PREPARATION
exchange application process
Because I did an internship and Erasmus, my application proces was a little different. I applied for the internship (Dutch as a foreign language, NVT Nederlands als vreemde taal). After I was accepted, I had to sign in for an Erasmus grant, which was rather easy, just took some planning.
counselling & support at Utrecht University
Because I was doing different things, I didn't really have one person who would help me. Sometimes this was a bit difficult. However, if I asked for help, I always got a quick and helpful response.
academic preparation
I mostly prepared for my internship, all the courses that I followed were easy to follow with the knowledge form my degree so far.
language preparation
I did bilingual education and english IB (international baccalaureate) in secondary school and followed many of my courses in English at University, so I didn't need to prepare my language for erasmus. I did learn some basics in Hunagrian, which proved to be helpful.
finances
I made an overview with my parents with my expenses and income for the period spend abroad.

STUDY ABROAD PERIOD
study programme (content and organisational issues)
I had to sign up for courses. The signing up was rather easy once I understood the website (and was able to log in), but I could not read any course descriptions, so it was a bit of a gamble. All my courses worked out together, but I heard from others that it was easy to change course if necessary.
academic quality of education activities
I think the education was adequate, though slightly easier than in The Netherlands.
counselling & support at receiving university abroad
The person who was in charge of Erasmus students at my faculty responded quickly and efficiently to questions.
transfer of credits
This all went well.

STUDENT LIFE
welcome & orientation programme
If you study in Budapest, make sure you get an ELB-card. They organise many different activities (all year around) where you can meet a lot of students. The university also had a couple of tours, pub crawls and other activities.
accommodation
I booked a room via Erasmusu. The location was perfect and the room was rather nice, but other than that it was not a very pleasant experience. From a home owner who used our kitchen as his lunchroom, the modifications to the house that were not mentioned in the listing (there was an extra room above the kitchen), the dirtiness of the house due to construction that were not cleaned, agreements that were not kept, being woken up by police and immigrations officers at 06:45 in the morning (they arrested one of my flatmates), me being forced to move, then (after I said I would move even though I did not agree with the way this was discussed) not having to move and still waiting on my deposit. Erasmusu is no help. Fortunately, someone from my internship (who has ties with the Dutch ambassade) is helping me.
leisure & culture
Budapest is absolutely beautiful. There is much to discover when living there.
suggestions/tips
Get an ELB-card. Make time, especially in the beginning, to meet new people. Have fun, and try to see a lot but also try to just live in Budapest. Find some rhythm and your favourite spots so you can relax during all the chaos that is Erasmus. Also, it is very easy to only speak to people from Erasmus, I would highly encourage you to talk to others as well.

CONCLUSIONS
would you recommend this university/destination abroad to others? please explain
Yes. Budapest is beautiful and a lovely city to live in. It is busy yet there are many quiet places, there are a lot of people from different cultures, countries and backgrounds. ELTE humanities is a beautiful campus (all courses are held in the same small campus in the middle of Pest). I would say that education is of about the same level as in The Netherlands (you do have smaller classes which is really nice!), but the standard for marks is a bit different (it is very easy to get high marks).

PREPARATION**exchange application process**

The exchange application process took quite some time but wasn't too difficult. I also did an internship, which meant I first had to get accepted for that position before I could start the rest of the process. The most time consuming part was definitely filling out all the Erasmus forms.

counselling & support at Utrecht University

Before I got accepted I had a meeting with the exchange coordinator at the UU. They helped me out well and gave me all the information I needed. It was easy to make an appointment with them. Other than that I didn't need any support, and was only in contact with the UU when some documents needed to be signed.

academic preparation

For the internship, which was a Dutch as a second language internship, I followed a course called 'Nederlands als tweede taal in het onderwijs'. This gave me some theoretical knowledge on NT2 education, which came in handy during the internship. Other than that I didn't do any academic preparation and I don't feel like I needed it.

language preparation

I followed some Hungarian lessons at a private institution. This was not necessary at all, but I like learning languages and wanted to be able to hold a basic conversation from the start.

finances

Finances were rough sometimes. Inflation in Hungary is among the highest in Europe, making the 240 euros from Erasmus worth substantially less. I had applied for the financial top up, but unfortunately I just finished this process, meaning I didn't receive the money during my stay abroad. I was able to earn some money by being a student assistant and by tutoring a child. Sometimes finances were a bit stressful, so I would advise to save more than you think you'll need.

