PREPARATION	
How did you experience the exchange application process at Utrecht University?	The application process costs some time, but is fairly simple. To avoid stress I would recommend starting with the application process as soon as possible. Since you have to get a lot of papers signed sometimes you have to wait a while until you receive the signed papers and you can continue in the process.
How did you experience the counselling & support from the International Office?	Generally very good, sometimes it takes a little bit more time until you get a reply but in general the counselling and support were very good.
Did you do any language preparation? If so, what did you do?	I did a little bit of Duolingo which did not really helped me but I learned a few basic words. Prague is a very international city so with only English you will be fine. I do think it is fun to learn a little bit of Czech and the university also offers Czech language courses for beginners.
How did you finance your exchange?	I financed my exchange with my Erasmus+ grant and my basisbeurs, besides this I got a OV-vergoeding Together this was enough to finance my exchange.

	It was pretty easy to find and select courses, but a lot of the courses that I originally selected were not being taught in this academic year. Therefore I had to switch most of my courses which was a bit stressful but worked out fine in the end. I heard from a lot of my fellow students that they encountered similar situations. I would



suggest not stressing too much about it, there will be other courses that you can choose from. On the course registration day I would recommend waking up early so you can register yourself at the start of the registration hours. Some popular courses were full really quickly. For me there were enough English courses available. I ended up taking a lot of courses about Czech history and art which was a lot of fun and taught me a lot about the country I was studying in.

How was the academic quality of the courses?

The academic quality of the courses was really good, a lot of courses are fairly small which lead to a very pleasant learning environment in which there is a lot of opportunity for discussion and questions. Unlike at UU the courses usually last the entire semester which causes you to take more courses at the same time. I had to get used to this for a moment, but really did not mind it in the end.

How did you experience the counselling & support from the host university?

Really good! The international office in Prague has a lot of office hours and they were always really helpful and friendly when I needed some help.

How was the welcome & orientation programme?

The welcome program provided by ESN was really nice and a good way to get to know other exchange students. I would recommend registering yourself for some of their activities fast because they fill up pretty quickly. I tried to apply for some of their activities a few hours after the registration opened and at that time only the pub quiz was still available (which was a lot of fun though).

How was the process of finding housing? For example, was it difficult finding housing, how was the rent, was it what you expected?

I lived in the Charles University dorms during my stay in Prague. It was pretty easy to get a place there, you just have to register yourself via the university. The quality of the dorms does leave some to desire. The building I lived in was pretty old, you share a room and you share a really small kitchen with 20 people. I would definitely recommend looking up pictures of the dorms before you go to live there so you know what you're getting into. In general I really did enjoy living in the dorms, it was a really fun experience to live with some many students and share a room and I met most of my friends there. I would definitely recommend living in the dorms if you're in for a bit of an adventure but if you're not there is also rentals available closer to the city centre. These places are often a lot more expensive, but the quality of housing and the location will be better.

What did you do for leisure & culture?

Prague has a lot of things to offer, walking around the city centre and to the castle is amazing but the city also has some awesome museums (I would really recommend the National Gallery, it has multiple locations with a lot of different kinds of arts, from the middle ages to modern art). Prague is of course also known for its cheap beer and bars, which I would definitely recommend exploring. The city also has amazing surroundings, I would recommend taking day trips to Kutná Hora, Karlovy Vary and Karlstejn and Pilsen. You can join the daytrips organised by ESN or one of the other Erasmus organisations or you can plan the trips by yourself or with a group of friends. You can also take a lot of nice hikes in the vicinity of Prague, I would recommend downloading Mapy.cz, here you can find some nice hikes recommended by locals.

CONCLUSIONS

Would you recommend this university/destination to others? Please explain.

Yes I would definitely recommend this university and destination! Prague is an amazing city and I really enjoyed my time there and met a lot of wonderful people. There is so much to explore and experience in Prague and it's

PREPARATION	
How did you experience the exchange application process at Utrecht University?	The process went smoothly. Deadlines and steps to take were clearly communicated, and the amount of time it took was quite doable. The only annoying thing was that I twice had to submit a provisional learning agreement while the offered courses for the autumn semester at CU had not yet been determined, so I based those on the courses of the year before and had to redo them entirely after the enrolment period.
How did you experience the counselling & support from the International Office?	I did not make use of counselling. The meeting for interested students, as well as the pre-departure meeting were useful. I got a response to any questions I had within a few days, so that worked fine.
Did you do any language preparation? If so, what did you do?	I didn't do anything before leaving, but I took the pre-semester Czech language course, which I would really recommend. You learn to at least communicate the most basic stuff in Czech and you already get to meet many other students, so it's quite fun.
How did you finance your exchange?	Most was covered by the Erasmus grant and the Dutch study grant. However, for larger expenses I used some savings I had built up beforehand.

How was the organisational process regarding your course registration?	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Was it difficult to find and/or change selected courses? Can you say something about the language of instruction for the courses available? Which courses did you end up taking?
As said before, confirmation of the available courses for the semester happens in early September, and many courses will be removed or added last-minute to the system. Course enrolment is only in the end of September,	



<p>one week or so before classes start. Enrolment is not difficult, just make sure you enrol directly when it opens because popular courses might fill up quite fast. Overall there are many courses in English (and also some in about 10 other languages), but it varies a lot per discipline, so you might be unlucky. Most of the courses I took were in philosophy (and much more specialised than in Utrecht, which I quite liked), and I also took some courses on Czech history, culture, and language.</p>
<p>How was the academic quality of the courses?</p>
<p>I had heard beforehand that the level would not be as high as in Utrecht, but the level of the philosophy courses was quite good actually. It's more that the requirements for passing are easier for some courses, say only a short paper or multiple-choice exam. Some courses are only pass/fail, for those you generally don't have a final exam at all.</p>
<p>How did you experience the counselling & support from the host university?</p>
<p>The faculty of arts has many incoming Erasmus students every year, so they are used to it. Communication was very clear and there were office hours three times a week if you had any questions, the Erasmus staff is very kind and they always helped me immediately. You only have to accept that emails with relevant information on deadlines etc. are sent just a few weeks beforehand (and not 3 months in advance like in the Netherlands), so you just have to wait sometimes.</p>

<p>How was the welcome & orientation programme?</p>	<p>There are no activities by the faculty, but there are a few commercial organisations that organise a lot in the weeks before the courses start for Erasmus students (and during the semester), so you can always join those if you want to meet new people.</p>
<p>How was the process of finding housing? For example, was it difficult finding housing, how was the rent, was it what you expected?</p>	<p>I decided not to stay at the dorms, so I had to look for something myself, which was stressful at times because of the uncertainty, but I actually found a flat within a few weeks. I used srealty.cz, which is really the best site if you're looking for private rent that also accepts foreigners, it's not one of the many sites that focus on internationals and charge excessive rents (compared to Czech levels). The flat was very nice, also location-wise, and I shared it with one other student. For Dutch standards the rent was very doable.</p>
<p>What did you do for leisure & culture?</p>	<p>On the weekends I made many trips to other towns in Czechia, and I also went abroad a few times. Trains to many nearby cities are very cheap, so I would really recommend using your time well. Prague also has many cheap arthouse cinemas that are English-friendly. In general, I just tried to explore as much as possible of Prague, Old Town is stuffed with tourists but there are many cool neighbourhoods that are worth going to.</p>

The process regarding my course registration was not so good. I had technical problems with the system and ended up being late for the registration, which caused me to miss out on some of the courses I wanted to follow. The language of the courses are mostly in Czech but otherwise there are many in English. I ended up taking "Aristotle and Theophrastus on Soul" "Czech Language Course for Beginners" "Czechoslovakia in Global History" "	
How was the academic quality of the courses?	
This varied from course to course. Some were very advanced and even at points more advanced than my level of understanding, such as a course I took on Jewish thought which was for me a completely new field. Other courses were of lower quality than at Utrecht University, for example I took a course on art history and here we had mostly excursions and not many other requirements to pass.	
How did you experience the counselling & support from the host university?	



The support from the host university was okay. I did not need much support during my stay, I only went to their International Office once for a transport card and was helped very adequately.

How was the welcome & orientation programme?

There were not so many welcoming activities sadly. There was not really any from the Faculty of Arts itself, only through ESN but these activities were already booked full when I tried to sign up for them. There were other programmes such as Erasmus in Prague which is an external organisation and I went to some of their introduction activities but I was not so enthusiastic about them.

How was the process of finding housing? For example, was it difficult finding housing, how was the rent, was it what you expected?

Finding housing was very easy, I applied for a dorm room and was offered one quite fast. The rent was cheap for a city like Prague which was nice. The dorms itself were in an older building far from the centre. In the end this was okay for me, with the train it took me 15 minutes to the main station and by metro about 30 minutes. I liked the dorms as I made many friends there, but the accommodation was very basic so you need to compromise sometimes. The main thing I missed there was a place for social interactions or any organised social activities. It would be nice if there was a place to eat together but this was not there so people were more isolated from each other. Still, in the halls and in the kitchen you had to chance to talk to people and meet others. You just had to take more initiative yourself.

What did you do for leisure & culture?

I travelled through the Czech Republic and saw many of the other cities in the country. Otherwise I met friends for lunch, to go to bars together or go sightseeing in Prague itself. I also did sports. I went to the gyms which were of low entry price, went running at the natural park near our dorms and went to swim at the students sport centre and went for bike rides around the city.

CONCLUSIONS

Would you recommend this university/destination to others? Please explain.

