#### **PREPARATION**

#### exchange application process

The process of my exchange went quite smoothly. The deadlines of administration are however quite soon, so be in time. I was still a bit in doubt about the destinations, but you can give three options. Writing the motivation letter was doable and when I got accepted to Bergen, the university was clear what I had to do.

# counselling & support at Utrecht University

Utrecht University was very supportive. After I was accepted to Bergen I was doubting again about the destination. I shared my concerns with UU and they helped me very well. They offered me other destinations which were still available and gave me numbers/mails of other students who were also going to Bergen and who have been there a previous semester.

### academic preparation

I already had three years of university education, including writing a bachelor thesis. I didn't do anything extra for preparation. For me, that was enough, because if you have the academic skills you will be able to take the courses I took. The courses I took were also not that important for me because I already had all my courses for my bachelor.

# language preparation

All the courses I wanted to follow were in English, so I didn't prepare anything. You can follow a Norwegian language course which is nice to do. I regret that I didn't do it because Norwegian is actually quite similar to Dutch.

# finances

Norway is quite an expensive country so I would advise to save some money before going on exchange. I was writing my bachelor thesis in the time before my exchange, so I worked as much as I could next to it but it wasn't enough. While I was in Norway I applied for a job and worked in a restaurant. This gave me some rest to enjoy my time in Norway more, because you earn also a lot of money. Make sure that if you want a job you start early with applying and seachring for jibs. It helps to look at companies where a lot of English speaking people work. I worked at Daily Pot which was a really nice restaurant. When working in Norway you need a Dnumber if you're living there for less than 6 months and you need a Norwegian bank account. It's a bit of work to arrange all this, but it is definitaley worth it if you want a job and some extra money.

# **STUDY ABROAD PERIOD**

#### study programme (content and organisational issues)

I followed only psychology courses because those were also the ones I found most interesting. It was super nice, I got a lot of help from UiB also with explaing which courses there were. There were also some courses with teachers from South Africa, which I found really interesting. If you want to follow the Norwegian language course, you have to apply earlier so be careful!

# academic quality of education activities

The quality of the courses were quite the same as in Utrecht. It is easy to follow and I found them very interesting. The seminars and workgroups were quite interesting.

# counselling & support at receiving university abroad

UiB responds quick to your e-mails. They had few information meetings for exchange students as well and all important information is in English on the website. They really take care of international students.

#### transfer of credits

The difference between UU and UiB is the grading. They give grades from A to F, where F is a fail. This transfer of credits is easy because the University of Bergen also uses the ECTS system, so your credits will easily be transferred. You get a pass or fail in osiris.

### welcome & orientation programme

In the first week there was a meeting of the UiB with information about the university but also Bergen and the city itsself. They offer a lot and also ISN and ESN organise a lot of things for international students. Especially in the first weeks. So think of speed friending, pub quized, a tour to the city centre etc.

#### accommodation

Bergen has a company quite similar to SHH called Sammen, which is for student housing. I lived at the campus Fantoft in Bergen. This is the biggest campus Sammen has and where most of the international students live. I found out about this by student experiences. It is a bit further away to the city centre but there is a tram (Bybanen) that goes directly to the airport and to the city centre. I really liked living there because you can make connections with fellow students easily. I lived in a shared flat with 13 people and I also shared my room. I choose this type of housing because it was with a lot of people and the cheapest options. Living with a roommate was a bit unusual for me but you get used to it very easily. And it was super fun actually! I had a good relationship with my roommate but also with the rest of my flatmates. We did a lot of fun activities together.

#### leisure & culture

Norwegian culture is a bit different than in the Netherlands. The culture is a very focused on a sportive lifestyle. So you see a lot of people going on hikes, going to the gym, ski and just sport everywhere. You also notice this with the prices for example alcohol, this is very expensive and especially in the clubs. However Bergen is a student city and there are a lot of clubs and bars to go out. Just to remind you that the clubs close a bit sooner than here in the Netherlands. My favorite bars/clubs were Kulturhuset, Rick's and Duggfrisk. At first I wasn't that big of a fan of hiking, not weird because we live in a flat country. But to my surprise I actually liked it a lot! You have so many beautiful views and 7 mountains in Bergen. Go up Floyen or Ulriken to see an amazing sunset. I would also advise to make some roadtrips in Norway and do even more cool hikes as Preikestolen or Trolltunga.

#### suggestions/tips

Get an account at BUA there you can rent a lot of things as, ski/hiking/fishing equipment for a cheap price or even for free. Also nice to have an HYRE or Get Around account if you want to make some road trips. These cars

are cheaper than RentalCars. There is a big price difference in supermarkets. The cheapest supermarkets are KIWI and Rema. You also have an app which shows you all the discounts of the supermarkets of that week. For skiing you can go to Voss or Eikedalen. If you are planning to ski a lot you can get a semester card which is worth it if you go often. For public transport you should download the app Skyss where you can buy a semester ticket. You can select difference zones. If you want to go to the gym, Sammen had some different gym's in the city but also a big one at Fantoft. You can also but a semester ticket here.

# **CONCLUSIONS**

would you recommend this university/destination abroad to others? please explain

I would definitely recommend this destination to others. At first I was a bit in doubt because of maybe the rain, the prices, cold. But it was so worth it! It didn't even rain that much and if you keep an eye on your money you can have an amazing time aswell. Bergen is so special because you have the experience of living in the city but are also so close to nature with the 7 mountains and the amazing harbour and see. You can make a lot of trips with your friends there to for example Tromso and see the Northern Lights, or do a city trip through Scandinavia.

do you have any additional advice or comments?

Make the best out of your time there because one semester is actually quite short! And especially enjoy, you're gonna make so much friends from all over the world which is a really cool experience:)

# **PREPARATION**

#### exchange application process

The application process went well. Make sure you keep a close eye on the information on the UU site and the UiB (Universitet i Bergen) and make an overview for yourself with to do's and deadlines, because it is easy to lose track. Furthermore, keep a close eye on your e-mail! If you keep this overview, you will be fine, especially compared to the other exchange destinations, UiB is very good at fast communication and clear digital platforms.

#### counselling & support at Utrecht University

UU maintained good communication and guidance during my application process. The Faculty of Social Sciences had quick and personal guidance and I knew exactly which email address to go to for all my questions and signatures!

# academic preparation

Because I was just going to take subjects in my free space in Norway, I did not have to do any academic preparation for this. I myself still needed 22.5 ect for my bachelor and that was also exactly the minimum for an Erasmus scholarship through UU! In addition, I must say that I was very happy to be already done with my bachelor thesis before my exchange, as many friends had to combine the first months in Norway with finishing their thesis, what causes a lot of stress and decreases the fun you have and people you meet! While the first month is the most important for this! Besides, it was nice that I didn't have to begin my thesis after the exchange, as you are often inspired to start with something new, for example a master, or to travel afterwards.

### language preparation

There wasn't any language preparation nessesary, as all the classes were givin in English. Nevertheless, I did prepare by doing some duolingo in Norwegian, to know the basics of the Norwegian language. Furthermore, I did like the fact that I had already taken some courses in English beforehand, as this meant I had already practised with English essays and was therefore not thrown into the deep end on exchange. In many courses the theory was eximinded via an open-ended exam or even a type where you had to write 2 small essays in 4 hours without a translation programme.

### finances

Living in Norway is as expensive as everyone says. This mainly concerns groceries and alcohol, as rent is arranged through Sammen, where they offer rooms from 300 to 700 euros, depending on the type of room. In besides, Norwegians support healthy things like winter sports and camping, so you can rent this for almost nothing!

#### study programme (content and organisational issues)

There were many courses available in my social sciences faculty, even though I ended up choosing almost only psychology courses, as they perceive something different as social subjects apparently (more society and economics-oriented). Furthermore, the courses were divided into open and closed courses (which required a certain knowledge, but often not strict in the end) and also varied a lot in ects quantity. In the end, I liked the closed courses best, but for those you had to register on time in the Netherlands, so pay attention to that! However you could also ask to be admitted later, and communication with the psychology faculty there was good! Otherwise, the open courses are always available. I would also highly recommend the intro Norwegian language course, it's nice to be able to talk in Norwegian and you learn it very easily as a Dutch person compared to other foreign students.

