big; a lot of erasmus students are coming every semester and they organizing activities almost every day. Thereby is the



nightlife amazing and can you have a lot of fun. This was super nice because you could enjoy your erasmus life to the fullest. I totally did not expect this before my departure since this image of Vienna is quiet boring I would say; but this city is not definetly my favorite city of all times.

suggestions/tips

- Do not live in a dormitry and find your place to stay on time.
- Join the erasmus community ESN.
- Make a lot of trips around Europe, the location of Vienna is great and Prage, Budapest and the mountains are close.
- If you are into sporting; look for sporting classes at the USI. They organize classes in every sport you can imagine of.
- Pay a lot of attention to the unversity website and the UU website to be on time with all your documents so you do not get into trouble.