Yes, I would recommend Prague and Charles University to others. Prague is a big and dynamic city with many diverse experiences to offer. I was never bored there as there is always something new to see or do. There are many events in the city, especially in the late-summer time. The city feels safe and it's easy to get around by public transport. In general the prices for things were lower than in the Netherlands, but you had to watch out not to get the tourist prices in the city, which are still the same. The only problem I had with the university was its system and the course registration. I had some technical problems which were not easy to fix and I had to get to the office in person. Because of this I was too late for the opening of the courses and didn't get into many of the courses I wanted. This caused me to follow some courses which I did not find so interesting or useful on reflection.

Do you have any additional advice or comments for students who would like to go here?

My advice for anyone going to Czech Republic would be to visit some of the other places outside of Prague as the country as many different beautiful cities and nature to offer! I would also highly recommend taking a Czech language course, as for me this really helped me connect more to the country and its people and it was very fun to learn such a different language. I was hesitant at first as it seemed very difficult but the course was easily doable and fun. Another small advice is to e-mail professors for courses that you want to take but which are full, as I was able to enter some of them through this request.

PREPARATION	
exchange application process	I have heard from many people that this was very easy and quick. Personally, I sometimes found it a bit unclear what was and was not necessary. You also need a lot of patience; responses to questions at the host university sometimes took a long time. Nevertheless, the international offices always did their best to help me as best as possible.
counselling & support at Utrecht University	The international office always helped me as best as possible. After the terrible events at my host university, I received an email from Utrecht within a few hours. It was nice to know that people at home were also keeping an eye on things. Overall, I am really grateful these people made this experience possible.

academic preparation	In fact, no academic preparation was necessary. Intuitively, the workload was slightly lower at my host university than at UU. This provided plenty of room for conversation, discussion and research. What is special about this is that I learned many times more in this semester than the first two years of my studies at home combined.
language preparation	Prague is a very international capital, so with only English you will be totally fine. I did notice that the language course at the university itself was a great addition. The small practical phrases and words helped a lot, and it is also a fun way to get to know new people.
finances	Prague is cheap, especially if you live in the dormitories. Here the rent is about 180 euros a month and expenses like groceries, drinks and other activities are quite cheap as well (e.g. 0.5l beer is around 2,50 euros and a dinner at a cheap pub can be between 6 to 9 euros). With my grant from DUO and the Erasmus grant, working was not necessary. Normally I work around 20-30 hours alongside my studies, so this gave me the opportunity to fully study for once, which I truly enjoyed.

study programme (content and organisational issues)	The study program had many features of a Liberal Arts program in which a wide range of subjects are available. The compartments are relatively small, so you can choose many different things. This also offers the opportunity to delve deeply into topics. Because of this I have learned a lot of new things in new field and on doing research.,
academic quality of education activities	Although I had to get used to the academic system of a new university, in the end I preferred this smaller-scale education more than my study program back home. If you only looked at the rankings, the UU would be ranked higher. But for those who know how these lists are created, this does not necessarily say much about the quality of education. Charles University had a very pleasant community feeling that you, as an international, are just as much a part of. Teacher and student are seen as equals, which in mine opinion is fruitful for good and effective education. Conversation was central to this.
counselling & support at receiving university abroad	This was truly amazing. Although emails were sometimes answered a little later, there was always room to drop by during office hours. Even after events at the university, everything was done to ensure that students and teachers 'got to know' the building in a safe and peacefully way. With admirable respect and patience, the university provided a safety net for those who needed it.
transfer of credits	I'm not sure about his one yet, but it seems easy. They work with a 3 to 1 system in which 3 is comparable to a 5.5 and a 1 to a 10.

welcome & orientation programme	The language course helped a lot in getting to know fellow students. The university and the ESN organize many fun activities in which you can participate to get to know people and otherwise there is enough space to talk during seminars.
accommodation	The university provides housing to international students. The living standards are a bit lower in comparison to what we are used to as spoiled dutchies. But this accommodation is very cheap and makes it possible to get to know so many fun and interesting people from all over the world. If you are not in for this little adventure you can always take a look at regular rentals in the city, those are more expensive but also closer to the centre.
leisure & culture	I was warned about the stiffness of the Czech, but I didn't notice this at all. The Czechs are traditional, helpful and sweet. The humor is cynical which I found very funny. I met a lot of lovely, nice people even though not everyone speaks English, especially the older generation (English was not taught for a long time, instead it was Russian). With some simple words and some Google Translate here and there you can go a long way, otherwise you can always do it with all your hands and feet. I think it is especially important to remember that you are a guest in this country. You will have to go along with their norms, values and culture. And if this means that you sometimes must make small adjustments in the way you normally do things. This is often very much appreciated, and it offers you an opportunity to learn more about the country where you live and study.

exchange application process	<p>The application process was a bit stressful for me as I pushed it to some of the last moments. But I did choose Prague very deliberately, especially because of the courses that it offered at the moment. (something I will elaborate more on later on)</p>
counselling & support at Utrecht University	<p>I always talked a lot with the university about questions I had regarding the grants or other information that I needed for the application which was really useful.</p>
academic preparation	<p>I didn't really have to prepare myself a lot academically, especially because the courses changed completely for me. Although I did send emails to every professor of the courses I wanted to follow to see if I needed any prerequisite knowledge, which I did not have to possess.</p>
language preparation	<p>Because I did a pre-semester language course I did not prepare myself for the language at all. If you get the opportunity to do this for whichever university you go to I would highly recommend joining such a course. Whether you will use the language a lot or not, it could allow you to make good friends quite early that may stick with you for the rest of your exchange like it did for me.</p>
finances	<p>In terms of finances I had to check a lot of things with the municipality and DUO to make sure all my grants from the government would be continued abroad. Which fortunately they did. But you should make sure to start this process in advance, in case a lot needs to be arranged (when you get extra money for whatever personal circumstances)</p>

**study programme (content and organisational issues)**

So one thing that was a bit disappointing about the exchange in the beginning was that the courses that were expected to be given at the time of applying to the university, later turned out to not be given at all. Due to personal circumstances of teachers or due to changes in the curriculum. As this was one of the major reasons for wanting to study at Charles University this was very disappointing, but luckily the courses that were given instead (even though they were completely different) were really interesting as well. I found that the courses were all very well given, the teachers were engaging and seemed properly skilled in their field of expertise. The only major difficulty with the study programme was that I did around 5 or 6 courses at the same time (for the entire duration of the semester). Which was incredibly stressful and really difficult, as I was only used to two courses at the same time at UU. But with enough planning and hard work it was doable, as the teachers were also not too strict with the grading

academic quality of education activities

As far as I could judge the academic quality of the education was pretty good. It definitely wasn't easy, the texts were (in most cases) properly discussed in class, and the information that the teachers gave us were a good addition to the material. A course called The Totalitarian Experience was especially truly fascinating as it was given by someone who was involved in the Velvet Revolution of 1989 and had a great portfolio in the government of the Czech Republic, leading to a very extraordinary class.

counselling & support at receiving university abroad

The counselling and support at Charles University was also very good, I needed some counseling at some point for the stress I was under and the insomnia I was suffering from. Which the University provided for free, and without any waiting list (for other forms of therapy there was a waiting list though). Here I sometimes talked about my issues with someone online who would try to help me make sense of the stress and help me look at it differently for example. The international office of the University was also really helpful, although sometimes when they wouldn't reply to one of my emails, I had to call them, but then they would reply to me almost instantly.

Unfortunately, during my exchange a tragedy occurred at the Faculty of Arts, the faculty I was primarily studying at. Marking one of the largest school shootings in Europe, it was a bit traumatising to be studying in a city where it happened (luckily I was not near the university at this time though). But in the aftermath, the university sent emails very regularly to offer psychological aid and therapy in various ways. Even though I never needed it, it does show that the university has a very good system of support.

transfer of credits

At the time of writing I still have to finish one of the assignments so as of now I cannot elaborate more on this unfortunately.

STUDENT LIFE**welcome & orientation programme**

So as far as the welcome & orientation programme or time period go, I had a very good experience. As I applied for the pre-semester, extra-curricular, language course, I was already in Prague at least 4-5 weeks before the actual semester began (the language course was 3 weeks, with one week of break in between it and the semester). This allowed me to make great friends in my class and who were also in my dorms (see more in the next section), that I still talk to until this day. Besides that, the faculty did not really have a welcome



programme, but the ESN in Prague was really amazing offering great activities such as parties, karaoke, or trips to cities like Pilsen (where the beer Pilsner Urquell gets made), or the Jewish Ghetto from WW2, Terizin.

accommodation

In terms of accommodation, I stayed at a dormitory from the university in a single room (due to special needs), which was truly a great experience. Sure the dorm wasn't perfect, as you still share the kitchen and bathrooms with a lot of people. And the kitchen and bathrooms left something to be desired for, but for a semester of just a few months it was very sufficient. The dorm even had a bar, at which me and my friends would spend most of our nights. But this was my experience, and specific dormitory, if you go to a different faculty, you might be put in a better or worse dormitory.

leisure & culture

As far as leisure and culture go, Prague was also truly amazing. Being a lot cheaper than the Netherlands, it was nice to be able to go out and have fun for so little money. Besides beers, tickets to the opera were also very cheap. The city sometimes also had great events such as a light festival around the beginning of my exchange, or a really entertaining New Years Eve with great activities like open-air concerts. Other special occasions such as Liberation Day were also quite a sight to behold, to see so many people in the city listening to live music and showing respect for their freedom.

suggestions/tips

An important thing that I learned towards the end of my exchange was the realisation that erasmus was not a vacation. During my exchange, I was stressed about studying too much, not enjoying my time enough or doing things outside the dorms by being stuck inside to study for deadlines or prepare for classes. But you have to remember that in fact an exchange is not a lot more than studying at home but in another country. For sure, teachers are not as strict with handing out sufficient grades or with making homework, because they understand that people are on Erasmus (at least in my experience), but that doesn't mean you don't have to study hard. Especially when you have 5 courses. So if that happens to you, don't be too hard on yourself and try to enjoy the time you spend studying (on subjects you might perhaps otherwise never have been able to do), and the time you spend outside of it.