#### academic quality of education activities

I find the quality of education very good. I often had guest lecturers from all over the world who shared their knowledge. Besides, I got the idea that the level was compared or sometimes a bit easier than in the nederlands, but that could also be the specific exchange courses there. In addition, we sometimes took a course for exchange students, where we were given the same lectures but different assignments and exam than the Norwegians who were also taking the course. I also had one master subject, but it was no more difficult than the bachelor subjects in my opinion.

# counselling & support at receiving university abroad

The support service was very helpful and fast at the social sciences faculty, both physical and per mail.

#### transfer of credits

I didn't receive all of my marks yet, but I predict no difficulties with this. Alle the marks are showed in their own sort of blackboard, named MittUiB, which is very organised.

# **STUDENT LIFE**

#### welcome & orientation programme

The welcome programme was not that long or festive, as I began in the second semester probably. However, we had a nice day introduction with your main faculty (faculty in which you followed the most courses). In addition we had a online meeting from the university itself, which I watched with all my roommates! That was very complete and useful to follow, as they inform you about all the stuff you need to know when you are going to live in a new country, for example docter and dentist possibilities.

# accommodation

Accommodation was very nice in Bergen! This was one of the reasons I got to choose Bergen in the end, because it has guaranteed housing for an affordable price! You can apply for multiple types of rooms at the Sammen association, ranging from a 15 people shared flat for 300 euro's to studio's for yourself for around 600 I guess. I really recommend to go for the big shared flats, because those people are definitely gonna be your friends and in this way you are guaranteed to get good friends. I had some study friends who lived more near the city in a 4 people shared flat, but those where all Norwegian, so not very open to interact and become friends with temporary exchange students. I myself applied for the 15 people flat, but for a single room for 400 euro's, but just like a lot of students I got in a double room in the end. So I had to share a room with someone else. That was annoying, but less bad than I expected. The pro was that I only had to pay 300 euro's, and so I could do more trips!

# leisure & culture

I really recommend to join some community or group, as you get more, often even Norwegian friends! It's possible and easy to join a student association, work as a volunteer in a nice student bar! I joined the students

volleyball team. I joined a Norwegian team with 3 other internationals after doing selection training! That was really nice, because I got to understand the Norwegians better, their traditions and their culture. They are for example very open, especially if you make the first approach. Also because they are often a bit shy to talk English, although they are good in English from a very young age on compared to other countries!

suggestions/tips

Apply for a flat with many roommates as they are gonna be your best friends and join some student community as I said before!

# **CONCLUSIONS**

would you recommend this university/destination abroad to others? please explain

Yes! I think it is the perfect combinations of a lot of partying and nature! There is so much to see! I did a big variety of trips, Reindeer sleeing in Tromso, a skiing cabin trip to Voss, a citytrip through Oslo, Stockholm, Malmo, Copenhagen and Aarhus and a roadtrip to the Hardanger fjord! And all environments where so different but beautiful! I also liked to not be in a big capital city, because at first the housing is cheaper, and the student community is way more connected! Bergen is also nicer to live in than to visit as a tourist in my opinion, as it is such a nice experience to see the city from dirrent viewpoints from the mountains and to discover all the beautiful spots with beaches and lakes, which are easy to acces by metro and bus!

do you have any additional advice or comments?

I think that every exchange is going to be very nice in the end. It's more about the whole experience of studying abroad by yourself, making new friends and discovering places, which gives you a feeling of independence and self confidence! You are defenitely not gonna regret it:)

# **PREPARATION**

#### exchange application process

The University of Bergen is very well organised. They provide you with a clear overview of deadlines for the application. And if you have a question it is also very easy to contact them.

#### counselling & support at Utrecht University

The University of Utrecht gives you sufficient information regarding what you have to do for your application. It is also easy to contact them if you have any questions regarding the application.

#### academic preparation

No academic preparation is required. The education level is similar to the Netherlands. The pace of the courses is a bit slower I would say (maybe also depending on the courses you take), which gives you more time to do other things.

#### language preparation

No languege preparation is required. Everyone Norwegian in a big city speaks english very well. It is a very beautiful language though, so worth learning if you have the time:)

# finances

Norway is an expensive country but I expected it to be worse before I went there. Certain groceries are defenitely more expensive, like vegetables, bread, yoghurt, vegetarian meat. But other things are quite oke if you pick the cheap brands. So you have to be a little smart about this. Going out to a restaurant and drinking beer in a bar is really expensive, so if you really like that I would recommend another country. Sport and outdoor facilities on the other hand are quite affordable for students. There are a lot of student deals and discounts. Sammen offers a gym membership for about 120 euros for half a year which includes a few gyms, two small climbing halls, a swimming pool, and a lot of sport group lessons. There are also often student discounts in climbing halls. Then there is this organisation that 'rents out' skies and other outdoor equipment for free. Etc, etc...

study programme (content and organisational issues)

The University of Bergen has quite a long list of courses that are in english and open for exchange students. Not

so many of the social sciences courses sounded really interesting to me though. The formula of a lot of courses was quite 'old school' I would say. The courses often consisted of just lectures where the teacher speaks and no seminars where you discuss what you learn and interact with each other. I tried some of them since you can enroll and disenroll from courses very easily in the first weeks. But in the end I decided to take the full time norwegian language course. This was a very good decision for me. I had lessons four times a week for two hours in quite a small group of 20-25 students. There were a lot of small assignments during the class that required interaction with other students which made the learning really fun. The teacher was really nice and I learnt a lot from her.

#### academic quality of education activities

It is a bit difficult to compare the academic quality of Utrecht and Bergen, since the language course that I took is so different from my Anthropology courses in Utrecht. But I would say that it is quite similar, all though the courses in Bergen that just have lectures and no seminars miss some depth in my opinion.

### counselling & support at receiving university abroad

I felt very welcome at the university of Bergen. They are always very happy to help you with any question you have.

#### transfer of credits

My credits have not been transferred yet, but I do not expect that this will be difficult.

#### welcome & orientation programme

The welcome program in Bergen in spring semester is nothing special. It consisted of one general meeting online and one faculaty meeting at the university where they gave some practical information. Then there were 2/3 weeks of nothing where there were no courses yet and you mainly have to enterain yourself (which was not difficult in this beautiful country I would say). In the beginning of the semester there are some activities organised by the international student organisations (isn and esn Bergen), like quizzes, some parties, a city tour, barhopping, etc. Some of these activities are quite fun!

#### accommodation

What is really nice in Bergen is that if you get a place to study, their student housing organisation Sammen offers you a room. I got a room in a student house at Fantoft, which is a campus that is located a little bit outside the city. But you can reach the centre in 20 minuted by just taking the tram. I lived here with 11 other students and shared it with one other girl. When there are a lot of international students there is quite a big chance that you have to share a room. So if you do not like that you can also search for a private appartment, which also quite some people do, but which is a bit more expensive. I was really happy with my roommate and my other flatmates. We had a lot of fun together and did lots of activities together.

### leisure & culture

Norway is really a mekka for outdoor lovers. This was for me the main reason to go to Norway. By just walking out of the city, you are in the hills and can enjoy the beautiful nature. There are also quite some skiing slopes within 1-3 hour distance of Bergen that are really fun. When the weather is good you can go rock climbing at the fjords, just next to the city! Norway also has a lot of very beautiful mountain cabins that are not that expensive to stay for some nights if you become a member of the outdoor association (DNT). There is also a student organisation in Bergen called bsi ffiluft that organises nice skiing, hiking and climbing trips (but be aware that the trips are often full very quickly). You can reach a lot of nice places for hiking, skiing, climbing, etc. by just taking the train, tram or bus. Being able to do activities like this every week felt as such a privilege and really gave me a feeling of freedom!

# suggestions/tips



- BUA: organisation that 'rents out' skies, snowboards, and other outdoor materials like tents, sleeping bags, etc.
- Voss skiresort and Myrkdalen: both nice skiing areas (1,5-2 hours away) that offer season ski passes for around 200 euro for a whole season (november-april)
- Hike all the 7 mountains. Gullfjellet is also a very nice (higher) mountain in the area with an amazing view at the top.
- Sjøbad: an outdoor swimming pool (warm) with a sauna and the possibility to dive in the sea afterward;) Costs only around 8 auros.
- Vestveggen climbing hall: really really cool and big climbing hall. Every friday students can climb here for 5-6 euros!
- DNT: become a member and get discounts for their cabins and/or join their trips or courses (ski touring, cross country, hiking)
- Bsi friluft: try to get a spot on one or more of their trips. They have very cool trips (for example building an iglo together) and it is a nice chance to meet other students that are into outdoor activities.
- Take a language course at the university (Nor intro, Nor level 1 or Nor level 1+2). It is really fun to learn (a bit of) the language when you study in a country. All the international students are very enthusiastic about the language courses.

