2.1	 Consideration for admission to the degree programme History (research) requires a Dutch or foreign diploma that demonstrates knowledge, understanding and skills at the level of a university Bachelor's degree and that shows its holder has the following specific knowledge, understanding, and skills: knowledge in the field of History, as demonstrated by a minimal of 45 EC in a relevant field; understanding of basic concepts in one of the above-mentioned fields and insight into relevant qualitative and quantitative methods; intellectual curiosity and motivation for further research; skills pertaining to the conduct of independent research in primary and secondary sources; a high standard of academic achievement as evidenced in academic transcripts and references; ability to use English as a working language. The following conditions for consideration for admission apply to the various programmes.
	Ancient, Medieval and Renaissance Studies
	Consideration to the programme Ancient, Medieval and Renaissance Studies requires the following specific knowledge, understanding, and skills: - a clear interest in Ancient, Medieval, Insular or Renaissance Studies as evidenced in a minimal of 45 EC in a relevant field at BA level; - knowledge of basic concepts in Ancient, Medieval, Insular or Renaissance Studies and insight into relevant methods. - For Ancient Studies, competence in either ancient Greek or Latin. For Medieval, Insular or Renaissance Studies, competence in either Latin or one of the Medieval and Early Modern vernaculars. Students are encouraged to acquire these language skills before embarking on the programme; if students enter the programme without the required language skills, they are expected to acquire them during their studies. Competence is defined as having completed the relevant level I and II language courses offered by the Faculty of Humanities or, in case of Greek or Latin, a Dutch Gymnasium diploma. Students are encouraged to acquire named language skills before embarking on the programme; if students enter the programme without named language skills, they are expected to acquire them during their studies.

	Consideration for admission to the degree programme History requires the following specific knowledge, understanding, and skills: - a clear interest in historical research as evidenced in a minimal of 45 EC in a relevant field at BA level; - knowledge of basic concepts in history and insight into relevant methods.
	3. Students will be selected on the basis of an assessment of the following core competencies:
	 a) motivation and talent (on the basis of GPA and student progress monitoring); b) level of required knowledge and the mastery of methods and techniques used in the subject area;

- c) general high level of professional and intellectual ability;
- d) command of the language(s) used in the programme.

This information is used to consider whether the student concerned is in a position to complete successfully the Master's programme within the nominal time period.

3.1 Aim of the programme

Ancient, Medieval and Renaissance Studies

The programme aims to:

- provide specialised knowledge, insight and skills in the field of Ancient, Medieval, Insular or Renaissance Studies;
- prepare students for a career as a researcher in the field of Ancient,
 Medieval, Insular or Renaissance Studies in the broadest sense;
- prepare students for a PhD programme in the field of Ancient, Medieval, Insular or Renaissance Studies.

The graduate:

- has profound knowledge of and insight into the field of Ancient, Medieval, Insular or Renaissance Studies;
- has thorough knowledge of a specialism within the programme, or thorough knowledge of an interdisciplinary field which relates to Ancient, Medieval, Insular or Renaissance Studies;
- has the academic skills to independently identify, formulate, analyse and suggest possible solutions to problems in the field of Ancient, Medieval, Insular or Renaissance Studies; this includes the ability to navigate and process a wide variety of textual and/or material sources;
- has the academic skills to conduct research in the field of Ancient, Medieval, Insular or Renaissance Studies and to report on it in a manner that meets the general standards of the discipline;
- possesses professional and academic skills, particularly in relation to Ancient, Medieval, Insular or Renaissance Studies while being able to look beyond the boundaries of the programme;
- is able to apply the mentioned skills and knowledge in his/her profession;
- is able to communicate (both orally and in written form) conclusions, as well as the underlying knowledge, grounds and considerations, to an audience composed of specialists or non-specialists. This includes being able to transfer academic knowledge in support of broader societal purposes.

History

The programme aims to:

- provide specialized knowledge, insight and skills in the field of the methodological and theoretical concepts of History;
- prepare students for a career as a researcher in the field of historical science in the broadest sense;
- prepare students for a PhD programme in the field of Modern History.

The graduate:

- has profound knowledge of and insight into the field of History;
- has the academic skills to independently identify, formulate, analyse and suggest possible solutions to problems in the field of History;
- has the academic skills to conduct research in the field of History and to report on it in a manner that meets the general standards of the discipline;
- possesses professional and academic skills
- is able to apply the mentioned skills and knowledge in his/her profession;
- is able to communicate conclusions, as well as the underlying knowledge, grounds and considerations, to an audience composed of specialists or nonspecialists.

3.2 Attendance mode

Both programmes are taught full-time.

3.3 Language in which the programme is taught

The programmes are taught in English. In all programmes elective courses will on occasion be available in other languages than English.

3.6.1 Composition of the study programmes

Ancient, Medieval and Renaissance Studies

The study programme comprises four specializations, i.e. Ancient Studies, Medieval Studies, Insular Studies and Renaissance Studies. Students choose one of these specializations.

4.6 Evaluation of quality of the education

 - NSE) the students will be asked for their opinion on all aspects of
 the courses, teaching and the facilities.
- 3. Students who have participated in courses offered by the Faculty of Humanities will be informed of the results of the course evaluations.