CONCLUSIONS

would you recommend this university/destination abroad to others? please explain

Yes I would definitely recommend Charles University in Prague. The city was truly beautiful and an amazing one to live in. And the University provided great courses, although we had to attend a lot more courses than at UU. The price and location of the Czech Republic, being in Central Europe created a lot of fun opportunities for travelling to places such as Berlin, Vienna or Budapest, will also surely make your time worthwhile.

do you have any additional advice or comments?

Don't be afraid to reach out for help towards the international office of either your host university or home university. They are there to help you, and can be of great support to your questions or needs if you're in trouble.

exchange application process	First I decide that I wanted to stay in Europe and after that I looked at which Cities/Universities had enough (interesting) courses in English. Once I had that list I looked at which courses and cities I found most interesting and decided on my top-3.
counselling & support at Utrecht University	I personally did nothing special for counselling and support at UU. I visited one of the presentations about it, but I was able to find everything I needed to know online.
academic preparation	I find it hard to point out academic preparation I did actively. Ofcourse I looked at the possible courses upfront. Even though the official enrollment and choosing was once I arrived, I tried to decide which courses I wanted to take before arrival. I chose courses that I found interesting and courses that fitted with my major/study background in Utrecht, but I did not do any academic preparation. And being totally honest, it is not really necessary for Charles University/Prague.
language preparation	I was already used to having (most of) my classes in English. Ofcourse I did not speak Czech and I was never going to be able to speak, write and read the Czech language well enough to participate in courses, but thankfully Charles University offers a lot of courses in English, so I had no problem whatsoever participating.
finances	8 months before departure, I started working a few hours more every week to save a certain amount for myself. That combined with the Erasmus grant, the public transport compensation from the government and a bit of help from my parents was more than enough. In advance I created a budget thing to get a sense of how much money I needed. I used the expensens on the UU website for the estimation. These were ofcourse not entirely correct, but I wanted to avoid not having enough money or having to say no to things because of money.

STUDY ABROAD PERIOD



study programme (content and organisational issues)
I got to choose six courses I wanted to participate in. I chose to look for courses that would match with my major and study background, but I was not required to do that. I could have chosen six random courses that sounded fun. Enrollment for the courses was through the online system, which is comparable to how these things go at UU. They explained how to enroll during a presentation on our first day. It was all very clear to me and I did not have any issues enrolling.
academic quality of education activities
The quality maybe being harder is something you do not have to worry about. In total honesty the quality really is less than I am used to at UU, it was way easier to pass courses. Having six courses at the same time was something I had to get used to. That might be a bit much in the beginning, but once you're used to that it really is not that hard to pass them. In my experience the quality being less is mostly noticeable in what is expected of the students during classes, what kind of questions are asked by teachers and students and the expected quality of essays.
counselling & support at receiving university abroad
They were very easy accessible, it was very clear where their office was. Even when they had to move the office after the shooting in december it was still very clear where the international office was. I never needed their help, except for signing documents, but they were very willing to help, always had time. The only thing that takes a while is when you send them an e-mail.
transfer of credits
While writing this I am still waiting for the Internation Office of Charles University to send my transcript of records to the International Office of Utrecht University so I can not really elaborate on this topic.

welcome & orientation programme	
It was very clear when and where we needed to be for the start of the semester. And even though they (the faculty) did not organise activities, there were more than enough other organisations that organised all sorts of events. Getting to know the city on multiple levels and getting to meet new people was very well done throughout the entire semester.	
accommodation	
I found my room/apartment on accident through googling and searching the web. My room was more expensive than the one I have in Utrecht. But, in Utrecht I have a relatively 'cheap' room and in Prague the central square with the astronomical clock was only a 6 minute walk from my house.	
leisure & culture	
there is lots of very affordable restaurants, bars, museums, bus and train tickets for day trips etc etc. Prague is a great starting point for exploring the Czech Republic and the rest of Central Europe. Besides exploring central europe, I, ofcours, spend a lot of time in Prague, just living there. Going to the movies, going for a drink or a coffee with my international flatmates. Visiting exhibitions, the castle, exploring the city together or just a random walk without any goal. Prague has infinite possibilities for those that want to explore.	
suggestions/tips	
Daytrips in Czech Republic are very cheap because of the Studentdiscount you get with flixbus in Czechia. A lot of cities and little towns are 1,5-3 hours away by bus or train and I recommend visiting them; Brno, Cesky Krumlov, Karlovy Vary, Plzen, Liberec (incl Jested mountain) and Kutna Hora.	



The architecture is very beautiful and the city had loads of museums that are very affordable and easy to visit.

CONCLUSIONS

would you recommend this university/destination abroad to others? please explain

Prague is beautiful city with a huge and strong present international student population and culture. It had loads to offer you during your semester there and there really never is a dull moment. I had the time of my life, made great friends, learned a lot (about myself) and would recommend going abroad but especially this city and university. Little explanation of the finances and how they will be sorted. However, as a student from the Netherlands, DUO will help immensely. One thing UU was very informative about is DUO's travel product compensation when one is abroad.

Course registration was finalised relatively late in the semester, making it difficult to set up the during the mobility learning agreement. Some of the courses registered as 'taught' were not taught, making it important to sign up for more courses than necessary in case some of them do not come through.
academic quality of education activities
Academic quality of education activities was very good. One difference between Dutch and Czech education is that it is usual for Czech courses to
counselling & support at receiving university abroad
Counselling and support at receiving university abroad was outstanding. International office available through phone and in person the entire week. Not so fast when it comes to answering emails, but amazing when called through the phone.
transfer of credits
Transfer of credits was fast, however it took a while to receive all grades as the first semester at Charles University and second semester at Utrecht University overlaps slightly.

STUDENT LIFE
welcome & orientation programme
The welcome to the study programme came together with in person registration. Many of the other erasmus students in the University dormitories quickly bonded and it was easy to orientate oneself with the help of other students.
accommodation
Easy to sign up for university accommodation. Charles University has dormitories which erasmus students can sign up for well in advance. Important to note that the dormitories' payment system may not be used to currencies from abroad (anything else than Czech Crowns), and thus taking proof of payment with you may be important. A simple print of the pdf of a bank statement should be enough. It is normal for the dormitories to accommodate two students per room, and thus student usually have roommates. This might sound unusual at first, but it is very helpful in helping one feel less alone and overwhelmed with a foreign country.
leisure & culture
Prague is great for going out and shopping. The malls are great and make shopping a much more efficient process than in the Netherlands, drug stores have larger offer of toiletries and makeup, clothing stores generally bigger in shopping districts than in the Netherlands, night public transit makes it easier to get around after going out to drink with friends.



suggestions/tips

I highly suggest going to café Slavia, and to make sure to make a reservation a few days in advance. The food there is amazing, luxurious and fancy, for a great price.

CONCLUSIONS

would you recommend this university/destination abroad to others? please explain

I highly recommend going to this university/city. Especially coming from the Netherlands, things will seem cheaper and the offer of goods to buy is larger than in the Netherlands. On top of that, it is easy to get cheap hot meals fast. I went to the general information meeting before I applied, and after my application I also attended the pre-departure meeting. The International Office has been very helpful whenever I needed help and always responded within a few days.

The academic level at Charles Univeristy Prague is quite similar to Utrecht University, so the courses I took during my bachelors were enough preparation!
language preparation
All my courses were in English, so I did not need to do any language preparation. However, for my personal goals I took some Czech language lessons on Duolingo to just learn some basic Czech.
finances
I had money saved and I got the Erasmus grant.

STUDY ABROAD PERIOD
study programme (content and organisational issues)
I followed courses in European, American and British culture and literature, which complements the courses I took in Utrecht during my bachelor. I was able to take all the courses I wanted, except for a few which I could not follow due to schedule issues.
academic quality of education activities
I would argue that the academic quality at Charles University is not easier than at Utrecht University per se, however, I do believe that the grading system is different and therefore, it was easier for me to get higher grades than I am used to.
counselling & support at receiving university abroad
The International Office at Charles University was amazing. They were very quick with answering questions when needed and offered a lot of help when some extraordinary circumstances occurred.
transfer of credits



At Charles University, they also use a ECTS-credit system. I could take 30 ECTS with me, but subscribed for 34 ECTS in total.

welcome & orientation programme

Charles University Prague worked together with ESN (Erasmus Student Network) regarding the welcome week. There were some very nice activities, such as speed friending and free city tours.

accommodation

Charles University offers dormitory, but most rooms are shared rooms and the dormitories are quite far away from the city centre. Therefore, I personally chose private accommodation. I found my room through eramusinprague.com The rooms are quite expensive. I paid 16000 czk per month (670 euros), which is quite expensive for Prague. I genuinely believe there are cheaper options.

leisure & culture

There are so many things to do in Prague. Different organisations, such as "Erasmus in Prague", "ESN Prague" and "Oh My Prague", organize a lot of activities and parties. Even if you are not a party person (like me), there is enough to do. Public transport in Prague is of very high quality and is also almost always on time, which is great.

suggestions/tips

I would recommend to visit other Czech cities as well, such as Cesky Krumlov, Brno, Plzen, Karlovy Vary and Liberec. As a student, you get 50% off at RegioJet and FlixBus within Czech Republic, which gives the opportunity to travel around for only a few euros. Czech Republic has great hiking opportunities as well. If you have the possibility, I would also recommend visiting other European cities, such as Berlin, Krakow, Budapest, Bratislava etc.