# **CONCLUSIONS**

would you recommend this university/destination abroad to others? please explain

I would defenitely recommend this destination. Especially if you are into outdoor activities like me. In my opinion it is really is a big chance to live in a country that does have such beautiful nature around! I really fell in love with this beautiful country during my stay and will defenitely come back.

do you have any additional advice or comments?

Take with you warm and water proof clothes. It can be really wet and windy here so it is not an option to avoid "bad" weather if you want to do thuff. As the Norwegians say: there is no bad weather, just bad clothes! I could also really recommend to go in the spring semester. Because then the days are getting longer and the weather is getting better, in stead of the other way around. Then you can also stay and travel more in Norway after the semester is over (around the beginning of june), since it is summer holiday then!

# **PREPARATION**

#### exchange application process

The application process at both UU and UiB went well. Via Osiris, at UU you'll see a clear list of steps to follow. Also, UiB provides a clear step-by-step plan on its website. Whenever you have a question, both international offices are happy to help, which makes it all very doable. Of course, a lot is different at both universities, which can cause a bit confusion sometimes, but I think that applies to every other university.

# counselling & support at Utrecht University

As I said in the previous question, the International Office is very happy to help. They respond quickly to your questions. Most of the time you can already find the answers yourself in the practical handbook they give you.

# academic preparation

Before I went to Bergen, I didn't really have academic preparation besides following three years of bachelor courses at UU. I think the level of education is approximately the same in Utrecht and Bergen.

# language preparation

Since I knew that I was going to study in Norway, I started Duolingo for Norwegian. I started this mostly because I really like learning new languages. I think it's not necessary to learn Norwegian before going there. It's just fun. :) With regard to English, I didn't have any language preparation.

#### finances

I think everyone knows that Norway is a really expensive country. I saved up some money and I also had a student loan and the Erasmus grant. With the total grant I could almost pay my rent for all months, which is really nice. Furthermore, at DUO you can also apply for a public transportation reimbursement. This amount of money can cover the costs for public transportation in Bergen. The rest of your expenses are mostly for daily life, such as groceries, and in my case traveling. You can make these as expensive as you want of course.

# STUDY ABROAD PERIOD

#### study programme (content and organisational issues)

I followed the Short Introductory Course in Norwegian Language (NOR-INTRO). I really liked this one, especially because we had an amazing teacher. Besides learning the language in a fun way, we also got to know the culture better. In this course, everything was well arranged. Furthermore, I followed Culture, Positive Development & Health, and Cognitive Neuroscience courses. Both courses are very intense. The courses are not

really long, but many lectures are given in a short time. An advantage of this was that I had plenty of time to travel between and after courses, but the disadvantage was the study load: doing a lot in a short period of time could be stressful. When it comes to course content: CPD&H was mostly social psychology, which is not really my thing. Cognitive neuroscience, on the other hand, I found very interesting! During this course, you learn a lot about neuroimaging techniques and neuropsychological domains such as memory and attention.

### academic quality of education activities

The academic quality of UiB is in my opinion comparable to that of UU. The type of assignments given corresponds to those at UU. Think of essays and presentations. With regard to the organization of some courses, some things could be improved. I am used to receiving a course manual at the start of the course. This was not the case here. For example, I could not find clearly which literature I had to read before a lecture. Also, for example, it was nowhere stated in advance when the deadlines were for assignments. This I didn't always find convenient.

What I also noticed is that the teachers speak very good English, which is super nice. In my opinion, contact with teachers is even more informal in Norway than in the Netherlands. I found this very nice, as the threshold is sometimes lower to ask something if you don't understand it. By the way, I think the small classes had an influence on this. This generally ensured more attention from the teacher.

### counselling & support at receiving university abroad

Whenever I had questions, I was helped well and quickly by the university staff. The university website also contains a lot of information for international students.

#### transfer of credits

This has not yet happened, but since UiB also works with ECTS, the credits can be transferred easily.

# welcome & orientation programme

The university provides a welcome program. There was an online introduction meeting of the faculty in which you get to know the university. In the autumn semester, they also have Fadderuken, a welcome week with many activities for every faculty. Unfortunately, my first course already began this week, meaning I didn't really have time to participate in activities. I heard it was unfortunate that most things were in Norwegian, which makes it more difficult for international students to participate. But overall I heard it was a really fun week!

#### accommodation

In Bergen, housing is guaranteed, which is amazing. You register at Sammen, the student welfare organization, and you can choose from a lot of different room possibilities. Most students live at Fantoft, a recently renovated sort of campus where you can also find a big gym, a supermarket and Club Fantoft where they organize activities for the students that are living there.

### leisure & culture

- If you want to get to know Norwegian culture, I would definitely recommend following a Norwegian language course at UiB. In this way, I learned some basic Norwegian and a lot about Bergen and Norwegian culture. A tip: if you want to register for this course you have to be fast since there are limited spaces.
- Bergen is surrounded by seven mountains. Whenever you have a day off there is a possibility to go hiking!

#### suggestions/tips

- A (pretty obvious) tip would be to bring good rain gear. As they say in Norway: Det finnes ikke dårlig vær, bare dårlige klær, which means: there is no bad weather, only bad clothing.
- I recommend buying a Wise Card (or any comparable card). With this card, you can add money to your account and pay in any currency that you'd like. I had an account for NOK. This way, you only pay transfer costs when transferring a big amount of money to your account. This card also kind of works as a credit card,

something you definitely need in Norway.

- Another tip would be to go and discover the country since it is so beautiful. If you don't want to spend a lot of money on trips, you can also hike and sleep in a cabin, there are a lot of them. Also, hiring a car is highly recommendable. Especially if you share it with your friends, it's a great and kind of cheap way to discover places around Bergen such as Stegastein and Vøringsfossen.
- If you have some more time and money, I would highly recommend going to the Lofoten and/or Tromsø up in Norway. These places are amazingly beautiful. During wintertime there is polar night in the north, and during summertime they have midnight sun. Both cool things to experience! Maybe you'll also see the northern lights. Something you'll never forget!

Bergen is a beautiful and lively city with a lot of stunning nature, but also has a lot of cultural activities, clubs, sports possibilities, shops, and restaurants: everything you need and want as a student. Speaking of students, UiB is a good university with a nice and welcoming atmosphere, and where everything is well-arranged.

#### exchange application process

I actually was quite late with the application process. It was a bit of an impulsive decision to study abroad for me. However, I found the process really easy and all the instructions were clear. I think I started the proces the same day as the application deadline, and I got everything done in time! However, you do have to keep in mind that there are more applications to come, where you need signatures from different parties. Make sure to start on time with this, because this can take a few days. You're not the only one who wants to study abroad!

# counselling & support at Utrecht University

If you needed help with something, the International Office was always quick with responding. When you needed documents to be signed, it took 2-3 days maybe, which I found quite quick.

## academic preparation

To choose the courses you wanted to follow, you could look at the courses that were given in the same semester the year before. Most of the times the same courses will be given each year, so you can already make a choice. I wanted to follow two courses, which were both restricted. I did get into one of them, but not into the other one. But I had already picked an extra option, in case this would happen. So be prepared that you might not always be accepted when it comes to the restricted courses and choose a back-up option!

#### language preparation

I did not really prepare myself when it comes to speaking the language. I learned some basic Norwegian words I could use in stores for example, but that's it. I already knew that Norwegian people their English is quite good, so I knew I would be fine with speaking English there.

#### finances

I already had saved some money, so I knew the finances wouldn't be a problem. Also because you can get compensation via DUO for the public transport there. I would say, make sure you save enough money and make sure you apply for compensations on time, since this might take a while untill it is on your bank account. Norway is quite expensive, so make sure you have a clear overview of how much money you can and want to spend on trips there for example.

# STUDY ABROAD PERIOD

study programme (content and organisational issues)

I found the UiB clearly organised and the content of courses was clear in advance. The organisation of the UiB is different from the UU, but it is easy to get used to. They do not really distinguish between seminars and lectures for example, most of the time you will just have lectures, but there are more moments of interactions in these. It is a bit of a combination. I personally think it worked nicely.

# academic quality of education activities

I think the academic quality of education activities at the UiB are a high level. The level is similar to the level of ecudation at the UU. However, I found the workload lower, thus made it feel easier and less stressful for me.

