2.1	<p>Admission to the study programmes</p> <p>1. Consideration for admission to the degree programme Literary Studies (research) / <i>Comparative Literary Studies</i> requires a Dutch or foreign diploma that demonstrates knowledge, understanding and skills at the level of a university Bachelor's degree and shows that its holder has the following specific knowledge, understanding, and skills:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> familiarity with the academic study of culture; knowledge of the methods and theories applied in the study of culture in general, and literature in particular; an excellent level of academic achievement; intellectual curiosity and highly developed analytical skills; a strong motivation to pursue further training in literary research from a comparative perspective; an ability to use English as a working language and an international orientation. <p>2. Students will be selected on the basis of an assessment of the following core competencies:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> motivation and talent (also on the basis of GPA and student progress monitoring); level of required knowledge and the mastery of methods and techniques used in the subject area; general high level of professional and intellectual ability; command of the language(s) used in the programme. <p>This information is used to consider whether the student concerned is in a position to complete successfully the Master's programme within the nominal time period.</p> <p>3. There is a fixed quota for admission to the programme in Comparative Literary Studies. The maximum number of students to be admitted to the programme is 20. The admissions committee referred to in Article 2.3 will rank the applications received using the criteria set out in Article 2.1.2. and will accept applications for admission by their ranking.</p>
3.1	<p>Aim of the programme</p> <p><u>The RMA degree in Literary Studies aims to:</u></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - Provide specialized knowledge, insight and skills in the field of study as practiced today at leading research universities; - Prepare students for a career as a researcher in the field of literature and culture, both within academic and non-academic contexts - Prepare students for a PhD programme; <p><u>A graduate with this degree:</u></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - has advanced knowledge of and insight into the field of comparative literary studies with specific reference to literary cultures of the modern period showing due regard for its position within the broader field of the Humanities; - has thorough knowledge of a specialism within that field or at the intersection with a cognate field; - has the academic independence and the necessary skills to engage critically with theoretical debates in the field and to formulate new research questions; - has the academic skills to conduct original research in the field using appropriate methods and respecting professional codes; - is able to report on findings in a professional manner; - is able to communicate conclusions, as well as the underlying knowledge, grounds and considerations, to both specialists and non-specialists.

The courses and teaching in the degree programme will be evaluated using one or more of the following means: <ul style="list-style-type: none">• course evaluation: at the end of the course, the participating students are asked to evaluate the course through the digital survey system;• evaluation at curriculum level: through curriculum dialogues (in Dutch <i>onderwijsgesprekken</i>)• by means of the National Student Survey (<i>Nationale Studenten Enquête – NSE</i>) the students will be asked for their opinion on all aspects of the courses, teaching and the facilities. 3. Students who have participated in courses offered by the Faculty of Humanities will be informed of the results of the course evaluations.

Electives

Students follow compulsory components for a total of 80 EC (including a thesis of 30 EC), follow courses for a minimum of 10 EC at a Research School in the Netherlands, and follow elective modules of their own choosing with a maximum of 30 EC, depending on the profile mentioned in article 3.6.1. The obligation to acquire 10 EC at a Research School does not apply to students who follow 30 EC at a university abroad; in which case they may limit themselves to 5 EC at a Research School.

Students may select as electives:

- non-compulsory modules offered by the RMA programme in Comparative Literary Studies;
- modules offered by other RMA programmes in the fields of Media and Performance, Gender Studies, Religious Studies, and Philosophy offered at the Utrecht Faculty of Humanities (see the table below for possible electives from these programmes);
- modules from the one-year master Literature Today and from the MasterLanguage programme (on condition that the number of EC from those programmes does not exceed 10 EC).