CONCLUSIONS

The Erasmus office there does not organise anything but there is ESN CU Prague (Erasmus Student Network) which organises welcome activities. I personally did not join any organised activities. There are also organisations such as OhMyPrague that organise parties or trips for Erasmus students, but I did not go to any of them.

accommodation

I stayed in a flatshare in Zizkov which was a bit more expensive than I pay in Utrecht. I found it on facebook but as an international it is harder to find (affordable) housing. Many people first stayed in the dorms (which are cheap but you have a roommate and they are an hour away from many things in the city) but a lot of people moved out when they found other housing options. The dorms can be a good way to meet new people though and I do know people who enjoyed living with others there.

leisure & culture

I loved going to cozy and alternative cafes and there are also enough nice bars or venues that organise live music events and local concerts. As a vegan there are also plenty of options for vegan restaurants or cafes but many non-vegan/vegetarian places will not have vegan options and often the only vegetarian option in typical Czech places is fried cheese.

suggestions/tips

Cafes: Kampus Hybernska (also has an art gallery space and hosts cultural events), Kasarna Karlin (also organises concerts and film viewings), Coffice (also organises concerts), Dobra Trafika, Acid Coffee (also hosts cultural/music things), Scout Institute
(Vegan) food: Shromazdiste (vegan czech food), Belzepub, mooi bistro, Share sweet & espresso bar, Dhaba Beas (vegetarian pay-by-weight), and there are a lot of (cheap) vietnamese places all over Prague so definitely make use of that.
Thrifting: Zizkovska hrabarna, vintage shop by textile house, HipStar (more expensive), Trash vintage (also kind of expensive)
Bars, music, culture: Duende, Zizkovsiska, Rock cafe, Kasarna Karlin, Klub AVU
Other: Bohemia Boards & Brews (boardgame cafe)
I don't really go clubbing but for techno stuff: bike jesus, fuchs2, ankali

study programme (content and organisational issues)	Quite a lot of courses I had originally planned to take were no longer being taught, which was only made known relatively recent to my departure, but the eventual registration went pretty smoothly.
academic quality of education activities	The content of the courses was extensive and interesting, but the actual testing was simplistic and too easy in comparison to the amount of theory discussed. I suspect it has to do with the mixed level of the attending students (ranging from first-years to master students), and that this type of testing was intended to be a safe bet, but I personally would have appreciated the challenge. I personally tried to compensate by doing some more individual resource and reading for some of the classes.

**counselling & support at receiving university abroad**

The Erasmus office regularly kept us up to date if anything needed to happen (like documents, deadlines, or registrations). The e-mail response wasn't always fast, but the in-person visits to the office were always helpful and welcoming.

transfer of credits

The host university has a system where the student can download their own transcript, but with a simple visit to the Erasmus office they send it to the appropriate emails for me, as I was instructed to.

STUDENT LIFE**welcome & orientation programme**

Unfortunately, I got COVID and was consequently isolated during the week of the welcome & orientation programme, so I can't comment on that.

accommodation

The dorms were in good state, clean and functional, and within short distance of public transport.

leisure & culture

The city was very enjoyable to explore on my own, accessible as a non(-fluent) czech speaker and culturally diverse in cuisine. Often I would go out into the town with my roommate and some friends, and there would be plenty of bars and activities to choose from. The museums were great, and oftentimes even free of charge. Especially as an art history student I made use of that many times as the National Galleries have a very large collection.

suggestions/tips

There is not really just one thing I would suggest, as it's the general atmosphere of the city that's so welcoming and comforting, and everyone will enjoy a different facet of what it has to offer. Personally I'd say visit the national galleries, look for the little local shops and just roam the streets (I especially like Prague 7), the parks are great, the zoo is one of the best in Europe, and even though I'm not big on clubbing myself, I've been told the nightlife is great.

counselling & support at Utrecht University	Although I didn't use any support you have easy access to the head of the exchange department that can help you with your questions. For getting papers signed, the counseling was quick in replying and making sure everything was in order.

After these few weeks I got easily used to the way they organized everything and what student programmes I needed to use.
academic quality of education activities	The difference between each subject was big. Some courses expected 90% presence and others were more focused on your completed tasks. It depended on the teacher and how much in depth they would go with the



given course. Overall were the classes not too difficult. They were mainly focused on your contribution and input during the lessons. You needed to show more your interest and willingness to participate instead of doing every task completely correct.

counselling & support at receiving university abroad

There was an Erasmus office dedicated to your department where you could go to during office hours. These were helpful whenever you had a question. In contrast to emailing the university, they wouldn't really respond.

transfer of credits

I was fortunate that it didn't really matter what grading system was used, because it would eventually count as a fail or pass. I just needed to be sure beforehand to what course I was enrolled and if it was also available for Erasmus students.

welcome & orientation programme

We had one day where we had to register at the university. This is where you met fellow Erasmus students and from there on there were no activities (I believe) organised by the university itself. This made you responsible for your own engagement with the students and university. Since every student was eager to start orienting in the city it was easy to participate in different group activities exploring the city and meeting fellow students.

accommodation

I stayed in a dorm that was provided by the university. Although it's not the best place to stay since it's small and far away from the city center, I did end up meeting a lot of people here. Also the cheaper rent helped me save money for small trips during the weekends within Czech Republic or outside to neighbouring countries.

leisure & culture

There were a lot of Erasmus activities, for example many parties but also different kinds of sports. Through social media platforms or other people you were informed about these activities that were very easy to join.

suggestions/tips

I would suggest especially in the beginning to sign up for a lot of activities. In my case even though I followed more courses than the average Erasmus students I met, I had a lot of free time. Even if you have no experience in volleyball for example, it's very accessible for Erasmus students to try these new things out. You will meet a lot of new people and they will take you to other places. The first few weeks really set the tone for the rest of your stay in my opinion, so don't be afraid to approach "new" things.

CONCLUSIONS

would you recommend this university/destination abroad to others? please explain

Yes, Prague is welcoming to students from abroad. Of course it's a complete change of situation when starting to live in this city, but it's not something that is hard to adjust to in my opinion. For example pointing out the well regulated public transport or clear instructions of office hours. You were easily aware of where you stood as a newly arrived student. I had one welcome day, which basically meant collecting your student card. The faculty of Arts didn't organize any form of introduction for incoming students, so I crashed the introduction gathering of the faculty of Social Sciences, which was very nice. Luckily, Charles University did organize a welcome party for Erasmus students.
accommodation
I am very happy I didn't stay in the dorms. You can meet a lot of Erasmus students there and the atmosphere is very nice, but I really needed my own space at the beginning. I lived in a shared flat, in a building with also only Erasmus students, with four girls from different nationalities which was amazing. I paid a little more there than for my room in Utrecht, but I lived almost in the city centre which was totally worth it.
leisure & culture
There are so many activities for Erasmus students in Prague, because there are so many Erasmus students! Especially the first few months, you can go out literally every night or do welcome activities. It makes it really easy to make friends in the beginning. ESN, Erasmus in Prague and Warehouse Entertainment also organize a lot of (day) trips which I can recommend.
suggestions/tips
Find a balance in doing as many things as possible and taking care of yourself. Yes, now is the time to explore the city, the country and meet a lot of people, but it is okay to take it easy now and then. Go out of your comfort zone and try new things.

CONCLUSIONS

would you recommend this university/destination abroad to others? please explain
Definitely!! Prague is a beautiful city with a lot of history, and a lot of things to do and visit. From Prague you can travel to a lot of countries like Germany, Poland or Austria which is amazing! exchange application process	The exchange application process is extensive and confusing at times, however, when you ask questions they are sufficiently answered and any situation is clarified.
counselling & support at Utrecht University	Utrecht has a good system in place where answers are quickly provided and they try to help wherever they can, as they want you to have a good time during your exchange aswell.

study programme (content and organisational issues)	The classes I followed all provided very interesting subjects and a matching syllabus. The themes addressed were really interesting and most of my teachers were also visibly passionate about their subjects. There is a



high use of guest lectures, which is fun. Whereas Utrecht University often follows the format of one lecture and two seminars per course at Charles University, as you follow more courses at once, it consists mainly of lectures where there's a slight mix of seminar style teaching. The process of signing up for classes is mildly confusing, however, the universities/faculties communication person are very willing to help and answer any questions you have. Furthermore, the classes that i followed did all provide interesting topics, readings and assignments.
academic quality of education activities
The education system etc. at Charles University differs from Utrecht in things such as the format. I believe that if you get by during your time at Utrecht University you will be well prepared to keep up with the classes at Charles University. When keeping up with classes and doing you'll feel as though things are very doable and have more than enough time to enjoy the city of Prague and spend time with friends.
counselling & support at receiving university abroad
There's a clear point for communication and or support if needed, which is all clarified during the first week of the semester.
transfer of credits
I'm still in the middle of this process so I'm not sure, but I do know that you have to follow more classes at once to get to the required number of credits. This is because classes here do not all consist of 7.5 ect, but vary from 3 till like 10. So it's up to you to find a combination of lectures that reaches the right amount of points, either more lower ect classes or less higher (prob. little more intense) classes.