#### counselling & support at receiving university abroad

If you have questions, you can always send and e-mail which is answered quite quick. But you also get a lot of information in advance via e-mail and meetings, so I have only e-mailed once.

#### transfer of credits

My credits aren't transferred yet.

#### welcome & orientation programme

There is an indroduction week where they organise all kinds of activities all day long. They are optional, so you don't have to attend every activity. In the evenings there are mostly parties or pubquizzes. I found these activities a lot of fun. You can attend them with some friends you already made/knew, or with the mentorgroup you are assigned to. In the mentorgroup are mostly Norwegian people, which made it harder to communicate (they were mostly speaking Norwegian with eachother), but they still are a lot of fun and you will get the real Norwegian experience. You will always run into other international students, which is also a lot of fun.

#### accommodation

Housing was guaranteed if you applied before a certain deadline, so that is great. I had a shared appartment, with one roommate. We did not do that much together, but we were friends and I really liked her as my roommate. The appartment was small, but it had all the basic things you need. I really liked it and it was a modern appartment. I lived at Fantoft, this is a place where most international students live. They also organise different activities at Fantoft itself. Thus, you get to know many international students and you do a lot of fun things, like walks, movie nights, game nights, silent discos and so on. I think the housing was very well organized.

#### leisure & culture

There are lots of nice musea in Bergen. I personally really liked the University Museum of Bergen. They have different interests in the museum, so I think they is something interesting for everyone.

Since Bergen is located in between 7 mountains, it is the perfect place if you like nature. I hiked al 7 mountains, and I found this is the perfect activity if you enjoy nature and sports. It is a lot of fun to do this with friends, so you can have a nice chat along the way and enjoy the beautiful views together.

In the evening there are also fun bars you can go to. There are student bars, and places to go out.

### suggestions/tips

There is a ice-skating hall 2 bybanenstops away from fantoft, where you can go to for free in between 10 and 12 every weekday. This is a fun activity to do with friends and I really recommend doing this at least once! If you want to go on a trip or hike somewhere a bit further away and want to rent a car, make sure to check for cars via Getaround. There are lots of options for cars close by for a cheaper price then at a car rental at the airport for example.

You can also take the ferry to the Kleppesto, this is included into the public transport card you buy there and you get to make a fun boat trip. When you get there, you can take a bus more North, there are some nice spots for short walks and some swimming points where you can dive straight into the fjords.



Always check if there are student discounts, they have these a lot in Bergen and Norway in general. This can save you a lot of money!

# **CONCLUSIONS**

would you recommend this university/destination abroad to others? please explain

Yes, no doubt. I really had the best time here, made friends and memories that will last a lifetime. Also the education was really well organized and you will still have more then enough free time to do fun things and make some trips. # **PREPARATION**

### exchange application process

When I knew I wanted to go abroad I needed to make a top 3. The application process is very easy as every step is explained very well and is not hard to do at all. You will get an email when the next step is open to complete.

#### counselling & support at Utrecht University

The international office will help you with any question you have throughout the whole exchange and before (when you are not sure if an exchange semester is something that you want to do). If you email them, they respond very quickly. It is also possible to call or make an appointment

### academic preparation

As I chose courses within psychology I did not need to acquire any further academic knowledge to participate in the courses.

#### language preparation

I did not take special language preparation as my high school english level was enough to get into UiB. But i did start doing Duolingo to learn some basic Norwegian which was actually quite useful. Everyone in Norway speaks very good English though, so it is not needed to speak Norwegian.

#### finances

When I knew I got accepted at UiB I immediately started to save money from my job but I also took a loan. Furthermore, you are allowed to apply for the Erasmus Grant, which is about 360 euros a month for Norway. So that is really helpful but not enough, as everything is quite expensive in Norway.

# **STUDY ABROAD PERIOD**

### study programme (content and organisational issues)

NOR-INTRO--> a Norwegian language course for beginners. You have two lectures a week with a norwegian teacher. You will talk a lot and learn about different topics: food, hobbies and trips. The book you need to buy is based on your life as an international student and Bergen, which makes it easier to learn the language. I enjoyed this course A LOT!

MAPSYK319INT--> a cognitive neuroscience course that eloborates on methods (like fMRI, EEG) but also cognitive domains (like attention, memory and auditory). A course that was a little chaotic as the deadlines

were not known until the week before deadlines, which I found a little annoying as this course had a lot of large assignments.

PSYCH310A--> a course that is about the cultural psychology. You learn about multiculturalism and so on. A course that I found not so interesting as my interests lie more in the neuropsychology field and this is the total opposite. But if this is in your interest I think it is a nice course. The thing that I did enjoy was that you got mixed with norwegians to make an assignment, so you really get in contact with them. (which sometimes can be quite hard). This course is very short, two weeks and then a week of essay writing. But in those two weeks you will have lectures alsmost everyday which will last about 4 hours.

# academic quality of education activities

I think the quality is the same as in the Netherlands, you only have more contact hours. But I find that the ambience around academic achieval is quite different. The norwegians have a more relaxed and not result driven ambience at university. They care more about that you did the assignment and that you actually learn something than that the assignment is top notch written. This took away a lot of stress for me when I was studying there compared to in the Netherlands

#### counselling & support at receiving university abroad

Toril Salen was my international coordinator at UiB. If you needed her, you could just email her or drop by. I only emailed Toril and she responded very quick and her emails were very clarifying and useful. If she could not help me she would redirect my email to the person who could help me

#### transfer of credits

My credits have not been transferred yet. But as Norway also works with ECTS, I think these will be the same. Only the grades will need to be transferred as we work with numbers and norwegians with letters.

#### welcome & orientation programme

There is a programme called 'Fadderukke', which is the welcome program for inbternationals and all new UiB students. You will be put in a group and do all kinds of activities. However, I did not participate as my first cultural psychology course already started, so I was going to lectures instead of Fadderuke.

#### accommodation

UiB guarantees housing. You can give a top 3. However, most internationals live on Fantoft. I can recommend to live here. As all your friends will too. You do need to share a small room with someone else, which is challenging but I got lucky and was put with someone from UU that I already knew before coming to Norway. I do recommend to choose Fantoft TRE which is larger, with 16 people in one 'house' and a large shared kitchen and living room. Unfortunately, I did not get placed in that building but in a building where you need to share a studio with your own kitchen in it. Which is also fine but then the room is even smaller.

#### leisure & culture

There is a lot to do in Bergen. You can go to soccer games, go hiking, go ice skating, go to the cinema, go to café's, to museums, christmas markets, go clubbing. In short, there is a lot to do and I think Bergen has something to offer in every season for everyone. The people in Norway are really friendly and will help you with everything if YOU ask THEM. But really making norwegian friends is quite hard, so don't expect having a lot of norwegian friends.

### suggestions/tips

Bergen is small but Norway as a whole is so big. My tip would definitely be: Go travelling whenever you can! Norway is beautiful and everywhere you look it is beautiful. But the north is different than the south of Norway so it is definitely worth it to go travelling! I went to Oslo, Lofoten, Tromsø, Tronheim, Kristiansand and Ålesund all within my exchange semester and it was totally worth it!

would you recommend this university/destination abroad to others? please explain

YES! It was such a nice experience to study in Bergen. The systems are quite the same as in the Netherlands but just studying and living somewhere else is a lovely experience and I think Bergen is just the right place for it. It is a large city but not too large. Bergen is surrounded by nature, so you can escape the city life within 20 minutes. So Bergen has something of everything and that variety makes Bergen perfect for an exchange semester

# do you have any additional advice or comments?

Bergen is known for being the city with the most rain in Europe. But I actually got quite lucky and did not have as much rain as Bergen normally has to offer. However, if it does rain I really recommend a good rain coat as umbrellas will not survive the wind. If you are planning on travelling to the north during winter, pack some woolen socks and thermic clothes as I went to Tronheim when it was -15 but the weather app said it felt like - 20. So be prepared for that!

#### exchange application process

The application process went quite smoothly for me. I knew I wanted to go abroad, but I was doubting about which destination until the last minute. Despite that, I managed to write a sufficient motivation letter and to hand in my application on time. After I heard that I was allowed to go to Bergen, the application process at the university itself also was fine. Ofcourse, you are not used to their way of working, which can cause confusion sometimes, but everything is explained well and if you have any questions, you can reach the university easily.

