**PREPARATION**

exchange application process

The exchange application process is pretty straight forward if you just follow the steps given by both Universities (UU & UiT). UiT has a very clear site with all the information, and you can always contact one of the exchange coordinators with questions. It's a lot of paperwork, but not difficult.

counselling & support at Utrecht University

I was already sure I wanted to go to Norway, but if you're not sure, go to all the activities and the lecture about studying abroad. There are plenty of opportunities to ask questions and delve into multiple exchange options.

Utrecht has a good organised exchange office. Whenever you have a question or need anything signed, go an see them in person, they will solve it really quick and send you anything you need afterwards on the mail.

academic preparation

My academic preparation was all about planning and finishing courses in Utrecht so I could leave for half a year. For my exchange University in Norway I didn't do any academic preparation, but I had opted for courses that continued on courses I followed in Utrecht, or Bachelor courses at introductory level, so I knew that wouldn't be a problem.

language preparation

I started learning Norwegian a few months before departure. Especially for Dutch (/German) students, the language is pretty easy and fun to learn. It's nice to have a headstart with grammar and vocabulary, because actually speaking and pronouncing the language is the hard part.

finances

I made sure I had some extra savings for Norway. The country is really expensive. You will make it with your grant and some savings, but if you wish to do some extra activities and/or weekendtrips like me, you don't want to be held back by money. So save enough if you plan to go to Scandinavia.

**STUDY ABROAD PERIOD**

study programme (content and organisational issues)



I did three totally different courses: MA Psychology, BA Archeology, BA History. Getting in was pretty easy, just look for English courses, follow the steps and make sure you qualify. UiT has pretty clear course descriptions, but make sure you check if there are new courses added after arrival in Norway. I discovered not all courses could be found on the site, and you can still decide to switch to one of these if they are more interesting.
academic quality of education activities
The three courses, each 10 ECTS, were of totally different levels. The master course ended up being the easiest to pass, while I had to do much more reading and writing for the two bachelor courses. Also because writing an historical essay is totally different than any academic writing I had done before. The academic quality in Norway is high, but because these are all courses in English, the teachers and their English makes a huge difference in the levels.
counselling & support at receiving university abroad
In Tromsø they have a great counsellingcenter where you can go with all your problems. You can count on all help you need. But whenever you have a problem with the courses itself, or paperwork for the exchange, don't e-mail the coordinators after arrival. It takes way too long. Best thing to do is look for their office online and go to see them in person. Don't be afraid to ask colleagues, everyone is happy to help.

<b>STUDENT LIFE</b>	
welcome & orientation programme	Tromsø has a great orientation programme. It's easy to meet everyone from your own country, but make sure you blend in with others aswell. There is also an orientation programme for Norwegian students, you're encouraged to take part of this aswell, but the level of exchange students in this programme is pretty low and the main language Norwegian, so it can be hard if you haven't made a start with your language lessons.
accommodation	Make sure you apply for housing early, especially if you're older than 23, the organisation Samskipnaden assigns you a studenthousing. I lived at Åsgårdvegen, which was really nice, but the flat is pretty old and I would have preferred a bit more cozy housing. Ørndalen seemed great, and I have also been in nice rooms at Prestvannet and Dramsvegen.
leisure & culture	You have to love outdoorlife and prefer quite surroundings. There are a lot of activities organised every week. It's easy to make friends and easy to experience Norwegian culture.
suggestions/tips	Do as much as you can in the orientationweek, so you meet a lot of people. Make sure you are not only staying in the safe zone with people from your own country. Especially the Norwegians need a bit more time to warm up to you, but it's worth it ;) Join a sport or club for the dark days. The winter is really duable, but keep yourself busy!

<b>CONCLUSIONS</b>	
would you recommend this university/destination abroad to others? please explain	I would definitely recommend Tromsø and UiT to other students. You have a lot of time to experience another country and the outdoorlife. It's beautiful everywhere, has a coze atmosphere and you will definitely see and experience things you haven't before. The University offers a lot of courses, in my opinion easier than Dutch



University courses, but that differs depending on the teacher. There is great counselling and everyweek there are free activities. So you never have to feel lonely or bored.

do you have any additional advice or comments?

Tromsø is great, but wherever you want to go, go.