STUDENT LIFE
welcome & orientation programme
The welcome and orientation programme provided by Charles University, or ESN Prague is very extensive. Within the first 1 or 2 weeks of arriving classes won't start but introduction activities will. They range from pub quizzes to wine tasting. All in all I found that the programme allowed people to connect with one another very easily and quickly. It was a lot of fun, and I met loads of wonderful people within the first days of being in Prague.
accommodation
I did not stay in the dorms, which would be the cheaper option, but in a room I found through a website called "student-room-flat". Whereas this is definitely not cheap as rent prices, especially in the nicer neighbourhoods, are similar or higher compared to Utrecht. However, the neighbourhood I stayed in, Vinohrady, made the higher prices very much worth it. The dorms are fine, from what I heard, you're just further from the city centre and surrounding area's and more reliant on public transport and time management.
leisure & culture
Prague is a city that never bores you, there seems to be a limitless supply of bars, (techno)clubs, café's and (vegan)restaurants you want to try out. Furthermore, it is very rich in stunning parks, museums and in summertime swimming spots reached within an hour. There's a few really nice outside cinema's as well, which is perfect for when the weather is nice. The central location of Prague also makes it a really good starting place for many day and or weekend trips to cities such as Bratislava, Vienna, Budapest, Krakov, Dresden etc.
suggestions/tips
Try not to miss out on the introduction week and the activities, as that's the perfect time to meet people. Stray away from the 'Old Town' and venture into neighbourhoods such as prague 2, 3, 7, 10 and 1 (new town!!). Be careful with Facebook room ads as there's a lot of scams on there. Prague has a great public transport system of trams, busses and metro's that will get you pretty much anywhere and as a student you get a great discount for your tickets, and all of this can be very easily taken care of through the app "PID" after you receive your CU id.



Also whilst you're here, enjoy eating out if you can, as it's much much cheaper than it is back in The Netherlands.

would you recommend this university/destination abroad to others? please explain	All in all, I would definitely recommend Prague as a destination for those looking to study abroad. The city is wildly entertaining, affordable, student life is great and the central location of the city is perfect for the exploring of neighbouring cities and countries.

exchange application process	The application process went smoothly although there were a lot of documents to fill out. However, I was disappointed by how little help I received from the host and home universities with my visa application (I am British and therefore had to apply for a long term visa to study abroad).
counselling & support at Utrecht University	I attended the question and answer sessions held by Utrecht University and found these helpful. However I did not find the International Office helpful when it came to issues like applying for a visa and had to organise this by myself.

language preparation
It is important to understand a little Czech just to find your way around Prague, so I used apps like Duolingo and Babel to learn some phrases before my arrival. I also took a language class in Czech at the university which was very helpful.
finances
Generally things like food, housing, transport and entertainment are much cheaper in Prague than in the Netherlands. Therefore, I saved a lot of money when I lived in Prague. However, some things like nights out can become expensive quickly unless you are careful with your money. Additionally, although some items in the supermarket are cheaper it depends where you go and the prices are not that dissimilar to Dutch prices.

STUDY ABROAD PERIOD
study programme (content and organisational issues)
History. I took several classes in public history, cultural heritage and the history of the Third Reich, in addition to Czech for beginners and a class on Israeli society. It is important to sign up immediately for the classes as soon as they are available online as they become booked up quickly. Therefore, I had to take different classes than the ones I originally planned to take. However, I was prepared for this and ultimately enjoyed the classes I took.
academic quality of education activities
The quality of the teaching depends on the teacher and how invested they are in the class. Some of the teachers did not seem to care at all about what they taught. Others were more interested and these were the classes that were more challenging and therefore rewarding. However generally, the classes were easier than the classes I took in Utrecht. The exam format was also different as I was able to take short tests at the end of the semester for some classes, rather than handing in coursework.
counselling & support at receiving university abroad
I did not receive counselling, however the Erasmus office at the university was very helpful in certain issues for example by arranging alternative accommodation if issues came up.
transfer of credits
I took six classes and gained 30 credits.

STUDENT LIFE
welcome & orientation programme
The Erasmus Student Network organised a lot of activities to meet other people however these got booked up very quickly. I mostly met other students through my classes or through my accommodation.
accommodation
The accommodation was not in great quality but was functional. If you have issues with noise or roommates the accommodation office is also able to relocate you to another student dormitory.
leisure & culture
I had a lot of fun visiting many interesting historical and cultural sites in Prague. There is a lot to see in the beautiful city centre and also a lot happening in the outer neighbourhoods. It is also easy to travel outside of Prague to nature areas in the Czech countryside and in Germany, Slovakia, Poland and Austria. I did not ever run out of things to do because there is so much to see.

Meet people through activities organised by the ESN group. You can also make friends through the student accommodation and through attending activities organised by the university for international students.

PREPARATION

exchange application process

The application process was quite easy. The International Office provides clear presentations about the application process and the UU study abroad website also offers all the steps you have to go through. However, there are a lot of documents which you have to fill in, which at times can feel overwhelming.

counselling & support at Utrecht University

In my experience the counseling and support of the International Office was good! They generally responded quickly to my emails, and provided a guide which was very helpful at the start of my study abroad.

academic preparation

I did not need academic preparation.

language preparation

Charles University offers a lot of courses in English, so language preparation is not necessary. However, I would highly recommend the 'Intensive Czech Language Course' that Charles University provides for free, which is taught for about three weeks before the official start of the semester. During this language course, you learn the 'basics' of Czech language and also get to know other Erasmus students (who in my case became my best friends for the rest of the semester).

finances



Compared to the Netherlands, Prague can be quite budget friendly. If you decide to live in the dorms that the university provides, rent is very cheap compared to the Netherlands (about 150 euros a month). Restaurants, museums, and public transport are also generally more affordable in the Czech Republic. However, grocery shopping is not necessarily cheaper in Prague.

STUDY ABROAD PERIOD

study programme (content and organisational issues)

I studied at the Faculty of Arts of Charles University, and took a lot of courses that are related to my study field (history, international relations). Almost all of the courses I chose beforehand were not available anymore when I arrived in Prague, though there were still plenty of other interesting courses to choose from.

academic quality of education activities

The difficulty and quality of the courses were highly dependent on the teachers, though most of the courses were interesting and well-taught. Mainly, I had to get used to following six courses at the same time instead of two. If you look for more challenging courses, I would recommend taking some courses at the Faculty of Social Sciences, as these were generally more difficult.

counselling & support at receiving university abroad

The Erasmus Office regularly sent emails if there were deadlines for course registrations or documents that needed to be signed, and they were always very helpful. I did not need further counselling or support from the receiving university, so I cannot share any experience in this regard.

transfer of credits

I am still working on the transfer of credits, but got all my grades back very quickly luckily.

STUDENT LIFE

welcome & orientation programme

At the beginning of the semester, ESN organized a welcome week with lots of nice activities, such as city tours, pub quizzes, and country presentations. You have to be quick to sign up for this though! Sadly, the Faculty of Arts only organized a welcome day, which basically consisted of waiting for a long time to get your studentcard.

accommodation

I decided to stay in one of the dorms of the university, which was located about 20-30 minutes from the city centre by public transport. I personally loved it there, though it is an experience, as it is not too luxurious. Furthermore, most of my friends lived in the dorm, and it was an amazing place to meet other Erasmus students. Lastly, it was very cheap: only about 150 euros.

leisure & culture

Prague is a beautiful historical city and I would absolutely recommend everyone to study here! I loved everything about the city, from its beautiful buildings and museums to the clubbing culture. What I also really appreciated about Prague is its many parks, which are amazing places to hang out or chill when the weather is getting warmer. I would also highly recommend going to an opera/ballet, as tickets are quite affordable compared to the Netherlands.

suggestions/tips

Travelling in the Czech Republic is very cheap as a student! For instance, you can get discounts for Flixbus as well as for the public transport. I would definitely recommend visiting Český Krumlov, Karlovy Vary, Brno, and Kutná Hora, as well as Bohemian Switzerland. The Czech Republic is also located very nicely in Europe, so visiting



countries such as Germany, Austria, Poland, Slovakia, or Hungary is very easy and often cheap. Furthermore, I would recommend getting the student transport pass, as it is only 15 euros for three months!

exchange application process

Application was easy to do through the steps described on Utrecht's website. The websites of all the guest universities were not always that easy to understand, but the application itself was easy.

counselling & support at Utrecht University

Utrecht always emailed back in a short time period with helpful answers. The guide Utrecht sent us was helpful at the start of the exchange period.

study programme (content and organisational issues)

We had to sign up for courses in the first two weeks in Prague. By then the courses on the website before the summer were all gone, so the learning agreement didn't make sense anymore. The new courses were similar and fun enough to replace them, so it wasn't much of an issue.

academic quality of education activities

It really depended per course how the quality was, but overall it was well. The credits depended on the course, so obviously the quality of a 7 credit course was higher than a 2 credit one.

counselling & support at receiving university abroad

My guest university could take a month to reply to an email, and the opening hours of their physical office were unclear and kept changing. When I could reach them the support was helpful.

transfer of credits

When finishing a course the credits were put in the online environment quickly. Before taking the course it was already known how many you could receive when finishing the course, so no problems regarding the credits.