#### counselling & support at Utrecht University

The Utrecht University was a great support for me. In the weeks before my exchange, I still did not know if it would go through, because of the pandemic. I could always call the International Office for questions, but also for advice about the situation. Should I wait any longer or should I just cancel it? They are really willing to think with you about your personal situation and that really helps. With the practical stuff the IO is also very helpful and they respond very clearly on your e-mails.

#### academic preparation

Before I went on exchange, I already had three years of university education, including writing a bachelor thesis. That was my preparation and I didn't do anything extra. For me, that was enough, because if you have the academic skills you will be able to take the courses I took.

#### language preparation

I was really nervous about the whole 'speaking English'- topic, but despite that, I didn't do any extra preparation. I was relying on the fact that everybody told me that it would work out. And it did. The first week, I really had to find my way in speaking in a foreign language and had to force myself to talk. After that, I began to care less about making mistakes and I just talked. That really helped and everyday it got better.

#### finances

Norway is insanely expensive and before I went on exchange, I made an overview with all the expected expenses and incoming money. That is really smart to do and don't underestimate the money you are going to spend. Daily life is expensive and also if you want to go on trips to see the country, that can cost you a lot of money. But it really helps that you can apply for Erasmus, can have a student loan and can receive money because of your public transport-gift (for Dutch students).

# study programme (content and organisational issues)

At first, I wanted to take part in a Norwegian language course. If you want to do that, I recommend you to check the moment that the applications for these classes open. I didn't know about this and was too late to sign up. It wasn't a problem after all, because I found two other courses that I liked. You have to sign up through the Norwegian Studentweb, you get instructions about that which for me were clear.

#### academic quality of education activities

The academic quality is good, the lectures are interesting most of the times. Also you get a nice overview of what you should do. Because of covid my exams were at home, for the both of them I had to write an essay in a day about a certain topic. For me it worked really well.

#### counselling & support at receiving university abroad

The University of Bergen is a quick responder to your e-mails. They had few information meetings for exchange students too and all important information is in English on the website. It was sufficient.

#### transfer of credits

This process went smoothly, because I received clear information about it from the International Office in Utrecht.

#### welcome & orientation programme

The welcome programme was in the beginning very confusing. I went to Norway on the 8<sup>th</sup> of August because I once got an e-mail that the programme would start on the 9<sup>th</sup>. This was not the case, which made me feel a little lonely and useless in the beginning, because there weren't organized activitities in the first week I was there. After that, the welcome programme started a week later. In the orientation programme for Social Sciences, all exchange students were divided over Norwegian mentor groups for first year's. The advantage of that was that you got in contact with Norwegian people, but the disadvantage was that sometimes people felt left out because the main language spoken was Norwegian. Also, you felt a little old between all the first year's, while most exchange students are further in their studies than that. But it was a nice week with a lot of activities and most of the mentors were really helpful! At the end of the week, I looked back on a really enjoyable time.

#### accommodation

I stayed at Fantoft, a student campus outside of the city. In Utrecht, I live in the city center, so this was something really different. But I didn't regret it one second. Most of the international students live on this campus and it is so nice to have all your friends just on a three minute walk from your house. All the parties, events and dinners take place at Fantoft and if you are with your friends, the tram ride to the city is not that bad. I would recommend this to every exchange student in Bergen.

# leisure & culture

Norwegian leisure exists a lot of exploring nature! Bergen is surrounded by seven mountains that you can climb. The rest of Norway is even more breathtaking, so the first weekends I spent on trips. I was not that kind of a hiking type when I came to Norway, but I really loved it.

### suggestions/tips

Climb the seven mountains, go to a bar to do Taco Friday, live at Fantoft, go to the Fotballpuben for karaoke on Thursday, HIKE, explore the rest of Norway, go on a city trip to Oslo, go to Nordnes Sjobad, enjoy and don't think too much about your expenses. ;)

### exchange application process

The application process is easy, although there is a lot of paperwork to do, but if you keep track of all the deadlines and requirements it is very doable. The international office provides a very practical handbook with a checklist!

#### counselling & support at Utrecht University

The international office is very helpful and replies quickly! I did not run into any problems during the application process.

### academic preparation

The academic level is comparable to Utrecht, so I did not do any academic preparation.

If you are not used to English lectures and writing in English maybe it's more difficult, because the courses in Bergen are in fast and fluent English.

#### language preparation

I did not do any Norwegian preparation, although that would have been nice. Norwegians are very supportive when you try to speak Norwegian and they always appreciate it, although everyone speaks very good English. The university offers Norwegian courses for exchange students, but you really need to be on time when sign up for that, so keep that in mind!

### finances

Norway is a very expensive country, especially if you want to take some trips around the country or if you want to buy alcohol. You get the maximum Erasmus Grant (360 euros a month), but I still needed some savings next to my usual budget in Utrecht.

#### study programme (content and organisational issues)

I took one course in Educational Sciences and one course in Norwegian Culture and history. I thought both of them were very interesting and the teachers were nice. Sometimes you have to buy books or articles, but look first if you can find a PDF of them: that saves you a lot of money!

#### academic quality of education activities

I thought the courses I took were very easy. Both courses I took only had 1 lecture a week, so I only had 4 contact hours. They both ended with a take home exam that lasted a few days, which were both very doable. Most people I talked to thought their courses were easy: everyone that put in a little bit of effort passed their courses.

#### counselling & support at receiving university abroad

There was a lot of counseling and support at UiB: they made sure you always knew where to go when there was a problem or you wanted to talk to someone. This is all being done by the student wellbeing organisation Sammen, which is also responsible for housing.

#### welcome & orientation programme

You have a welcome day from your faculty where they explain about the courses and exams, and you have the welcome week (Fadderuken) which is comparable to the UIT in Utrecht: you get assigned a group of first year students and some mentors, and you spend the week discovering the city and partying. I really recommend going to the Fadderuken, because you get to know Norwegians and nice places in the city.

#### accommodation

You are guaranteed a accomodation by the university, and therefore most exchange students live on a small campus (Fantoft). This is very nice: you get to know people very easily and your friends are always near. Most people get assigned a shared room, so I shared my room with a really nice girl from Jordan. The roomsharing takes some getting used to, but most people were very positive about it: you always have someone to talk to and if you take eachother into account there are no problems!

The buildings were new and well maintained, and I shared the big living room and kitchen with 15 others.

You can also find accommodation in the city, which could be nice because you get to know more Norwegians. I don't know a lot about this, because most people I was friends with lived on campus.

# leisure & culture

Norwegians are all about outdoor life: the city of Bergen is surrounded by seven mountains, that are all nice to climb. The city itself is not very big (about the size of Groningen), but very nice! There are some nice clubs and bars, and there are a lot of cute coffee places and stores.

#### suggestions/tips

Make most of your time there! You probably do not have to spend much time on your courses, so go outside a lot and explore the city and the nature!

Taking trips in Norway is also very easy and recommendable: go hiking to Trolltunga and Preikestolen, take the boat to Stavanger, rent a car and explore the nature, and take a plane up north and see the Northern Lights in Tromsø or the Lofoten!

On the website of the University of Bergen everything for exchange students is clear and well explained. There was a course list with an overview of all the courses they offer. They mostly offer courses from 10 or 15 ECTS, but there are also courses with less ECTS.

#### language preparation

As all of the courses for exchange students at the University of Bergen are offered in English I didn't need any language preparation. In daily life all Norwegians speak really good English (I would almost say better then people in the Netherlands) so you won't have any issues with that.

#### finances

Norway is an expensive country but if you prepare for it and save money it will be fine. You can make it as expensive as you want. You will mostly be spending money on your rent, public transportation, groceries and travelling.

# **STUDY ABROAD PERIOD**

### study programme (content and organisational issues)

The courselist gave a good overview and the course description of a course clearly lined out what they expected from you. I think on average Norwegian education at Universities is a bit less difficult then in the Netherlands, at least in my case when studying psychology. For a psychology course i choose Personnel Psychology (15 ECTS). For this course you only had the exam at the end of the course where you had to write two essays during the exam. I wasn't used to that kind of examination but it turned to be fine. I also choose a French course and the Norwegian Introdcution Course (7.5 ECTS) to learn basic Norwegian and to learn a bit about the culture, i really recommend it! It wasn't hard as it was an oral examination (instead of writing something) and because Norwegian turns out to be a bit of a mix of Dutch, English and German.

academic quality of education activities

As stated above I think in general you have to do less work to obtain a certain amount of ECTS than compared to the work I have to do in the Netherlands to obtain ECTS. For the Personnel Psychology course there were lectures and seminars. The seminars weren't compulsory but they can be useful to prepare for the exam. Some lectures were really good but for some lectures I thought the level was disappointing because these were given by a PhD student, however they might change that in the future.