STUDY ABROAD PERIOD

Hungary - Eötvös Loránd University (Budapest)

study programme (content and organisational issues)
I followed four courses: a Hungarian for beginners course, a course on phonology, a course on linguistic typology, and a course with guest lecturers from around Europe, lecturing about a topic related to the Dutch language. At the beginning it was not exactly clear what all subjects entailed, which meant I had to substitute one course because it, apparently, was an introductory course on linguistics.
academic quality of education activities
All of my subjects were interesting and taught by knowledgeable and kind lecturers. One of my subjects was quite challenging because it was a course building on knowledge that I didn't fully have yet. However, I managed to complete it well. Sometimes I did feel like the expectations the teachers have are lower than in the Netherlands.
counselling & support at receiving university abroad
The international office at the ELTE was always kind and responding quickly. At the start of the year they organised a full day with introductory talks, which was nice.
transfer of credits
My credits have not been transferred yet. However, I think this will work out just fine. I obtained 33 credits during my stay abroad.

STUDENT LIFE
welcome & orientation programme
During the first week of the academic year the university and ESN organised several introductory events, both formal and informal. It was a nice way to get to know the university and practical matters as well as meet other Erasmus students. ELB is another big organisation that organised an introduction camp and several other activities at the start of the year.
accommodation
It was easy to find an accommodation in Budapest. I had already gotten a room a few months before I left the Netherlands. I found it via the site erasmusu. The rent was a bit on the high side for Budapest, I found out later. The accommodation was fine, and the location was great. I lived together with 3 other Erasmus students.
leisure & culture
Budapest has a lot to offer to students! There are many bars and clubs which are open every day. The restaurant scene is great as well, and relatively cheap. The city has many great museums, and day trips to other cities are easy and affordable. On top of that many sports can be practiced via the university.
suggestions/tips
If you go on an exchange, make sure you find a good balance between social activities and exploring the city and relax time for your self. And obviously enjoy the city, the culture, and the university life!

CONCLUSIONS
would you recommend this university/destination abroad to others? please explain
Yes! The university has many interesting subjects to choose from, and many languages that you can study there. The international office is great in helping you out with about anything, and the teachers are kind. Budapest is a fun city to live in, and to me the cultural differences were very interesting.

PREPARATION

exchange application process

The application process is a little bit confused but if you save all your emails fairly straightforward. The UU International Office is very helpful and so is the one in Budapest. Waiting on emails or confirmations can be a little stressful, but both universities clearly try their best to streamline the process as much as possible. In the end I was surprised at how little effort it was.

counselling & support at Utrecht University

The International Office is very helpful and quick to answer, whenever I had a problem they helped me within one or two days

academic preparation

There was no academic preparation necessary.

language preparation

There was no language preparation necessary, as ELTE offers classes in English

finances

Hungary is cheap compared to the Netherlands so living there is either cheaper or about the same as you are used to back home. Any money I spent outside my usual expenditures were trips within the region, which are not necessary for your education. Any money I saved beforehand I used for these trips, otherwise my student loan and Erasmus Grant were enough to pay my food and rent.

STUDY ABROAD PERIOD

study programme (content and organisational issues)

I followed three history courses and one philosophy course. The history courses centered around the development of medieval cities, geopolitical debating exercises and state socialism in Hungary. The philosophy course was on civil disobedience. The Humanities Department is small but well run, so I had no organisational issues. Generally, everyone at ELTE is helpful and speaks English.

academic quality of education activities

While the teachers tend to be very knowledgeable on their subjects, Hungarian education is of a lower level than I was used to at the UU. For all of my subjects I managed to get a 5 out of 5 with minimal effort. Back at

home i think i would have gotten anywhere between a 6 and 7,5. The level of the classes themselves vary greatly per teacher and is a bit of a gamble.

counselling & support at receiving university abroad

ELTE has a well functioning international office that is very responsive to student's needs. I encountered no problems in support or communication.

transfer of credits

Very easily done by just following the instruction on the UU site.

