has sufficient knowledge, understanding and skills to search for, and find information independently, to assess this and share it with others, doing so in a societal context, performing work at academic level, and in a degree programme at Master's level. 3.2 **Programme format** The BA History is a full-time programme. 3.3 Language in which the programme is taught The programme is taught in English: 100% of the courses for the degree programme are taught in English. Appendix 7 provides the reasoning behind the programme's language policy. 3.5 Major The History programme has two tracks: 1. History; 2. International relations in historical perspective. Students choose a specialisation from among those offered within the relevant track (see also the Curriculum (appendix 1 A)). 1. One portion of the programme consists of the major, which has a study load 2. of 120 EC in history subjects. Within the major, the courses listed in Appendix 1, having a total study load of 60 EC, (excluding the thesis, see paragraph 2) are compulsory. 3. The major includes a thesis having a study load of 15 EC at an advanced level (3) (see Appendix 1). 4. The remaining courses for the major, including the 30 EC specialisation, are to be chosen by students from among the courses listed in Appendix 2. 5. The major includes courses that are related to the academic and social context of history. These courses are listed in Appendices 1 and 2. 6. The programme components that fall within the major must include at least 45 EC in advanced level (3) courses. Students who commenced their studies in a previous academic year must complete the curriculum as described in the EER Appendix for the year in question. As certain curricular components are no longer offered in this academic year (2023-2024), transition provisions apply (see Appendix 6). 4.7 **Evaluation of quality of the education** 1. The Director of Studies is responsible for monitoring the quality of the courses and teaching. To this end the Director of Studies will ensure that quality assurance involves evaluating courses and an evaluation at curriculum level. In ensuring the quality of courses the Director of Studies will draw on the advice and suggestions for improvement of the curriculum committees on promoting and safeguarding the quality of the course. 2. The courses and teaching in the degree programme will be evaluated using one or more of the following means: course evaluation: at the end of the course, the participating students are asked to evaluate the course through the digital survey system; evaluation at curriculum level: through curriculum dialogues (in Dutch onderwijsgesprekken) by means of the National Student Survey (Nationale Studenten Enquête -NSE) the students will be asked for their opinion on all aspects of the

courses, teaching and the facilities.

3. Students who have participated in courses offered by the Faculty of Humanities will be informed of the results of the course evaluations.

Appendix 7 (art. 3.3) - Language Policy

For the History programme the language of instruction is English. This is a conscious choice driven by a number of factors. Firstly we seek to prepare our students for an academic world where the common language tends to be English. Following the programme in English therefore prepares them both for masters programmes, which in The Netherlands are overwhelmingly in English as well as an increasingly globalised labour market (academic or non-academic), in which the ability to write and discuss in English are crucial. Secondly our focus on Europe in the World means that we ask students to look beyond national boundaries and explore global scale developments taking place throughout history. In this context offering the programme in English is logical as it offers access to a vast array of primary and secondary sources, be they originally written in English or translated. The History programme caters to both Dutch language students as well as international students, both students enrolled in the History programme as well as exchange students. For the History BA, given the focus on Europe in the World and how the teaching of history can differ across place and time, the international classroom has a real impact on how discussions about topics covered in the programme are discussed. This confronts students with the differences between the background knowledge they each have and demonstrates to them how history can be used to different ends or interpreted differently. It generates new insights for students, both international and domestic and prepares them for an international workplace by fostering intercultural understanding and dialogue. Finally, offering the programme in English gives students access to international staff which again prepares students for working in an international environment but who also bring with them unique expertise, and who are well placed to advise students on international career trajectories or further study opportunities abroad.