### counselling & support at receiving university abroad

The University of Bergen is well-organised and they are quick in responding e-mails when having questions or needing help. The international contact person of the University of Bergen for Psychology was really nice and made me feel very welcome. On their website you can find a lot of information for new exchange students, everyting is really clear. The only thing that was a bit badly organised is the registration with the police. The University of Bergen has booked two days for their international students to go to the police and get the registration done (this is obligated, it is instead of a visa). I recommend you to book an appointment by yourself to prevent long waiting.

#### transfer of credits

This was really easy because the University of Bergen also uses the ECTS system, so your credits will easily be transferred. The grade system in Norway ranges from A to F, where A/E is pass and F is fail. When transferring your grades you only get a pass or fail at Utrecht Unviersity so you don't have to worry a lot about the height of your grade, only about pass or fail. I also received credits for the Norwegian Introduction Course.

# **STUDENT LIFE**

# welcome & orientation programme

The University of Bergen was really welcoming! During the first semester there are more international students than during the second semester, I liked that. There were two welcoming days for international students only and a whole week where you had your own mentorgroup together with 4 other international students and with norwegian students (I think this differs from the welcome programme for the second semester as it will be smaller). The idea of putting internationsal students and Norwegian students together is nice but in my experience Norwegians students are open for you the first day but after that they spend more time together with the Norwegian students only. The orientation programme also differs between faculties. The faculty of Psychology and the faculty of Social Sciences had a very extensive programme compared to other faculties that had a less extensive programme.

### accommodation

The University of Bergen offers housing garantuee which is really nice as it can be difficult to find accommodation by your own while being in the Netherlands. The housing organisation is called Sammen and you can give your top three preferences. Be sure to apply in time as otherwise you won't have the garantueed housing! I lived at Fantoft (20 minutes outside the centre) which i found very nice because most international students live there, so you have your friends nearby. There are studios, single rooms, and shared rooms during the first/autumn semester (due to more exchange students in the first semester). You don't always have the choice as you have to accept the room Sammen gives to you. I had my own room (approximately 17 m2) with my own bathroom in it and I shared the kitchen with seven others. For my room I paid around 430 euro which is cheap compared to other accommodations in Bergen and Norway. All rooms and kitchens are new and renovated at Fantoft so that was really nice. The people who were offered a shared room eventually also thought it was fine. At Fantoft there is a gym and there is a grocery store. There also is Klubb Fantoft that organises activities, which is nice to get to know people in the beginning.

#### leisure & culture

Norway is comparable in culture to the Netherlands but there are differences. Things are more expensive but it's not too bad. For example when doing groceries the prices can be comparable to prices in the Netherlands if you pay attention to it. Public transportation costs 46 euros for a month for a student. If you will live at Fantoft

you will definitely need it as you have to take the bybanen (tram) to go to the centre and to the university. One thing that is really expensive is alcohol and, except from beers that you can buy in the supermarkets, you will have to go to the Vinmonopolet to buy any other alcohol. In Bergen, you can party a lot and they have really nice clubs, such as NATT, Sgjeneros, Lille and Vaskeriet. On sunday all supermarkets and shops are closed. For shopping there also are nice stores, like the Bikbok and Gina Tricot which are scandinavian brands, next to the more standard stores like H&M etc. Going to a restaurant might be expensive but you can easily eat a pizza in a restaurant for 16 euros. A lot of places offer a student discount, so use it as you have a student card. Next to that Bergen is such a nice place as it is located between seven mountains. You can hike a lot and i really did like it although I didn't necessarily expected it to be something i would do a lot.

Take also time to travel as there are so many nice places around Bergen. The national parc of Folgefonna is very nice, where i did a glacier hike for example. Bergen is also surrounded by fjords, so you can't miss out on a fjord tour. Furthermore trips to other cities are nice, for example Oslo, Stavanger and Tromsø. In Tromsø i saw the northern lights and I went reindeer sledding (it is very difficult to see the northern lights in Bergen, so be prepared to travel if you really want to see them). To finish, they say that Bergen is the city of Europe where it rains the most. This might be true but during my stay in the autumn semester of 2019 the weather hasn't been bad at all. I might have been very lucky with this but don't let the weather stop you as Bergen has so many nice things to offer!

#### suggestions/tips

- It is really nice to meet Norwegian people but this might be hard. The most of your friends will probably be other international students. You will meet norwegians in your mentorgroup which is nice but a buddy program can be nice to. Therefore you should sign up as fast as possible because there are a lot of students searching for a buddy.
- Tavel to nice places around Bergen and in Norway as it is a beautiful country. Flåm is for example a really nice place, next to other norwegian cities. Go up to the north in Norway as it is so different from Bergen.
- Take a look at organisations as Study Bergen, ESN and BSI Friluft as they organise nice trips for generally not a lot of money.

# **CONCLUSIONS**

would you recommend this university/destination abroad to others? please explain

I would definitely recommend Bergen and the University of Bergen. Bergen is a Norwegian city how you expect it to be with a harbour, coloured houses and surrounded by mountains. The University is good and they are very welcoming and will always help you if you have a problem. Next to Bergen, i really recommend Norway as a country.

do you have any additional advice or comments?

Enjoy your time, don't worry too much about money and just make the most out of it!

# **PREPARATION**

#### exchange application process

I applied for University of Bergen as my first choice and University of Helsinki as my second choice. I wanted to go to Scandinavia and in particular Norway. From all the universities in Norway, Bergen had the most interesting courses for me. I applied through my faculty and not universitywide, because I felt like I had more chances of getting my first choice through my faculty.

# counselling & support at Utrecht University

I've had contact with the International Office FSW a couple of times. They are really helpful and usually answer the same or next day. However, if you have questions about specific locations or universities, I would have preferred to speak with someone who has been there instead of an employee who knows as much as is stated on the websites from universities abroad.

### academic preparation

I haven't done any specific academic preparation, other than my ususal courses. The courses I was going to do at the Faculty of Social Sciences were in line with my academic career here in Utrecht.

#### language preparation

The courses I was going to do are taught in English. My English was sufficient enough before going to Norway without needing any extra preparation. I learned some Norwegian for fun though.

### finances

I applied for and received the Erasmus grant. The residual costst I paid with some savings and my loan from DUO

# study programme (content and organisational issues)

The academic year is divided in two semesters. Some courses last the entire semester, others are only half of the semester, depending on the faculty. I though the different timelines would be a problem with choosing courses from different faculties, so I stuck to courses from the Faculty of Social Sciences. I choose two anthropology courses. SANT104: Culture, Meaning and Communication, which was a really good course taught by a very captivating, fun professor. And SANT105: Power, its articulations and disguises, which I dropped because it was a bit more boring in my opinion. There were both Norwegian and English workgroups. It was not mandatory to attend the workgroups, but your own responsibility. On the other hand, if you were planning to attend the workgroups, you had to be prepared and be present every workgroup, otherwise you would be

#### kicked out.

In retrospect, I would have chosen for the first anthropology course (SANT104) and a course from the music faculty. Because of the different timelines I thought it was not possible, but I know some others who have done it. So don't let it stop you from choosing courses in different faculties. Just make sure that your courses don't overlap in time.

Last but not least, consider taking the Norwegian class for beginners. It is really fun with other internationals, and you will be able to understand more from everyday life in the city! The application process for this course is a bit different than for regular courses. The application starts at the first of August (last year at least). BE ON TIME, because the spots will be filled in just an hour or so. I was too late, but I managed to get a free spot in one of the groups while we were already two weeks in the semester.

#### academic quality of education activities

The academic quality is comparable to the Netherlands in my experience. Like I said, in regards to the workgroups, they expected more independence from students. However, this was the case for my courses, but as I heard from my international friends, not so much for other faculties.

I had to pay for my books (worth 120 euros) and for many additional academic papers, which was a bit of a setback. In the Netherlands you can get access to academic papers for free usually. On the other hand, it was not really necessary for me to buy the books, so consider that before buying your books. I can't speak for all courses ofcourse.