STUDENT LIFE

welcome & orientation programme

The introduction week at ELTE was handy but otherwise limited to the bare necessities. ESN and ELB, private student organisations, organize events every day to get to know your fellow students. While these events may not be to your taste (drinking/partying) they are good opportunities to meet other Erasmus students and I would recommend going to them (for at least the first week).

accommodation

Via the site of SRS I found a decent room in Pest on the edge of the Jewish Quarter for 300 euros a month. Otherwise you can look on facebook or other sites. I found it all very easy, cheap and straightforward..

leisure & culture

Budapest is a very international, big city so it has everything one expects in a international, big city. There's endless bars and restaurants to explore (both extremely cheap), museums, the beautiful architecture you can find in the city (no second house is the same), any sport imaginable can be found, you can hop on a flixbus or train and visit Vienna or Bratislava (3 hours), Belgrade, Zagreb or Ljubljana (6 hours) or any other city in Hungary itself. Short version: It's impossible to get bored in Budapest. There is always another unique bar to find, restaurant to eat at, cool neighbourhood to explore or just go to any of the amazing places you already knew. Also, the food is very unique, combining Jewish, Magyar, Turkish and Balkan cuisine is a very good idea.

suggestions/tips

Bars: Fekete Kutya, Aurora, Lampas, Vintage Bar,

Restaurants: Köleves, Dobrumba, Drum Café, Retro Langosh, Papa Frici, El Mulino and many many more

Other: Go to as many places in the region as possible, go to the Hungarian countryside, walk around Buda and Pest when you have some spare time; there is always something to see or enjoy, take a tour of the parliament; it's hilarious, look out for the endless amount of weird concept bars.

CONCLUSIONS

would you recommend this university/destination abroad to others? please explain

I would absolutely recommend it to others but there is one important thing. If you want an academic challenge this is not the place. Education here is very easy and can seem a little bit unprofessional. However, if you are looking for other things in your exchange like intercultural exchange, the experience of living in a different city for a while or any other motivation than education Budapest is a great option.

do you have any additional advice or comments?

Not really. Though beware that Hungary is very much a different country, more so than any other European nation I've been to. The language and culture are very unique but also, by extension, very closed. You will not have a shot at integrating or feeling as part of the culture without serious time investment into language

courses and even then I doubt it will be possible. This is not a negative thing, as I found the estrangement an attraction, but something that should be kept in mind.

PREPARATION
exchange application process
The application took me quite some effort because I had to write a proper motivation letter. However, applying for Erasmus is easy, it only takes a bit of time. But before that, looking for the right courses wasn't easy. I was messaging with my coördinator abroad back and fort because the courses were changing all the time, the same for the ECTS that came along with them. Once I had my courses selected, the process went quite fluently.
counselling & support at Utrecht University
Utrecht University offers a good help by selecting your destination by giving information days where you can ask everything. Furthermore, they're easy accessible by e-mail and always reply fast. Also with signing documents which can come really in handy.
academic preparation
On academical level, there wasn't really much I had to do because I could go on exchange as part of my free courses. Ofcourse I had to sort out what courses I wanted to take and how many ECTS they would get me. And they had to be approved by the Exam Committee.
language preparation
My courses would be in English. At Utrecht University I already took a lot of courses in English, so it wouldn't be hard for me to adapt on that level. But for the Erasmus grant everyone has to make a language test. You won't be denied for exchange if you fail, which took some pressure off. But it was an interesting indication for me personally. Because at the end I did the test again, and I was so proud when the results indicated that I actually improved my English to a C1 level.

Hungary - Eötvös Loránd University (Budapest)**finances**

I think the concerns about this aspect depends on which country you go on exchange to. Hungary is overall quite cheap compared to the Netherlands and the West of Europe. In preparation, I calculated how much I would get and how much I could spend. Sadly I forgot to get the money from my Student travel product (Student OV). I was too late to sort everything out in DUO. So pay attention to that because you've to put your OV on hold, in person at a machine / and look at all the forms you've to fill out.

STUDY ABROAD PERIOD**study programme (content and organisational issues)**

I had to take courses at the Institute of Art Theory and Media Studies because of the agreement between UU and ELTE. The classes were only once a week and 1h and 45 min. which is different from the UU. One class of mine was really interactive and I had to make a video which made it easy to engage with the topic. In the other classes the students had to listen mostly. Ofcourse there is always room for questions, but the way of teaching was not really encouraging to engage with the topic.

academic quality of education activities

One of my classes was not going in depth with the topic. It was about Fake News, but at the end the test was only four general questions about it. The other courses asked more from the students. One I had to write an essay (like I also had to do a lot at UU), and the other one I had to hand in assignments every class and make a video. How much you will learn about the topic really depended on the teacher in my experience. But ofcourse it also depends on yourself.

counselling & support at receiving university abroad

I didn't need much of counselling or support, so I can't really give my opinion about that. Although they give you information where you can go if you have questions.
I also had a student mentor at the beginning, met him once and he didn't answer my questions anymore. I guess you've to get lucky to get one who'se really engaged.

transfer of credits

At ELTE they have a different grading system. Instead of 1-10 they have 1-5. 5 being the highest, 1 is failing, and 2 is passing poorly. I had to get used to that. But I passed all my classes with a 4 or 5. I still have to get the credits in Osiris though. But be sure you get your transcript of records before you go home, it might save you a lot of trouble. But the teachers at ELTE are really relaxed, so if you're not on time, it will definatly be oke at the end. But it might take a while before they reply your messages.