**PREPARATION**

exchange application process	The application process was okay, it requires quite a lot of documents but if you have a clear overview of what you should hand in and when, it should be fine.
counselling & support at Utrecht University	I don't think I can give feedback on this subject as I have not really used these services, but I asked a few questions during the application process and the International Office always helped me. The predeparture meeting was also a good preparation.
academic preparation	There was no academic preparation needed for my studies abroad.
language preparation	There was no language preparation needed for my studies abroad. Given that you study at a university and have taken English classes, I think that you're prepared already.
finances	I was prepared because I knew Norway was a very expensive country, and when signing up for housing I could estimate what I needed to pay monthly. The Erasmus scholarship was very helpful financially.

**STUDY ABROAD PERIOD**

study programme (content and organisational issues)	Psychology. I took the classes Attitudes (a masters-level psychology course), Arctic Norway and the Barents region (a history course), and Arctic Rock Art (a archeology course). Organisationally, everything was okay. You get clear instruction as to where you should sign up for your classes and exams. However, some classes that I wanted to take were not available for the semester, but upon arrival I heard that you could sign up for those classes after all. So, if you have seen classes from previous years that you can't find for your specific semester I would recommend to inform with the international office of Tromsø University.
academic quality of education activities	I found that the academic quality was on the low side. I have completed a bachelors in Psychology, and studying abroad was a addition to that degree. The masters class in Psychology that I took was very very basic. The other



classes were also basic-level, but that was okay to me since I was new to both history and archeology.
counselling & support at receiving university abroad
Upon arrival you get a very thorough explanation of what you should do (for example, go to the police to inform them you're studying and living in Norway, or how to set up your university accounts). There is a international office-counsellor that seemed very nice and she sent us weekly announcements that contained the events that were happening in Tromsø for that week. I found that very helpful and fun. I think she also mentioned that international students could contact her for counselling when needed, and that international students generally had a higher priority because they were far from home and might just need someone to talk to. Even though I did not make use of that myself, I found it very accommodating and nice.
transfer of credits
Not yet received; but I already know that you have to e-mail the international office yourself as they do not send you a Transcript of Records automatically.

<b>STUDENT LIFE</b>	
welcome & orientation programme	As mentioned before, the first few days you get all sorts of instructions in an extensive program. There is catering for a few days, they are also very accommodating to dietary restrictions (vegan, vegetarian, gluten-free etc).
accommodation	The accommodation is okay, the prices are similar to Utrecht housing prices. I stayed at the Elverhøy student home, and I did not really know others that lived there. Even though it was fine, I would not necessarily recommend this place. It can get a bit lonely having only one roommate/flatmate, and I found the bus connections to be not very good. But overall I did not have any complaints. For some houses you have to buy things like cutlery, pans etc. yourself, but in some houses it is already there.
leisure & culture	There is not much of a culture shock, aside from the fact that most people seem to exercise a lot more. But you can easily catch up in a few weeks by hiking the beautiful mountains ;). Tromsø is not a big partying city, and alcohol is very expensive. It's more common to pre-party at home. There are some fun activities in the centre that the counsellor will kindly inform you of!
suggestions/tips	Join a sports team via Kraft and TSI! Also, try to plan a lot of hikes before it starts snowing (or after the snow melts) because of avalanche danger. And it's good to think about your budget beforehand, as grocery shopping is very expensive.

<b>CONCLUSIONS</b>	
would you recommend this university/destination abroad to others? please explain	Yes, I would recommend this university and destination to others. Tromsø and northern Norway are beautiful places, and it was so nice to be able to live there for a few months. The university was very accommodating and really made sure that international students had a good time.

**PREPARATION**

exchange application process

I really had my mind set on going to Tromsø, so I could start the application early on. On the site of UU it is really easy to find all the steps you have to take to apply and the documents you have to fill out. Just make sure that you start well ahead of the deadline, so you don't end up waiting for a signature of somebody and miss it. Tromsø was not so fast with giving me a signature and the right information. Carefully read every email you get from both universities to not miss any information about the process.

counselling & support at Utrecht University

The International Office is really helpful and can tell you a lot about the steps you need to take. When I emailed a question or asked for a signature I got an answer most times within an hour. For me it was the easiest to email, but you can also go the office on campus.

academic preparation

There was no academic preparation required.

language preparation

All the classes you will take will be in English, so there is no language requirement before you leave. However, if you are interested in learning the Norwegian language the university in Tromsø offers free Norwegian classes that you can take next to your normal classes. It will be two hours twice a week, I had a lot of fun and it was nice to learn some Norwegian to use when going to stores etc.

finances

Tromsø, or Norway is really expensive, but you will get used to it. It took me a while to get used to the prices, because even vegetables are insanely expensive. However, I saved enough money and never had a money problem. If you look for the best discounts and try to eat together with roommates it can be okay.