STUDENT LIFE

welcome & orientation programme

The welcome day was a very busy day and not organized well by the university, because we ended up waiting hours in a queue to receive our student cards. The welcome week was provided by ESN and super fun! It was a good way to meet new people and explore the city.

accommodation

I was put in a dorm by the university. Super cheap and a good location, but obviously not too luxurious. It was a very small double room and we had to share the tiny kitchen, toilets without locks and see through shower cabins with 40 others. It was still fine for the price though!

leisure & culture

Prague is a beautiful cultural city, and many courses also discussed this. Leisure-wise you can really fill in yourself what you want to do. A lot of people took trips to different countries, because Prague is so central in Europe, but exploring the city itself is also great because it is so big. There are a lot of art exhibitions and street festivals.

suggestions/tips

I recommend exploring the city! Prague has many parts outside of Prague 1, the city center, and all have different stories and are so beautiful. I also recommend eating at the university menza's, because they are everywhere around the city, cheap, have lots of choice and can help you avoid cooking in the dirty dorm kitchen.

CONCLUSIONS

PREPARATION

exchange application process

I found the exchange application process quite stressful partially because due to scheduling conflicts I was not able to attend any of the meetings organized by the International Office Humanities (UU). There are a lot of guides available but if you are able to, I think attending the meetings makes the whole process much less stressful. I was oftentimes overwhelmed with the different administrative tasks and keeping up with various deadlines but going on an exchange was undoubtedly worth it. I would advise talking to fellow exchange students and reaching out to your respective international office if the process gets confusing or overwhelming even if your questions might seem trivial. I started my application process quite last-minute, and I would advise people not to do that (if you can help it) for your own sanity, but it is doable.

counselling & support at Utrecht University

Before going on my exchange, I found it hard to get in touch with the International Office Humanities. I couldn't attend the office hour because of another class that had mandatory attendance and while you can always book a meeting, it seemed silly to do so just because I was second-guessing myself for example. In those cases, I would usually call but at this time (end of 2022) I could not easily find their phone number and there were no listed calling hours on the site. To be honest, even when I did reach out via email or book a



meeting (not just International Office Humanities but also another entity which helped during orientation, I unfortunately forgot which) it was kind of a coin flip whether the contact was positive or negative depending on who I was in touch with. I will say that this was during November of 2022 just before the application deadline which is pretty much the busiest time for those working with exchange students and I myself started very last-minute with my application and so I believe it was that combination which, at times, led to some slightly strained interactions between myself and some of the people working with exchange students. I believe I myself was a huge part of this too because of my last-minute application, which is also why I do not recommend it, because it's pretty stressful for everyone involved.

All that said, I think it is important to say that since coming back in February of 2024 my experience with the support from Utrecht University, especially the International Office Humanities, has been nothing but great. Their site now lists calling hours which is a big relief so I can just ring quickly them to double-check something or ask a stupid question if need be. They have been incredibly understanding and welcoming, quick to respond via email and phone, and generally just really helpful. All around just great.

academic preparation

Academically I would say I did not prepare much. My classes at Charles University were quite different than here at UU, and while I was there, I didn't regret not preparing anything on an academic level. I will say that's probably very specific to my case because I study History and took a lot of introductory classes on Central European History – the content was different, but it was geared towards exchange students.

language preparation

I did not do much in terms of language preparation. In a city such as Prague, I was really able to get by with just English quite easily. I will say that I do regret not making more of an effort to learn the language because while it was not necessary, I think it would have brought more 'depth' to the exchange experience so to speak. I did try Duolingo for a while before my departure, but I wish I would've stuck with it or taken a language class at Charles University. At the same time, Czech is quite a difficult language to master which is also what ended up taking the wind out of my sails. Nevertheless, I had a bunch of exchange friends there who did take Czech language classes at Charles University, and they learned a lot (like maybe A1-A2 level) but that's more than enough to order at a restaurant or read public transport signs. I got by with Google Translate – their picture function was lifesaving for shopping for groceries or anything else. I would say everyone inside Prague 1 (Old City Centre) not only speaks English but expects to speak English because it is so flooded with tourism. I lived in Prague 2 which is just outside of the old city centre and even though the distance between is not much, language-wise it made all the difference as everyone spoke Czech and some people I could not speak with in English. I would say this is the case for every part of Prague except for zone 1. Once again, I got by okay, but it started feeling almost disrespectful to barely speak a word of Czech. I personally would really advise anyone going on exchange to Prague to put at least a bit of effort into learning the basics of the language – either at the university or with something like Duolingo.

finances

Saying something about the financial aspect is hard. On one hand, the Erasmus fund is such a blessing and really made it possible for me to go on exchange without facing financial hardship afterwards. At the same time, I did end up spending quite a lot of money but that is probably just my personal case because I had expensive (but really nice) accommodation and can sometimes have a bit of a lackadaisical attitude towards money. Prague is quite cheap compared to the Netherlands which is nice. Especially going out to eat at a restaurant or getting a drink is actually affordable which makes it a nice experience. My friend group and I went out to eat once a week, and we tried so many cool cuisines. I think in my 4 years as a student at UU I've



gone out to eat with friends literally once because it costs an arm and a leg. I would say that for the same quality restaurant in both countries, you'd pay half as much in Prague. I usually paid around 15 euros equivalent for dinner including drinks and this is not some fast-food place but an actual restaurant. You can get an ISIC student card for maybe 10-ish euros which has a lot of student discounts all throughout the city. Museums and sight-seeing things were also affordable. I will say that most other things cost around the same in Prague as they do in the Netherlands, such as rent or groceries – although Charles University offers accommodation in the less central parts of the city for only 100-200 euros a month, which I didn't do but I had a lot of friends there who did and were generally happy with the accommodation. So, I think if you want to, you can definitely go on exchange to Prague and not spend a crazy amount of money.

STUDY ABROAD PERIOD

study programme (content and organisational issues)

I found Charles University to be a very interesting and welcoming university. They have one of the highest numbers of international students at European universities if I'm correct and it shows. They've created a lot (and I mean a lot) of classes specifically for exchange students. However, you may also join any regular classes as long as you speak the language it's taught in. Many of my classes were those made for exchange students, and I would say I generally enjoyed them. One of my favourite classes was called Czech Culture, which was an introduction to contemporary Czech history, art, philosophy, inventions, politics, literature, etc. There was a lot of room to share your own experiences with your exchange, things you noticed about the culture, and the teacher paid attention to how our exchanges were going and always opened up the floor for us to share things from our culture, find similarities and differences with Czech Culture. This is not the only class like this, a friend of mine had a course which was centred around visiting a lot of sights and museums during class time which I think is brilliant. In general, I would say there is a very wide array of courses available for exchange students which, at times, also involved content that was not accessible as at UU, for me specifically Central European History or ancient Asian/Middle Eastern archaeology. You also only need to take 51% of your credits within your own faculty, as long as you qualify you can register for courses within other faculties. There is also no limit on how many courses you can register for so you can go crazy if you like but the international office does strongly advise you not to go overboard for your own sanity.

In my opinion Charles University is a much more easy-going university than UU, which has both positive and negative aspects. Some of the positives were not being as stressed, teachers have a lot of leeway with assignments and exams because they are the course coordinator, the lecturer and seminar teacher all in one. Teachers also have the freedom to create pretty much whatever course they want which means that all of them really know their stuff and are genuinely so excited to share their interest with students which makes classes so much more exciting. Every year, a lot of courses are discontinued or freshly created. At the same time all this can be quite chaotic, partly due to their online system SIS. In the words of their international office, just a horribly organized online system from the 90s. Sometimes classes that have been discontinued are still on there, not all teachers create or update their new ones properly leading to misinformation. At the same time this is not that big an issue because you can figure out a lot of issues with individual teachers, things are just not that bureaucratic there in my view. I personally loved the chaos of it for my exchange, though I will say the structured way of the UU was nice for the rest of my bachelor for sure.

academic quality of education activities

In all honesty the quality of education was lower than what I was used to from UU but this might be the case simply because I chose a bunch of introductory classes intended for exchange students. What I found difficult



is that the classes were not very interactive. There is no lecture-seminar division, there is just one class which then usually ends up more like a lecture but (often, not always) in a seminar-sized group of people. There was definitely always room for questions and such but no discussions as I'm used to from UU during seminars. The focus of the classes was also very much on consuming content, not so much criticizing it or engaging with it on a deeper level. I would say it my courses and their requirements were easier there than those of my first year here in Utrecht. On one hand this was nice because I was genuinely not at all stressed for the first 4 months out of the 5, only becoming a bit stressed during the last month in which nearly all my exams and assignments took place, but that stress ended up being quite misplaced as all examinations were very doable. At the same time, I did find myself a bit bored sometimes because some of the classes were a bit too surface-level for me. Nevertheless, I learned so much and I do think that if you desire more of a challenge there is a lot of space for you to do so yourself, which I perhaps I should've done too. At the same time, I think Charles University understands very deeply that the exchange experience is not just about the classes, and they encourage you so much to connect with the city, the culture, fellow exchange students – basically they seemed to understand that not everything can be learned in a classroom, and to me it was clear they put a lot of value on things beyond classes. I think it made my exchange experience very diverse and actually affected me in a deeper way. There was a lot of time and space to discover new things about myself and connect with people I normally wouldn't because I wasn't stressed about classes or stuck at home doing homework. Neither were many of my fellow students and friends which made it easy to hang out often and travel or go sight-seeing.

counselling & support at receiving university abroad

I seriously cannot praise the Erasmus Office of the Faculty of Arts enough. They are superheroes without capes. You can call them any time between the hours of 9:00 and 17:00 Mo/Tu/We/Th and 9:00-early afternoon on Fridays and they have a lot of office hours too. They go above and beyond to help you. Their mailbox is always overflowing so if you need answers to anything just call, oftentimes they can help you immediately and if there is a case of signing anything they will often do it within a few hours. Their information meeting at the beginning of the year was very informative and even hilarious at some points, all I can say is they brought the clarity and guidance in the chaos that my exchange in Prague was at times.

transfer of credits

Charles University works with a bit of a different grading system (1-5 points, 1 point being the highest and 5 points being a fail) but on their site it is quite clear what each score means and oftentimes teachers made sure to explain what each grade meant when you received one. Getting the credits transferred was quite easy, also because they work with ECTS too so making sure I got the right number of credits at the end was as simple as it is at UU.