#### counselling & support at receiving university abroad

Any contact with the International Office in Bergen took a bit more time than my contact with the IO in Utrecht. Also, there was a bit of a hassle about the Learning Agreement, because Utrechts sent me a pdf-copy, while Bergen insisted on not giving a signature unless it was via the Online Learning Agreement. All was well in the end though.

#### transfer of credits

In Norway, credits are given via the ECTS-system as well, so credits can be transferred easily to Utrecht University.

# **STUDENT LIFE**

### welcome & orientation programme

Univeristy of Bergen offers two kinds of welcome programmes for international students. The first one is a one-day big welcome for all the international students and a one-day gathering with all international students from the same faculty. The second one is the Mentor Week (or Fadderuken in Norwegian) and is also the welcome programme for first-year Norwegian students. All students from the same faculty are divided into mentor groups with both Norwegian first-years and international students, among with a few second year Norwegian students as mentors. This week is in some ways comparable to th UIT, with a big market with all the students organisations, a few competitiongames between the mentor groups, and every night a party in one of the student clubs. You could also choose to go to more lowkey activities, such as a boardgame or a pubquiz, but my mentor group was more about the parties. Mentor Week was a fun way to get to know some Norwegian students as well and a good introduction to the student life/night life in Bergen. It depends a little bit on your mentor group however; I was lucky to have a very welcoming mentorgroup. I heard from other international students that not all Norwegian students were that eager to talk to internationals.

The Mentor Week is only happening in the fall semester of course and not in the spring semester.

#### accommodation

University of Bergen works together with Sammen, a big organisation which provides gyms, doctors, mental well-being counseling, child care, cafeterias, but also accomodation. Sammen housing offers different options for international students, varying from big flats with almost only international students, to houses with Norwegian students, and also varying in price range. Before the semester starts you can apply for three options.

My first choice was a shared bedroom with another student and a shared kitchen and living room with 15 other students. I don't mind sharing my stuff and it also happened to be the cheapest one (approx 310 euros). This kind of apartment is located at Fantoft, where many international students live, both in the kind of apartment I got and a bigger, not-shared, one. The international students who only stayed one semester usually got the shared room, while the international students staying for the whole year usually got the individual room, whether they applied for it or not.

Due to less international students in the spring semester, the shared rooms are usually only occupied by one student, which means that the kitchen and the living room will then be shared with only 7 other students. Fantoft is from all the accomodations the farthest away from the city center, but it only takes 20/30 minutes by tram, which is called Bybanen and has fast successive departure times. The only thing is that Bybanen doesn't drive after 1 am during weekdays, and 4 am at Friday and Saturday.

#### leisure & culture

#### SPORTS:

- Sammen trening: a membership for 1200 NOK per semester gives you access to Fantoft gym and other gyms and the swimming pool in the city center.
- Cabin trips: everyone has access to all the cabins in the country. If you are planning on staying two or more nights in a cabin (does not have to be sequentially) then it is cheaper to buy a membership for 360 NOK (youth till 26 years) for one year (1st of January till 31st of December)
- Going on cabin trips or mountain hikes, you probably need some more stuff than you took with you. Take a look at Fantoft Renting (outdoor gear and household stuff in one of the flats at Fantoft cheap renting prices), BSI Renting (outdoor gear in the faculty of Natural Sciences cheap renting prices, you need to buy a membership though) and BUA Renting (outdoor gear don't remember where it was free renting, we went there for skitrousers, but they only had children sizes, but if you are a small girl, that will do.)
- BSI climbing: they have some climbing stuff at Sammen trening at Fantoft, but from what I heard BSI climbing was better. You can use the same membership for renting stuff for their climbing hall.)
- Bergenshallen ice skating: in the winter months the ice skating hall (two tramstops away from Fantoft) is open from 10.00-14.00 for free during weekdays (Thursday from 10.00-12.30). Also the renting of ice skates is for free.

#### CULTURE:

- Grieghallen concerts: somewhere in september the Bergen Symphony Orchestra gives a free concert for students. You have to make a reservation, but it's for free if you give your student number.
- Lysfesten: at the end of november/beginning of december the city starts the Christmas season with a big light festival in the city center. They lighten the Christmas tree, and there is firework, and Norwegian christmas carols and other music. Christmas is big in Norway!
- Keep an eye on the Facebook pages of museums to see when they have reduced prices/free entrance. In the beginning of the semester there is a Museum Night in which many museums have reduced prices. I missed it unfortunately.
- If you're interested in classical music you will have the time of your life in Bergen. Plan a visit to Troldhaugen, the old house of composer Grieg.

# FOOD AND DRINKS:

- Egon Restaurant: 122 NOK for pizza buffet (all you can eat), during Sunday and Monday, and other days till 18.00.
- Kvarteret student center: several student activities are organised here, but they also have a restaurant with student-friendly prices.
- Sammen Spise (eating): cafeterias in university buildings. You can buy a coffee thermoscup for 500 NOK which gives you free coffee and tea during the whole semester.
- Cafe spesial: cosy restaurant in the city center with (for Norway considered) cheap prices.
- Johanneskirke gives waffles (typical Norwegian food) and coffee/tea for free to students on Wedsnesday starting 12.15. Entrance is at the back of the church.

- Supermarkets: Kiwi and REMA1000 are the cheapest ones, and Bunnpris as well I think. At Fantoft there is only a Meny, which is slightly more expensive, but it has a lot of 10 NOK (1 euro) deals. If you are vegan, consider going to Xtra, for more vegan options.

#### SHOPPING:

- Garage sales: in the beginning of the semester in one of the Fantoft flats, has a lot of household stuff.
- Fretex: second hand store with several affiliates, one close to university. I could easily find some nice clothes every time I gave the store a visit.
- Kid home and furniture: in the beginning of the semester they have a student deal with a discount for bedding.
- Normal: drugstore with cheaper toiletries than in regular supermarkets.

#### TRANSPORTATIONS:

- Bybanen (light rail) and bus in Bergen and surroundings: is organised by Skyss. Download the Skyss Billett app to buy a ticket. For me it was the cheapest option to buy 5 times a ticket for 30 days for students (480 NOK). I bought tickets for Zone A, which is the whole of the city Bergen. If you travel outside the city you need to buy tickets for Zones B, C, etc. To plan your travel, you can download the Skyss app. The bus to Ikea is for free.
- Train: if you are planning to travel by train, take a look at Vy.no.
- Plain: some Scandinavian airlines offer reduced prices for students inbetween Scandinavian airports.

#### suggestions/tips

- Take a look at the market of student organisations which takes place during the Mentor Week. There is probably something (sports, music, vegan groups, charities, student media groups) which is interesting for you.
- There are many Facebook groups for international students and for people living at Fantoft or other Sammen accommodations.
- Finn.no is kind of the Markplaats.nl of Norway.
- MAKE SURE YOU HAVE A CREDIT CARD!!! You have to pay a lot by credit card, such as Skyss tickets, laundry service, cabins.

# **CONCLUSIONS**

would you recommend this university/destination abroad to others? please explain

Yes, definitely. Bergen is a lively city with a relatively a lot of students. Within a few moments you are able to be in the mountains surrounding Bergen. And yes, it is raining a lot, but just bring an umbrella with you an you will be fine. It is not like your cycling in the rain like in the Netherlands, but most of the time you're in the Bybanen anyway. If you want to experience snow and skiing, you can easily find some good spots just an hour from Bergen in the winter months. There is a lot to do in the city both for sports and culture lovers.

# do you have any additional advice or comments?

Be on time with all application steps, both before, during and after your stay abroad. The process itself is not that difficult, but there is a lot to think of, so I recommend making a list and keeping that in a place where you see it regularly.

study programme (content and organisational issues)

I took an anthropology course from 15 ECT (SANT240). This course took a lot of time with lectures, seminars and readings but I found it very interesting. It was comparable with antrhopology courses in Utrecht. I also took the short introduction to Norwegian language and culture (NOR-INTRO). I would recommend this because it was a lot of fun, however you are only able to have very basic conversations. The third course I took was from

comparative politics about gender (SAMPOL221). This course only had lectures so there was not much discussion or conversation.

#### academic quality of education activities

The quality of the courses is comparable to courses at Utrecht university. Only I felt they were less strict and you have to study more independent with not as many obliged assignments. The norwegian intro course is easy, SANT240 is also in level comparable with antrhopology courses in Utrecht. Also the way it is taught is similar to anthropology courses in Utrecht with lectures and seminars to discuss the readings. SAMPOL221 is comparable to a level 1 or 2 course at Utrecht university.