STUDENT LIFE**welcome & orientation programme**

The oriëntation week was helpful to find the way at the campus, to get to know some faces and to know what you have to do while staying in Hungary. E.g. public transport card, student card, deadlines etc. There were some activities, speeddating and scavenger hunt for example. During these events I met all my friends there. The point of speeddating is to get to know a lot of people in one evening. Our table just stayed at one place, which was really fun. The next day the scavenger hunt, I met even more people which I still am in contact with.

accommodation

Before I left I had trouble finding a flat. I assigned myself for dormrooms, but they were already full. So if you want a dormroom be on time. At the end I didn't mind at all. Because the thought of sharing a room without having space for my own, made me nervous. For around a hundred euros more a month, you can easily find a room for your own. As I said, I had trouble finding a room which was because I didn't really trust facebook posts

etc., but there are enough other options if you want a room beforehand. I read in a UU report like this, that someone just went there, booked an hostel and found a place while already being there. So I decided to give my mind some rest, booked a hostel with the idea to hunt for a place in real life. And how lucky was I! The third day I came in contact with a guy through facebook. It was a flat with two guys and I was invited to look for the room at the same night. I decided to arrange a meeting in the morning because I didn't want to go there in the evening by my own, better be safe than sorry I thought. I went there in the morning and the same night I moved in, close to the Astoria hotel, couldn't have wished for a better place. The guys became such good friends and we had a lot of fun together, we even went a trip to Berlin together. Still we are in contact and making plans to visit each other. And now will always have a second home in Budapest!

It is really easy to find a flat in Budapest. It's totally different from Utrecht. My flatmates (in Budapest) have now even trouble finding a new flatmate, what was mindblowing to me. So, just do whatever feels good for you and don't feel rushed finding accommodation. In the end it will all work out!

leisure & culture

To be honest, I had more than enough of free time since the bar at ELTE was lower than I was used to at UU. Which also worked in my benefit regarding school work, because when I had to study or projects to finish, I got really excited and engaged. In my free time I participated in events from ESN, where I met most of my friends. Later on in the semester we didn't go to much ESN events anymore because Budapest is such a lively city with loads of other things to do. Bryan Adams gave a free concert on Heroes Square, Lampas is great to hang out and listen live to new upcoming artists, Neverland and House Bar are places where they have open mic and in summer there are great bars with places outside like the Grunt. But also in winter bars as Udvaroom and Fuge have loads of games you can play. When the weather was good, we hung out near the river, listened to music in parks or played soccer at Margaret Island. Also, I played soccer (as a course from ELTE) with Hungarians and played squash with a friend at a squash centre. Concerning party's, Budapest is perfect as regards of Techno music. The scene is getting bigger although it's not fully tolerated by the government. So, there are also a lot of party's you have to look for a little better, but they're amazing if you're also interested in that genre. And ofcourse, every Monday was Morrisons Monday, crowded with international students. Which is a really great opportunity to meet new people. But don't expect too much of Morrisons itself, the first time it's amazing with all different rooms and music, but after a while it's getting a bit boring, unless you're with great people of course.

I also had the luck that my flatmate works in tourism so he knew a lot of fun places to go. Once we went on the scooters through the entire city, from Buda (the Citadella, Fisherman's Bastion) to Pest (Deák and all the other parts of the city). The city feels so homy, the centre is not that big and really good to walk (or take the bus or metro for some parts), but overall I did a lot of steps everyday.

suggestions/tips

The city has so much to offer, the best way to discover all its beautiful things is to go explore with your friends (or on your own). Look on facebook and follow all different kinds of pages so you know about all the different activities and events. Take your 'me time' when you need it, but say yes to all the adventures.

