Consideration for admission to the degree programme Arts and Culture (research) requires a Dutch or foreign diploma that demonstrates knowledge, understanding, and skills at the level of a university Bachelor's degree and that shows its holder has the following specific knowledge, understanding, and skills: <ol style="list-style-type: none"> a) a high standard of academic achievement as evidenced in academic transcripts and references; b) intellectual curiosity and motivation for further research; c) advanced oral and written proficiency in English. 2. The following conditions for consideration for admission apply to the various programmes. <p><i>Programme Art History</i></p> <p>Consideration for admission to the programme Art History requires:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • knowledge of and insight in art history, and the main research issues and concepts in this field, or in a related field (such as museology or cultural heritage studies), as demonstrated by a minimum of preferably 45 EC of components in this field or an equivalent at Bachelor's level; • knowledge of research methods in the field of art history; • academic and analytic skills: the ability to design, carry out, and report both in writing and orally on research issues in the art history; • skills pertaining to the conduct of independent art-historical research in primary and secondary sources. <p><i>Programme Gender Studies</i></p> <p>Consideration for admission to the programme Gender Studies requires:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • knowledge of and insight in theoretical and foundational concepts of gender and/or postcolonial studies; • knowledge of research methods in the field of gender and/or postcolonial studies; • academic and analytic skills: the ability to design, carry out, and report both in writing and orally on scientific research in the fields of gender and/or postcolonial studies. <p><i>Programme Musicology</i></p> <p>Consideration for admission to the programme Musicology requires:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • knowledge of and insight in research questions and methodologies in the field of musicology, in particular historical musicology and/or the study of music and media; • knowledge of research methods in the field of musicology; • academic and analytic skills: the ability to design, carry out, and report both in writing and orally on research in the field of musicology;

The University of Granada is the coordinating institution of the programme. GEMMA consists of an integrated curriculum of 120 ECTS in the area of Women's and Gender Studies, which includes a compulsory period of mobility for students from the Partner Institution chosen as Home University to the Mobility University. Appendix 3 (art. 3.3) – Language Policy

Art History

One of the key pillars of our program is a transcultural approach to the field of art history. To stay ahead in this field depends on engaging with diverse scholarship, students, and faculty. In this international context, English acts as the primary common language of communication for research. Additionally, over half of our students come from bachelor's programs outside of the Netherlands and many of our teaching staff are internationally trained. Having this diversity of students and faculty deeply enriches the perspectives they bring to the classroom and allows us to participate in the most current research and transcultural approaches. English is the language that enables communication for our multilingual group. This preparation for working and communicating in an international context also provides important training for all our graduates who will continue on to careers in museums or academia, whether in the Netherlands or abroad.

Gender Studies (including GEMMA)

English is the language of choice given this programme's international character and orientation. The field of Gender Studies unfolds around international debates, publications and areas of scholarship with English often used as one of its main languages. Our programme prepares students for an international career, so acquiring excellent communication and writing skills in English is part of the programme. Our teaching staff is also international, with networks, collaborators and partners in various countries. Our student body has also consistently included a significant number of students from outside the Netherlands, which creates a space for fruitful exchange in an international learning environment.

Musicology

The RMA in Musicology prepares students for internationally oriented research careers. As English is the primary mode of scholarly communication in Musicology, the program depends on literature in English and prepares its students for internationally competitive PhD tracks and research positions. Our student body has also included consistently international students. The training provided in English-medium instruction also prepares students for careers in cultural institutions with an international or European profile, where excellent English skills are beneficial. Individual components of the program (including tutorials or work related to internships) may be completed in Dutch if desired or necessary.

Religious Studies

Academic research is an international playing field, and the field of Religious Studies is no exception. Within this international context, English is the universal choice for communication about research in this field. Moreover, a substantial part of the Master-students come in with a Bachelor diploma from outside the Netherlands, so the programme has an international classroom in which English is used for all levels of communication. Our teaching staff is not only strongly internationally oriented but also internationally trained. This setting constitutes a natural preparation for the future career of our graduates in the Netherlands or abroad, whether inside or outside of academia.