#### counselling & support at receiving university abroad

There is not as much personal contact as at uu but teachers are very helpful and always willing to answer your questions.

#### transfer of credits

I took 32.5 credits and I assume this will be worth the same at Utrecht University.

#### STUDENT LIFE

#### welcome & orientation programme

Since I arrived the second semester there were much less students arriving compared to the first semester. Because of this we had just one day of introduction to get to know the university and some people. The focus was on information about the university and we had a lecture about Norwegian culture and nature. This was helpful to get to know how the unversity works and what students life in Bergen offers.

#### accommodation

You are always assured to have a room at Sammen housing. I lived at Fantoft, which is the place where most of the international students live. This is why I would recommend to live there. It is twenties minutes with public transport to the city centre where also the university is. There are many activities in Klubb Fantoft which helps you to get to know people. Besides that, it is nice to have some flatmates to talk to and having friends of you living close. The buildings are all just renovated so of good quality. I shared my kitchen with 9 and had my own bathroom. It costed around 420 euros a month, so if you want something cheaper I would recommend Alrek which is also a big students housing with many international students. The advantage of living in the city centre can be that you live with Norwegians instead of internationals.

#### leisure & culture

Mostly if you like nature and hiking I would recommend Bergen. Within half an hour from the city centre you are in the mountains which is really nice. So I mostly hanged out with friends, made bonfires, hiked and went on trips during my leisure time. There are nice bars but it is quite expensive to go out. Bergen is furhermore a nice city with nice architecture and some museums. Besides that, there are many student organizations who organize activities, for example ESN.

#### suggestions/tips

I would recommend to go out explore the nature around Bergen and in Norway. Also when you like outdoor activities join the students organizations BSI Friluft because they organize some nice trips and it's a good way to get to know people with the same interests as you. If you are less into outdoors I would recommend you to become a member from another students organization.

# **CONCLUSIONS**

### exchange application process

# counselling & support at Utrecht University

I don't recall asking for counselling or support a Utrecht University. This is because the information given to me in advance was sufficient enough that I did not need it.

# exchange application process

The application process starts by following the steps that are described on the website of Utrecht University. The steps are easy to follow and as long as you complete the application within the deadline you shouldn't come across problems you can't solve by yourself.

## counselling & support at Utrecht University

If you find yourself experiencing problems with you application you can always contact the international office and they are happy to help you out. I went to the international office to get some information about one of the partner universities and by the afternoon I received an email that included the information I was not able to find by myself.

### academic preparation

I was not worried about the level of education I was going to find at the partner university. Since I was told that the educational level in The Netherlands is quite high in comparison to other countries throughout Europe I wanted to go to a country where I could be sure that the educational level was equal to that at Utrecht University or higher.

# language preparation

The study programme I was following at Utrecht Univeristy was in English so I was used to having my lectures and seminars in English. This lead me to do nothing specificly different than following this study programme to prepare myself for my studies abroad.

# finances

I tried to save as much money as possible for my studies abroad at my parttime job. I wanted to be able to enjoy my stay abroad without having to worry about my finances. Norway is an expessive country for foreign students and I would recommend everybody who wants to study there to make a clear and advised financial plan as far in advance as possible.

# study programme (content and organisational issues)

The study programme I attended consisted of an master course at the faculty of psychology, norwegian language and a bachelors' course at the faculty of humanities (this because I wanted to experience the working methods at another faculty). It was easy to choose these courses and when I accidently filled in the wrong level of the norwegian language course I got an email from the university that they already changed it into the right

course for me and they wanted to make sure that this was what I intended to do.

#### academic quality of education activities

The first two weeks of my semester were also the weeks in which I had the most lectures and they each took 4 hours. The quality of these lectures was quite similar to the lectures I was used to in The Netherlands. The lectures from the course Music, Gender and Sexuality were very different from what I was used to because the teacher spoke a lot about his own opinion and I was missing the (in my opinion) Scientific bachground. Even though this course was different it showed me that the way I was thought to study is not the way that is common at every faculty. I would recommend to follow a course outside of your own faculty to experience this and see things from a different research persepctive.

#### counselling & support at receiving university abroad

The counseling and support at the university of Bergen is very well taken care of. They helped me with the norwegian language course (as I wrote down above). During my stay I didn't have much dificulties where I needed counseling for, but I am sure that you could expect help with all kinds of problems (study problems and personal problems)

#### transfer of credits

I did not receive all my results yet.

#### welcome & orientation programme

The welcome programma (fadderuken) is so much fun. As long as you don't attend the law faculty you get mixed up with norwegian students in a faddergruppe. In one week they show you the city and a bit of the Nowegian student culture, this week is a great opportunity to meet norwegian students and to go out for (a more) reasonable price since alcohol is very expensive in Norway. During the fadderuken there are all sorts of activities organised during the day and night but nothing is obligatory. There is also a welcome meeting from the university for all the new international students in grieghallen (the big concert hall of the city), this meeting gives you immediately a feeling of being welcome and the small part of doing the whole exchange on your own disapears.

#### accommodation

When you apply for accomodation you probably get to choose between Alrek and Fantoft. If you want to make a lot of international friends and are in for a party now and then choose Fantoft. I lived in the new building where I shared a kitchen and living room with 14 others and I'm really happy that I ended up there. At first I wasn't aware of the fact that I had to share a room and bathroom with one other person but since everything in the building was completely new and the kitchen/living room was really big I only used the room when I had to study and living with a roommate was very nice.

#### leisure & culture

If you go to Bergen you choose one of the best places to experience the Nowegian nature. From Bergen you can travel to all ot of nature parks where you can make amazing cabin trips and hikes. Because Bergen is surrounded by mountains you can also just hike up a mountain from the city center (even before a lecture if you feel like it). The nature and hiking trips are by far the things I'm never going to forget about my exchange. If you're not an experienced hiker you can join the organisation BSI and join their guided trips. Besides the fact that Bergen is the perfect location to discover the nature is it a true student city so the night life is buzzing. There are a lot of clubs and small bars so after the fadderuken you know that there are places to go that please everybodies wishes. Most of these clubs are open till 3 but the norwegian students start early (pre-drinks at 6/7) so you still have a long night.

#### suggestions/tips

One of the tips I would give is attend the faddruken, this way you get to know the city fast and you will meet a lot of amazing people. One thing you have to keep in mind when you consider going to Norway is that it is an expesive country for foreigners so you have to save some money in advance, that way you can fully enjoy your echange without worrying about money.

### exchange application process

The application process was going very well, due to the preparation made by Utrecht University and Universitetet i Bergen as well. # counselling & support at Utrecht University

Utrecht University is very supportive for students that would like to go on exchange, so there is plenty of information available as well as enough people at the International Office. They are very helpful and act quick, so your process won't be delayed. During the stay, Utrecht University is keeping you in track via e-mail and are always available for further questions and updates on what you should do during and after your stay.

### academic preparation

The academic preparation is made by following courses at your home university and taking that knowledge with you when you go on exchange.

# language preparation

The language preparation is important especially for students that have to follow courses that are not in English. For me that wasn't the case, so I prepared myself by reading the information of the university, so I had everything clear for myself. I think it is important to take extra language courses if your English isn't that good, but otherwise you will manage with everage English.

# finances

Finances was not a problem for me, because my parents supported me and I worked hard before I went on exchange. The Erasmus grant can also be very helpful when you need some extra support.

# study programme (content and organisational issues)

The courses that I followed in Bergen were not very intensive courses. The literature was not too much and the amount of lectures and assignments was low, so I had a lot of free time. The organization of the exchange was very good. The introduction week was clear and very helpful and the university (site) gave a lot of information about where to go and what to do. Thereby there were no issues and everything was very well organized.

#### academic quality of education activities

The academic quality was good, but the level wasn't that high as I expected it to be. The level of literature, assignments and requirements were not higher then Utrecht University.

The housing is not far from the city center and easily reachable by tram.

#### leisure & culture

Norway is a country with endless possibilities for exploring various things, especially when you love nature and walking in the mountains. Bergen is a beautiful city that gives both room when you need a quiet place, but also when you want to go out there is a lot to do. Around Bergen there are 'the 7 mountains' that you can explore by walking up and down in a few hours. The station is in the centre and brings you to wherever you want to go by train and bus, so you can go into the country easily and explore other cities, mountains and beautiful trainrides.