**STUDY ABROAD PERIOD**

study programme (content and organisational issues)

On the site of Tromsø University it will be a little hard to find out what classes you can take for the next semester, because sometimes there are classes mentioned that will actually not be given that semester or the other way around. It is however really easy to change your classes in the beginning of the semester when you arrive. I took three courses: Attitudes (Psychology), History of the Barents Region (History) and Arctic Rock Art (Archaeology) and the last one was my favorite. All the classes where really easy and were given only once a



week for two hours. Attitudes was actually a Masters course, but we talked about stuff I already had in our first year in Utrecht. I would recommend to choose some courses that you don't know a lot about already, because chances are that you will be bored. I think you can even have four courses, but I liked to have a lot of free time so I could explore the area.
academic quality of education activities
As I mentioned, the quality of the courses was not that high. Nevertheless I really enjoyed my courses in History and Archaeology, because they taught me a lot about the area and the culture of northern Norway.
counselling & support at receiving university abroad
In Tromø they offer student counseling, especially for when the polar nights come and people are starting to get tired and a little depressed sometimes. They also send an email every week with the activities going on in the city that are cheap or for free, this was very nice and I went to a lot of those activities.
transfer of credits
My credits are not yet transferred.

**STUDENT LIFE**

welcome & orientation programme
The first week of the semester there are a lot of things organized for the new students to get used to the university. A tour around campus, around town and many presentations about stuff that is good to know about. It is not always super interesting but it is a good way to meet new people and get to know the university!
accommodation
In Tromsø they have very good student housing. When you think you want to go to this university, apply for student housing, the earlier the better! Samskipnaden has many locations in and around Tromsø. I stayed in Orndalen and I had an amazing time! It is a bit further from the centre, but only 10 minutes by bus to the University and it is a real student community. There are some parties and waffle nights organized and the houses mostly have a nice view and are clean, with not too many people (6 per house). Other houses like Asgardveien or Breivika have 15-20 students and are a bit cheaper, but I have not heard too many good stories about the people living there.
leisure & culture
Tromsø city centre is not the most exciting city I have ever known, but the outdoor activities are countless! In summer I was hiking almost twice every week and could go on a lot of trips to cabins. In winter you can go skiing if there is enough snow and from november whale watching is very big! If you love the outdoors, Tromsø is really the place to be, but if you are a city-person this might not be the place for you.
suggestions/tips
Try to do as many things as possible in summer, when the roads are still easy to drive on. You can rent cars for a cheaper price via GoMore and explore the surroundings. If you like to go on trips, you should become a member of DNT, an association that lets you use cabins for only 10€ a night. It is very nice to go on a hike with your friends, arrive at the cabin, light a fire and have a cosy evening meal in a beautiful place!

**CONCLUSIONS**

would you recommend this university/destination abroad to others? please explain
Yes, absolutely! I really liked Tromsø because of the beautiful nature and many places that you can go to. I had lovely roommates and going here was really a wonderful experience. It was really different from Utrecht, so if you are up for a challenge and ready to get out of your comfort zone, this is the place to go!



do you have any additional advice or comments?

Try to join as many activities as you can, you will likely only be here once! I joined the student volleyball team (there are many more students sports) and went on some tournaments all over the country. It was really fun and a good way to interact with Norwegian students as well.