CONCLUSIONS

would you recommend this university/destination abroad to others? please explain

To be honest, I wouldn't choose ELTE again for my studies. However, I would definitely recommend Budapest to anyone who is looking for a place where it is super easy to meet other internationals and where there's always something to do. Even though it is a bigger city than Utrecht, it feels so homie with all the cute streets, cafés, bars and the beautiful architecture.

do you have any additional advice or comments?

exchange application process	
It is a lot of paperwork that you have to do during the application but also after. It is a lot, but if you just follow the steps the UU provides for you it is quite easy.	
counselling & support at Utrecht University	
UU gives very good support and clear overviews of what you need to do and when. If you don't know something you can also send a mail to the office and they will reply really fast and help you as much as they can. All my questions were answered really well.	
academic preparation	
I did not do any academic preparation. This was mostly because all the courses I wanted to follow did not belong to my major. Everything was new for me and I decided to go with the flow. Also because I went to Budapest and the academic level there is not as high as in the Netherlands.	
language preparation	
Before my time abroad I already knew a few words Hungarian and while I was there I learned more. This was only convenient during grocery shopping and when I accidentally bumped into someone on the street. In all other cases English and Dutch were sufficient to use and I was already able to speak both.	
finances	
For me the finances were very doable - I even saved money here because I worked as well. The prices in Budapest are not that high so you can easily go for a coffee or out for dinner. But also not too often of course.

study programme (content and organisational issues)	
It was not hard for me to find courses that I wanted to follow. The Osiris-like system they used was not very clear for me at the start. Then they organized a lesson about it, which was really helpful and I never had any more questions after that.	
academic quality of education activities	
I expected that the quality of the courses that I would follow here in Budapest would be less compared to the courses I follow in Utrecht. This was partly true. It just really depended on the teacher and not on the courses itself if it was high quality or not.	
counselling & support at receiving university abroad	
It was very clear for me where I had to go if I needed help. My own counselor and the one for every Erasmusstudent were very helpful and they could explain what you wanted them to.	
transfer of credits	
This all went fine as well. The amount of points were not always comparable to the amount we would get in the Netherlands. Though it was easy to talk with the teachers and asked them if they would agree to another point total. In one case I had to do another assignment, which was fine.	

STUDENT LIFE	
welcome & orientation programme	
The welcome and orientation programme was very nice! A lot was organized, fun things but also informative activities. This was also the moment where I met some friends which I kept seeing the rest of the semester.	
accommodation	
I had a really nice room in the centre of the city. You do pay a higher price for this compared to when you live more in the outskirts of Budapest. I paid 300 euro for my room each month and had a shared kitchen (5 people) and bathroom (2 people).	
leisure & culture	
I think Budapest is one of the best cities in the world. You can visit the touristhotspots many times and never get sick of them. There are many thermalbaths, each time you go you can try out a new one. There are many many teahouses and coffeeshops - which sell coffee for low prices compared to the Netherlands. You have many places to go partying at night. For erasmus students they organize special parties each week.	
suggestions/tips	
Everything the Erasmus student network organizes is really nice - but I would also recommend to get out of this international bubble and get in contact with the Hungarian people/students. This really completed my Erasmus exchange. They can tell you a lot about their culture and country, which other cities you should visit and about the nice, secret teahouses.

PREPARATION**exchange application process**

I started my application process back in November, when I wrote a motivation letter for the NVT internship. Then, I completed my application in Osiris for the first of December and uploaded a signed Study plan, and later on, I uploaded my signed Learning Agreement and Grant Application. This was by times a bit stressful. I did not always know where to find the right information, and I did not always have the overview of all the steps I had to take to have a succesful exchange. Sometimes I felt a bit lost, but I learned to keep track of deadlines and to send emails with questions when I did not figure it out by myself. I considered it a personal challenge to meet deadlines without getting stressed about it or feel hatred about it.

counselling & support at Utrecht University

Whenever I had a question, I felt like I could always email the International Office. I usually received an answer on my questions within one or two days. The staff members were really supportive and collaborative.

academic preparation

I did not especially prepare myself for my exchange on an academic level. In the month before my departure, I was in contact with Emmeline Besamusca, the coordinator of my internship, and the two predecessors that already completed my internship in the two semesters before me. They told me about the academic culture in Budapest.

language preparation

Before I left The Netherlands, I filled in the OLS (Online Language Assessment). My level in English turned out to be C1. I did not take any extra classes.

finances

I subletted my room in Utrecht to a friend of mine. My room in Budapest was more expensive than my original one in Utrecht, but with the Erasmus grant and the monthly compensation for not being able to use my student product for the public transport in The Netherlands, I was able to cover all my fixed costs. In the months before my exchange, I saved up a bit of money to travel around Europe during my stay.

welcome & orientation programme

study programme (content and organisational issues)

Welcome & orientation programme (for some reason, I was unable to add text in the textbox considering this topic): The Orientation Week basically consisted of two days, Monday and Friday. Thursday, there was the official opening ceremony of the semester, which took about an hour. On Monday, we were told about the university (including the networks that organise events for Erasmus students, like ESN) and about the things we needed to modulate by ourselves, like the Guest Student Application Form and the Transcript of Records. We were also shown around the campus. On Friday, there was a practical training to work with Neptun, the system they use in Hungary (comparable with Osiris), and we needed to register for subjects. The Orientation Week was a good way to find my way around the university and to get comfortable with all the new things, but mostly, it was a great opportunity to meet a bunch of new people that later on became my friends.