STUDENT LIFE

welcome & orientation programme

Charles University itself did not have an elaborate welcome or orientation programme, pretty much just the welcome meeting by the Erasmus Office. However, they have a bunch of very active student organizations, some of which specifically dedicated to exchange students, and they organized so many activities throughout my time there, I think there was pretty much an event every day. Really cool welcome parties, oftentimes free tickets to clubs if you booked them on time, friend speed-dating events, huge group trips to Budapest or Vienna with a student discount.

accommodation

Charles University offers exchange students accommodation for around 100-200 euros a month in huge buildings in the less central parts of the city. For example, there was one big building on the outskirts of



Prague where only exchange students from the Faculty of Arts/Humanities lived. Transport to the city centre was actually really good, about 45 mins to the university. The main Faculty of Arts building sits in one of the most central spots in Prague and is next to a major metro station and a tram line with a stop right in front of the building. Those who stayed at this accommodation lived in smaller rooms which is shared with a roommate. Important to note that you can request a private room if you can show proof of a physical or mental condition that impacts your ability to live with a roommate.

There are also a lot of other accommodations everywhere throughout the city – you will be paying more, but a bigger space which is more central can be quite nice if that's what you want.

leisure & culture

I think honestly there is always something to do as an exchange student in Prague. So many events and parties organized by other students, and then the city itself is huge and has a lot of sight-seeing options and museums. I will say besides what the students organized, the city had more things to 'see' than to 'do'.

suggestions/tips

There are a lot of different WhatsApp/Facebook groups for different exchange student associations, some of which also include other universities than Charles, I would say just be a part of all those groups and go to the events you want to. I also recommend visiting surrounding cities in Czech Republic, most of them you can definitely visit in a simple day trip with cheap Flixbus tickets or by train. There is also a lot of beautiful nature in and outside of Prague which I regret not visiting myself. As a student your transport within Prague is about 15 euros for three months – wherever you go in Prague, with whatever kind of public transport. The connections between parts of the city are really good. Outside of Prague there are a lot of student discounts on Flixbus, and I think trains too.

CONCLUSIONS

would you recommend this university/destination abroad to others? please explain

I definitely would. I'm confident in saying that pretty much everyone would have a great time on exchange in Prague because it is such a huge city and there are thousands of international students that I think everyone could find their own kind of things to do, visit and also people to meet!

do you have any additional advice or comments?

This might be quite strange advice perhaps, but I would say wherever you go on exchange, don't focus too much on getting the 'perfect' exchange experience. Perhaps this is not relevant for you at all, but I was personally constantly working myself up to have this 'perfect' experience that in my head consisted of a lot of partying and going out and doing something every day. You definitely can do all that in Prague if you want, I know a lot of people who did have an exchange like this, but for me this was just not feasible due to personal circumstances. I would even say my exchange was deeply uncomfortable at times, I think I learned a lot about myself and my life that I would have rather not been confronted with at the time but that I'm so incredibly grateful for now. A lot went quite differently than expected and I was kind of stressed the whole time that I wasn't making the most of this experience by not doing something every day. But in the end, the time I spent doing nothing was as invaluable as the time I spent doing things and hanging out with others. Similarly, I think it should be said that an exchange doesn't need to be this profound either. Basically, just enjoy it for whatever it ends up being, wherever you end up being. Bij welke uitwisseling dan ook is het altijd spannend of je wel alle juiste formulieren hebt ingevuld, en of je niets over het hoofd ziet. De informatie van Charles University is vaak net niet helemaal duidelijk, wat dat versterkt. Maar zolang je goed bijhoudt wat er in de mailtjes staat en de instructies daar opvolgt, komt het uiteindelijk allemaal wel goed. Het is bij Charles redelijk makkelijk om iets voor elkaar te krijgen, bijvoorbeeld als je eigenlijk te laat bent voor een deadline of als er ergens een foutje is gemaakt. Wel is de universiteit langzaam met reageren, dus het kan geen kwaad alles een weekje eerder op te sturen dan je in Utrecht zou doen.

counselling & support at Utrecht University

De UU reageert aanzienlijk sneller op mailtjes en heeft ook iets meer nuttige overzichten en tips. Uiteindelijk heb ik hier weinig gebruik van gemaakt, omdat alles gewoon goed liep of omdat ik problemen ter plekke in Praag kon oplossen.

academic preparation

Het verwachte niveau van studenten ligt erg laag in Praag. Ik heb zonder problemen een mastervak kunnen volgen en vond de rest van de vakken niet veel diepgang hebben. Afhankelijk van de vakken die je kiest kan je wel veel deadlines hebben, voor sommige vakken zelfs wekelijks, of grote papers. Als je je aan het begin van het semester voor genoeg vakken inschrijft kan je die in de twee weken erna nog laten vallen, dus je kan je werkdruk zo hoog maken als je wil.

language preparation

Praag is een touristische stad dus je komt niet in de problemen als je geen Tsjechisch spreekt. Soms wordt er wel erg bot gereageerd als je gewoon aanneemt dat iedereen Engels kan. Dat gezegd hebbende, Tsjechisch is een heel mooie taal die absoluut de moeite waard is om een beetje te leren (mijn Tsjechisch vak was niet erg intensief en heel gezellig), en met een paar zinnetjes kom je al een heel eind.

finances

Restaurants en dingen als musea zijn aanzienlijk goedkoper dan in Nederland. Voor boodschappen heb ik weinig verschil gemerkt. Een dorm bij de universiteit kost niet meer dan 200 euro per maand, terwijl je via particuliere huur al snel boven de 400 euro uitkomt. Er is geen vast programma, je kan je inschrijven voor losse vakken. Of je voor vakken kiest speciaal voor uitwisselingsstudenten, of iets heel anders maakt voor Charles University niet uit. Het inschrijfproces is erg stressvol, ik raad aan om een buddy te vinden die je uitleg kan geven over de website. Iedereen schrijft zich op hetzelfde moment in, dus vaak ligt de site plat en of zitten vakken binnen een half uur vol. Zorg ervoor dat je vooraf een lijstje hebt met de cursuscodes van de vakken die je wil doen, en schrijf je voor meer vakken in dan



je wil volgen. In het geval van roosteroverlap of incapabele docenten kan je dan namelijk nog wat schuiven in de weken erna.
academic quality of education activities
De verwachtingen van studenten zijn laag, en sommige docenten zijn ook ronduit slecht in lesgeven. Andere vakken daarentegen zijn heel interessant met ook boeiende opdrachten en docenten die echt weten wat ze doen. Vrijwel overal geldt dat waar je in Nederland een 7 voor zou halen een A of een 1 (in een systeem van 1-4 waar 1 het hoogst is) waard is.

The subjects I followed were generally interesting. I followed subjects at both the faculty of arts and the faculty of social sciences, which is certainly doable. Do not worry about formal requirements or signing up too much. Usually you can do every subject you want if they do not overlap. Czech students often sign in for lots of subjects before deciding which ones they are actually gonna follow, which might make queues look long.

academic quality of education activities

The quality of education was generally worse than in the Netherlands, especially the grading is not strict at all. Assignments do not take much time, especially not for 'erasmus' subjects. However, most classes were really fun and engaging.

counselling & support at receiving university abroad

Charles university had some really good support for erasmus student. All the 'hard' questions about the programme can be asked to the coordinators, who have solid answers. Teachers were usually really willing to help as well.

I had private housing that I got through family, but I would recommend finding something a couple months before departure. The dorms are quite crappy but cheap from what I saw, but lots of people still find something else after living there. Bezrealitky.com is a good website for affordable housing that czech people use while flatio.com and student-room-flat.com are more expensive but trustworthy. Expect to pay at least 400 euros a month for private housing.

leisure & culture

Prague is one of the best student cities in Europe. There is so much to do and there are so many cool places that you would never find in the Netherlands. I can recommend the honest guide youtube channel if you don't know it already, as it talks about lots of fun things to do and see in Prague.

suggestions/tips

Go travel (you will have the time, I promise ;)! Czech republic is beautiful and cities like Cesky Krumlov, Kutná Hora and Pilsen are definitely worth visiting. Visiting Bohemian switzerland if you like nature is also a most. On top of that Prague is a really good starting place for exploring europe by train. The trains are really affordable if you get a ISIC card (100% get one!). I visited Poland, Hungary, Austria and Germany for a fraction of the price I would normally have to pay.

So make sure to use all of the oppurtinies and invest the first weeks in meeting people. This can be done trough activities by ESN or different organisations, but also in your class, faculty of the broader universtiy. Some faculties also organise themselves a welcome week. The faculty of arts did only organise a library and building tour. Alltough this was quite low-key, I still met four nice people there.
accommodation
The first two months I spent in one of the dorms. This was very cheap. Alltough it was not as bad as I expected, it is not great either. You will probably share a room, the facilities are not great and everythings looks a bit desolate. Still it is cheap and everthing is old, but working. The big problem for me was the distance to the city centre. I was the end of one of the metro stops, which meant that I took me 45 minutes to get to the intersting parts of the city. After two months I started looking for something else to rent. I founded a nice studio flat in a good area, which was still affordable.
leisure & culture
Prague has a lot of culture. Make sure to vistit the national galleries, the opera, the national ballet, the churches.....