exchange application process	<p>First I had to write an application letter to my first choice university. To decide to which university I wanted, I looked at other UU reports and checked the websites of different universities to look which courses they offered. After this I wrote the letter and sent my top 3. In the end I could not go to one of the universities of my top 3. The International Office offered me the university of Tromsø and I agreed.</p>
counselling & support at Utrecht University	<p>The presentation about studying abroad was really clear, and it motivated me to go studying abroad. After this I attended the UU site a lot, to look which steps I had to follow before I could go on exchange. This website was also really clear. I also went some times to the UU international office desk to ask questions or I wrote an e-mail, which were always answered.</p>
academic preparation	<p>I had to switch my study program. Because I do neuropsychology, the only option to study abroad was in the second semester. In the first semester there was a mandatory course I had to follow in Utrecht. In the end it turned out that the semesters in Tromsø and Utrecht overlapped. This is the reason why I have study delay of one year.</p>
language preparation	<p>I did not have to do a lot of language preparation. In Norway they speak really good English. At the university there were also a lot of courses given in English. The only thing I had to do was an English test before departure and after departure so that Erasmus could see if my English was approved during my stay abroad or not.</p>
finances	



With the finances, I got the Erasmus Grant, but Norway is a very expensive land so this could not cover all the costs I would make. For this reason, a year before I studied abroad, I got a job and saved a lot of money.

### STUDY ABROAD PERIOD

study programme (content and organisational issues)

The courses I followed were really different than the courses I follow in my psychology study. I studied English Literature, Norwegian History and a Peace, Education and Development course. I choose to do this, because I wanted to widen my horizon. There we not a lot of organisational issues, I had to switch two courses when I arrived in Tromsø, but you could do that easily at the university. You had a month to decide if you wanted to change the course or keep the course.

academic quality of education activities

I think the Norwegian school system is really good organized. Everything is really clear, for instance you know exactly what you have to do and who you can ask question if you do not understand something. There were classes of only 10 to 20 people, which made it very personal.

counselling & support at receiving university abroad

I think the receiving university was really nice. I felt really welcome to study there. They offered also a lot of courses in English, even a Norwegian history course, which gave to my the indication that they really want that international students come to study there.

transfer of credits

The courses I followed were 10 ETCS or 5 ETCS courses. The 10 ETCS courses were big courses where you had to write an assignment and had to participate in an end examination. The course of 5 ETCS was a two week course, where you had a lecture everyday and in the end you had to write a take home exam. The exams were of 6 hours, which gave you enough time to finish it.

### STUDENT LIFE

welcome & orientation programme

The first tree days, there was an orientation programm. Where they gave you a lot of information about the university, about the student housing and living in Tromsø. During this orientation programm, you also had a lot of time to meet all the other international students. During the introduction week, also a lot of trips were planned where you could participate, for intance a trip to Sommarøy, a cross country ski trip and a trip to Jekta (a big shopping center).

accommodation

Before I left I already had a room, because the unversity told you how to get a room/which organization offered rooms to students. The student housing organization was at the airport by arrival, there they gave you the keys and told you which bus you had to take to get to your student housing.

leisure & culture

What I learned about the Norwegian culture and people is, that the people are very polite and friendly, but they never start a personal conversation with an international student. A really nice day was the 17<sup>th</sup> of May, which was the Norwegian National Day. All the people where wearing the national clothes and ate breakfast with champagne. About free time, you had to lot of free time. You only had to go two or 2 times a week to University. We also had easter holiday.

suggestions/tips

I would say, that studying at Tromsø university is really nice. The workload of the university is not that high, so you have a lot of time to discover the surrounding area. Also the island Tromsø is not so big, so you could easily



go from north to south and the other way around.

## CONCLUSIONS

would you recommend this university/destination abroad to others? please explain

I would really recommend you to study in Tromsø, if you like nature. It is not that far away from the Netherlands, but it felt like it. This is because it is situated in the arctic circle, you have the polar nights, the midnight sun, the northern lights and a lot of snow (if you go the second semester). If you want to study abroad and party a lot, than Tromsø might not be the place to go.

do you have any additional advice or comments?

I will give as an advice, that there is a difference if you decide to study at Tromsø the first or the second semester. If you go the first semester you will have less snow, which gave more opportunities to hike in the mountains and there is no midnight sun. If you go the second semester you have a lot of snow, which gave you opportunities to ski a lot and you will have the midnight sun and the polar nights.