Study programme (content and organisational issues): There were enough courses to sign up for as an Erasmus student. In the first weeks, it was even possible to switch courses and go to seminars you did not originally register for, as long as the teacher signed the Guest Student Application Form that you needed to hand in at the International Office at the end of February. That way, it was easy to pick courses that fitted my interests.

academic quality of education activities

The quality of the academic education in Budapest was absolutely not the same as on my home university. For every course, there was a 1.5 hour lecture each week. The teachers did not expect you to read any literature on beforehand, which seemed strange to me. In the course description was written what you needed to do to pass the course, but the teachers changed it during the course (they did that already before corona). Also, instead of receiving a grade that matches the effort you put in the course, almost every student got an 5 out of 5.

transfer of credits

The staff member from the International Office in Budapest was really nice. She answered all my emails super fast and was always very collaborative. When I emailed her and asked for my Transcript of Record, she replied to me the same day and also sent the ToR to the Examencommissie from my home university. I felt like the transfer of my credits went really smooth.

CORONAVIRUS CONSEQUENCES

support guidance of host university

My host university already closed before I left the country and up until this day, it did not reopen yet. Therefore, it was not a problem that I headed back to my home country. The courses were continued digitally and my Transcript of Records was sent to me and my home university by email.

support guidance of home university

I was already hesitating to go back to The Netherlands, when my home university sent me an email with the message that I was strongly advised to return back home. I was really glad about the clarity of the message and

decided to book a flight back home. Back in The Netherlands, I still wanted to complete my courses, so I went through with the online seminars and my internship. Therefore, I did not have much contact with my home university, but there was enough information about the new situation in the emails that I received.

online offer and quality of digital courses

The quality of the digital courses was, honestly, not that good. Hardly anybody really showed any engagement during the online lessons. I think that it was extra hard for people to participate because of the language barrier. The teachers were not prepared for the digital courses and did not seem to enjoy them. I feel like they needed more support from their own university to be able to teach via Skype/Zoom.

suggestions/tips on digital exchange

For teachers: instead of asking difficult questions in the online seminar that nobody really dares to answer, make sure that the students hand something in (like a short reaction on a thesis or question) on beforehand, so that you can ask them about an explanation during the class and start the discussion a bit easier. It also makes is easier to check the effort that students put in your course. Speaking about online meetings (on Skype/Zoom), I feel like it is better to ask your students to enable their webcam, to make sure they are involved. I do not think any student will participate in an digital exchange. I would not recommend it, except for things like a (NVT) internship, where you work together with your colleagues and the students very closely.

CONCLUSIONS

would you recommend this university/destination abroad to others? please explain

Budapest is an amazing destination for a semester abroad. I have only seen it from February to March, but it never bored me. There is a lot to see and the city has a rich history. There are multiple universities in Budapest, so you'll meet a lot of people in different ways.

When it comes to the university and the courses, I would say that the amount of knowledge that you learn depends on your own commitment. If you keep up with readings, even if they are optional, and ask the teacher about things, you will learn a lot, but you can still pass the course when you don't do that. That might be a pitfall for some students.

do you have any additional advice or comments?

During the application process, it might be a good idea to give students an overview of the things they eventually need to modulate, and the steps that need to be followed. That way, students applying for an Erasmus exchange experience more ownership of/during the process, and they know what the next step will be and when they will be completely ready. That way, they will feel less insecure about the process.

There are so many different courses to choose from in the English and American department, thus there is obviously some sort of difference between the quality of the courses. Some courses are even given by phd students, which is very cool because their courses are about a small niche in literature they love and want to discuss. However, they may not be as proficient in English or good in teaching as some of the older professors who have been teaching for years. academic quality of education activities
The academic level was a bit lower than what I'm used to. Classes feel more informal. Teachers tend to talk more since many students don't speak up. Furthermore, the courses are very flexible.