There is also a lot to do in and around Prague. ESN and similar organisations organize hikes, walking tours and day trips every week. Don't be afraid to join this, eventough you might now know anyone yet.
suggestions/tips

PREPARATION
exchange application process
The application process seemed really daunting at first. But I made as best of an overview of all the tasks as I could which really helped create order. I suppose I was lucky because I applied at the same time as a friend so we could help each other in the process.
counselling & support at Utrecht University
In my experience this was really good! All my questions (which I send via email) were always met with a quick, in depth responses.
academic preparation
For me the academic preparation was looking through the course manual of the Faculty of Arts and choosing the courses that were complementary to my studies in Utrecht.
language preparation
I did some Duolingo, and when we arrived in Prague we bought a book called "Do you want to speak Czech?". Turns out that self-study did not work too good for me because I had no frame of reference with Czech in the



same way as I would have with German. A flatmate took the intensive Czech course at the university, which was pretty succesful for her. I would recommend taking that course if you're serious about learning Czech!

finances

Beside the Erasmus grant preparation, I did little to prepare my finances. One thing that does come to mind is acquiring a creditcard, which proved useful pretty quickly because I pay my rent with my credit card.

STUDY ABROAD PERIOD**study programme (content and organisational issues)**

I took seven courses during my first semester in Prague. I took one of the ECES courses, which is a program designed for American exchange students but open for enrollment of Erasmus students. It was a course on the work of Franz Kafka, which I can recommend if you want to immerse yourself completely into the weird universe of Kafka. My other courses were split between the faculty of humanities and the faculty of arts. For this I had to make sure that my courses at the humanity building were not in neighbouring time-slots to my arts classes, for there is some distance between the buildings.

Because the duration of the courses is one semester long instead of the block system we have in Utrecht, it feels like there is more time to discuss the topic at hand. Especially for my class on 'Gender and Sexuality in Post Soviet States' it was really nice to be able to focus on so many countries and really reflect well on what we are studying.

academic quality of education activities

In my experience, the quality was definitely good, but less demanding than my courses in Utrecht. However, the teachers at Charles University that I encountered were very passionate about their courses and their enthusiasm often made for great, engaging classes. If you are looking for more challenging courses, enroll yourself in the masters courses that are also open to bachelor students.

counselling & support at receiving university abroad

There was definitely the possibility to receive support on academic matters from the Erasmus office. I have not personally used counselling, so I cannot share any experience.

transfer of credits

I am still working on this currently.

STUDENT LIFE**welcome & orientation programme**

There were a lot of possible activities in the first few weeks where you could engage with other Erasmus students. They offered pub crawls, trips all over the Czech Republic, tours of the buildings, etc. These were all optional, so I did not participate in all of them. In any case, the broad selection of welcome-activities definitely help you find your way around in Prague and helps make connections with fellow Erasmus students.

accommodation

I did not take a room in the dorms. Instead, me and some friends found a flat through StudentRoomFlat. Which is a organization that was recommended by Charles University. Whilst the prices were higher than living in the dorms, we were very happy with the stay. We had a nice flat in Žižkov, which is really close to the center. One of the nice things about our flat is that we share it with other international students. Other perks are a weekly cleaning service, dishwasher and a washing machine, a good communication with the management team! I would really recommend StudentRoomFlat to anyone who does not mind paying around 300-400 euros for rent in Prague!



leisure & culture
<p>Prague is such an amazing city for people who enjoy culture, history, and good parties! There are many museums, from which I would recommend Museum Kampa the most. The parks are very nice in spring and summer, though can be a bit bleak during winter (but that has its appeal as well I think). So you can always be close to more natural areas. If parks don't float your boat, you can take very cheap public transport to the natural parks in the Czech Republic.</p> <p>For booklovers: there are a few really good bookstores that also sell books in English. My favourite is Shakespeare and Co, located near Charles Bridge. Another great option is Luxor - Palace of Books, located on Václavské náměstí.</p> <p>The nightlife in Prague is also amazing because there is something for everyone. For who is interested, there are multiple queer-friendly places that have amazing parties. Also, I would really recommend Cross Club!</p>
suggestions/tips
<p>Get the public transport app as soon as you can! It is really cheap to get a long-time pass if you have the ISIC card. This ISIC card you can obtain at the student office at the start of your exchange. It is also useful if you want to take the train inside of the Czech Republic! For example, when I travelled to Brno, a three hour trainride, I only had to pay 2,5 euros! All thanks to my ISIC card.</p> <p>My final tip would be to befriend Czech people. It is so easy to fall into a Erasmus bubble, which is nice, but if you want to know all the good spots to go, absolutely make friends with Czech people.</p>

exchange application process



Exchange Experiences International Office
Czech Republic – Prague – Charles University

Whilst the application process seemed like quite a lot of (paper)work at first, whenever I sat down to do it it was not a lot of work at all. With the guidance from both UU and Charles University, everything was relatively straightforward.
counselling & support at Utrecht University
If I did have any questions regarding the application process, I could always have my questions answered by the International Office, often very quickly as well. My experience with this has been very good and I'm thankful for all the help available.
academic preparation
Before coming I had to prepare the list of courses I wanted to take at Charles University. I also made sure to match this with my study plan. Besides this there was not really any academic preparation I had to do.
language preparation
I barely had to do any language preparation before coming to Prague. My courses were all in English, so I had to do my Erasmus language assessment in English as well, which I was already fluent in. I did want to learn Czech whilst being in Czech Republic, which I did try, but self studying turned out to be quite difficult since I knew no languages similar to Czech yet. If you want to properly learn Czech whilst being here, I recommend taking the intensive language courses offered by the university.
finances
In preparation of coming I did not have to prepare a lot of financial stuff, besides the Erasmus application.

STUDY ABROAD PERIOD
study programme (content and organisational issues)
Whilst at Charles University, I had to take 51% of my courses at the Faculty of Arts. I ended up taking 5 courses at this Faculty, and one at the Faculty of Humanities. The range of subjects is very broad: one of the main reasons I chose this university. My courses included film, history, art history and gender subjects. Registering for courses was also very easy and well explained by the university, and is done in the week prior to when courses start. The courses I ended up taking were very different from my initial Learning Agreement, since many of the courses end up changing before the semester. Still, I had plenty of interesting courses to choose from and many were similar to the courses I had planned on taking.
academic quality of education activities
In my personal experience, the academic quality of the courses lies a little bit below that of Utrecht University, but not too much not to be academically challenging. There are a lot less contact hours that you spend in class per week (my shortest class being 1,5 hours per week and my longest class being 3 hours per week). Many of my classes had lecture and seminar formats in the one class per week, and I noticed that many are more like lectures than seminars, even if they are described to have in class discussions. This is what I missed the most compared to my classes in Utrecht. Regarding exams, I had presentations, written (take home) exams and papers. There were some assignments throughout the semester, but for me most exams were at the end of the semester during the exam period. I had to write three papers and one exam, which was a lot for me, but ultimately doable. I recommend having a good look at when the courses distribute their exams. Most teachers were very flexible with their due dates however, which made the exam period a lot more doable. This is something I miss in Utrecht sometimes and I like the way teachers at Charles University would discuss the due dates with the whole class (often, though not all the time).
counselling & support at receiving university abroad



I did not need to contact the university for support many times, only when I had question for the International Office. They were always very helpful and quick to respond.
transfer of credits
I am still in the process of doing this, but it seems like everything is going smoothly. I got all my grades back soon after the examination period so I do not have to stress about having these in time for the Erasmus grant documentation.

STUDENT LIFE
welcome & orientation programme
There was a whole week of activities planned before the academic start of the semester. Activities included tours of the buildings, pub crawls, information nights and trips through Czech Republic. I attended the building tour and an information night, which were informative. I definitely recommend going on one of the trips or the pubcrawls if you would like to meet some new people early in your semester.
accommodation
I rented a room through the organisation Student Room Flat. They have flats all over Prague for prices which are very normal in Utrecht, but considered expensive in Prague. I had a room in Prague 3 in a shared flat with 5 other students, and payed around 380 euros. Whilst my room was relatively small, the flat was quite big, well equipped and was cleaned once a week. We could also contact the landlords for repairs. You could probably find something cheap if you looked on Czech websites, but I preferred to book in English with an organisation which has English speaking staff. I have also heard of people who were able to find something through facebook groups, or through friends once that had arrived and stayed in a hostel/airbnb for the first weeks. The University campus is also very cheap, but you have to share a room and the shared rooms are said to have very few amenities and are not well kept. The university campus is a great place to meet new people however.
leisure & culture
Prague is absolutely amazing and I would recommend anyone to study here. I think it has something for everyone, from culture to clubbing. I was super lucky to find my favorite café and bar in my own street, but the whole city has great places all around. Even if you don't live in Prague 1, neighborhoods around Prague 1 and even across the river all have their own things to offer - they might even be more to your taste if you don't like living in the city center. Living in Prague is very cheap compared to the Netherlands. Visiting the opera/ballet for example was something I would do multiple times here as it was much more affordable than back home. A lot of cultural institutions also offer discounts for students, as well as the public transport. Nature around Prague and in Czech Republic is also beautiful, and very worth venturing out to. Prague is also, in my experience, very queer friendly. There are a number of queer bars, clubs and events.
suggestions/tips
Get the PID Litacka app as soon as you arrive - this is the app used for public transport in Prague. You can get tram, bus and metro tickets, as well as a transport pass on your phone with the app. For students, a pass is only about 15 euros for three months!