<p>exchange application process</p>	<p>There is a lot of paperwork to go through, and it is important to keep check what you have to hand in when. I made a separate folder in my computer with the paperwork (both past and what I still needed to hand in). Sometimes the paperwork is a bit depressing, but the work is definitely worth the experience!</p>
<p>counselling &amp; support at Utrecht University</p>	<p>The international office answered any questions and my study counsellor helped me choose and prepare as well. It was very nice to have this back-up if you faced any troubles. The responses were very quick.</p>
<p>academic preparation</p>	<p>I did not need a lot of academic preparation before my stay. I think it's important that you are used to university life, it will make the transition to a foreign university easier.</p>
<p>language preparation</p>	<p>You get quite far with your high school English and your English improves a lot during your stay. I think it's nice to be used to English literature and classes before you go. But don't let your level of English scare you off. Remember that there are people from many countries going on exchange. The Dutch are generally regarded as very good in English. Even if your level of English is closer to Dungleish... You will still be better than some other exchange students, and they too make it through their stay.</p>
<p>finances</p>	<p>I looked critically at what I spend here in the Netherlands and what costs differ in Norway. I saved a little, but I didn't spend that much more than I would in Utrecht. The groceries were more expensive, but you buy less snacks and don't go out for movies or dinner. So I think I balanced it quite nicely.</p>

study programme (content and organisational issues)	I had 2 psychology courses and 1 history course. It's build up very much like in Utrecht. The courses were very interesting and the level of English was very good.
academic quality of education activities	The quality of the education is very much like in The Netherlands. It's just more laidback. I believe that we tend to focus on efficiency a lot in our country, and in Norway they don't care that much about cramming as much as possible in the time given. So it was very nice to study and live there. If you're used to the Dutch standard, it also meant that there is some time to do 'holiday activities'. On exchange your as much as a students as a tourist. The combination worked very well in Norway.
counselling & support at receiving university abroad	The counselling centre was great! I struggled with the darkness quite a lot and they helped me out very nicely. They also sent a weekly email with all the activities that we could go to. This was very nice, it saved you a lot of detecting on facebook... The ladies at the counselling centre were very warm and made you feel right at home. They helped you in any way they could to make sure that all students have the time of their lives!
transfer of credits	My credits aren't transferred yet, but I don't see any troubles ahead in it.

<b>STUDENT LIFE</b>	
welcome & orientation programme	The university in Tromsø is very good at making the students at home and helped you in any way they can. Even before arrival they were always there to answer any questions. They also organised welcoming days at the airport so you could pick up the keys to your new house right next to the bagage belt. It saves you a trip down their office. I met a lot of people during the orientation week with who I spend a lot of time during the rest of my stay. I still wonder sometimes how we got to know each other so well, I think it's partly due to the university. Part of it is probably because of the very open attitude everybody has; we are all new and everybody wants to get to know people.
accommodation	My room was very nice. I lived in Asgardveien with 3 Norwegian and 1 French girl. It was nice to have this mix. You can apply through Samskipnaden, make sure you are in time, because there is not enough space for all students. The university arranged temporary housing for those without a home. 2 weeks after our arrival everybody had a place to stay. The university guides you quite well I believe. There are different types of housing. In a dorm like me, or apartments. Whatever you prefer. If you come with your partner or with a child, the university makes sure you have housing fit for you.
leisure & culture	Norway is a beautiful country. I highly recommend walking in the mountains and travelling around. I went reindeer sledding as well, which was high on my bucket list. Other people went to do a whale safari. Apart from that there are plenty of things to do on the island itself (plenty of shopping opportunities as well). And Tromsø has many museums which are free or discounted for students. There is a cinema and many restaurants and bars to spend all your savings ;) The Norwegians are very kind and always ready to help or explain things. Apart from that, they are very good in English! I had a 8 year old ask me which bus he had to take, and after realising my Norwegian was pretty horrible, he managed to converse with me in English.
suggestions/tips	



I know it can be quite daunting to go so far up North with the darkness and the cold. But it's definitely worth it! I'm not much of a winter person (sometimes I wonder why on earth I went to Tromsø..), but even I survived and had the time of my life! Everybody is in the same situation, the Norwegians take vitamin pills and fish oil just like the internationals. It's a remarkable experience and really cool to look back on. And the weather isn't that cold. It's all very doable. But bring thermopants and -shirts... And when it gets darker, it also means that it gets more likely for you to spot the Northern Lights. And that is a truly amazing and unforgettable experience! They are gorgeous!

If you like chocolate btw, make sure to bring some.. We all know that alcohol is very expensive in Norway, but the government has a tax on sugar as well.. So chocolate is insanely pricy. I found, however, that electronics are the same price and sometimes even cheaper!

You can also download the apps 'TooGoodToGO' and 'Mattilbud'. The first also works in The Netherlands and gets you food from bakeries and restaurants at a discounted price. The latter is an app with all the offers of the different shops. Keep track of the offers and you'll save a lot of money!

**CONCLUSIONS**

would you recommend this university/destination abroad to others? please explain

I definitely recommend going to Tromsø. It's nature and climate are very unique and provide excellent oppurtinities to widen your horizon. The university also is very popular with students from all over the world, so you'll definitely meet people from other cultures. do you have any additional advice or comments?

I understand that it is a very big step to travel to Tromsø, I was quite nervous about it and wanted to pull out last minute at some times.. I'm glad I didn't. Going abroad is a wonderful opportunity to let yourself grow and do amazing things. It's scary sometimes, and yes, sometimes you're just lost in the supermarket, trying to find the ingredients for your favourite dish. But this is all part of it. So please don't be held back by any of these insecurities, don't let the climate frighten you and just go out and explore! And don't forget to pack your hiking shoes ;)

exchange application process

You had to choose your top 3 of destinations, hand in a motivationmail and a financial plan. I mailed the International Office a lot, because I wanted to be sure about everything. They were always really supportive and helped me through all my problems. They also replied fast. I called them and 30 minutes later I had the signatures I needed.

I had some problems with organizing my studyprogramme, since there were no psychology courses for my semester on the website of UIT. In the end, after a lot of emails, there turned out to be three psychology courses after all. I took only one of them: The psychology of prejudice and stereotyping, because the other two had too much overlap with some of my previous courses. The other courses that I chose were English subjects: Language acquisition and Introduction to English word and sentence structure. Even though I expected to do all or at least two psychology courses, I was happy with the English ones as well.

academic quality of education activities

I think the academic quality was quite good. However, most of my courses were a little easier than in the Netherlands and there is less workload. Most of my lectures were in quite small groups and there was a lot of interaction, which was useful and nice.

exchange application process

The exchange application process took some time but I got a lot of guidance and it was easy to just fill in all the different forms. The grant application was delayed but the university gave enough information to not be uncertain about that. A lot of information was given to really know what you had to do and when.

counselling & support at Utrecht University

The support from Utrecht University was really good because they answered all of my questions quickly. They sent me all the information I needed and they arranged meetings to talk about the things I had to do before I left. They also gave the opportunity to get in touch with others who had been to the same university or to meet people who would go to the same university.

academic preparation

I did not prepare in a specific way before going to Norway. I expected my academic level to be high enough without doing more.

language preparation

Before I went to Norway I tried to study a bit Norwegian but not that much. I do not think it is really necessary to do because the Norwegian people have a good level in English. In Norway I took Norwegian lessons and it was helpful to have a basic level of Norwegian. Understanding Norwegian was really easy because it was so similar to Dutch. I would recommend looking into some Norwegian before going so you can have small conversations in Norwegian. I really liked that.

finances

Before going to Norway a lot of people warned me that everything would be really expensive. I did not prepare financially in a specific way. Organizing the study programme was really easy and they informed me really well when I had to change one subject. I could pick any subject I was interested in and I could even do a master level course. The content of the different psychology courses was pretty similar to each other. The master level course was really good and I think I would definitely recommend taking master level courses. My English phonology and phonetics course was really good and the content was really interesting. Although I took 4 courses (instead of the recommended 3 courses) I found out in the beginning that I got bored really quickly. Because of that I contacted my professors to ask for an internship and after a week I got an internship as a research assistant for the psychology department. So even being in Norway you can still change the study programme easily.
academic quality of education activities
The academic quality was okay but I think it was really easy compared to the Netherlands. The master level course was of higher academic quality than the other courses and was similar to the level of the Dutch courses. Especially the normal psychology courses were really easy and the seminars were of low quality. The English phonology and phonetics course was better arranged and of higher quality but maybe this is also influenced by the fact that I never studied English phonology and phonetics.
counselling & support at receiving university abroad
The counselling at the university was really good. There were a lot of activities to get to know the culture and to deal with the differences in the amount of daylight. You could always send an email and they would respond really quickly. I experienced the counselling and support as really good.
