exchange application process	I found the application process quite easy. You just have to follow the instructions and make sure you hit the deadlines, and when you do it all goes very smoothly.
counselling & support at Utrecht University	I discussed my doubts about going abroad with someone from the international office once. She helped me with some practical information, which was helpful. For more personal advice I would suggest asking your student advisor.
academic preparation	I did not do any specific preparation before going to Budapest for my semester here.
language preparation	I also did not do any specific language preparation. If you are not comfortable with your English skills you could maybe do some preparation, but in my experience, everything will go fine once you actually start living your life abroad and are forced to speak English.
finances	I saved up some money before going here, but to be honest life in Hungary is way cheaper than in the Netherlands so in combination with the Erasmus scholarship there is not much to worry about money wise.

study programme (content and organisational issues)	When I arrived here it turned out that I could not do three of the course I had planned on doing. This was because of some overlap in the timetable and because one course was not given this year. I had to make some

last minute changes, but this turned out alright. My advice is to pick more courses you like before going so that you have multiple options when arriving here.
academic quality of education activities
The academic quality of the education is quite low compared to Utrecht University. There was hardly anything to prepare before classes and also the classes themselves were not very challenging. The subjects were interesting though, and I found it especially interesting to see the Hungarian point of view by the teachers and the experiences and opinions of other international students. I think you need to accept that the quality of teaching is going to be lower than in the Netherlands, but that doesn't make it a bad learning experience.
counselling & support at receiving university abroad
The international office at the Hungarian university was very helpful and quick with signing needed documents and helping out with questions. There was a counselor introduced to us in the first week. I did not see her myself, but I believe it was possible to schedule appointments with her to talk about how you're doing and struggles you might have.
transfer of credits
The university was closed around the time I ended my stay in Budapest, so I had to wait until the middle of January until I could get my ToR. I got really high grades in Budapest but they are transferred to a 'pass' in Utrecht, which I think is fair considering the difference in quality.

STUDENT LIFE
welcome & orientation programme
In the first week there was an orientation week in which we got to know the university and other students. There were some talks about Budapest and the student life at this specific university and we did a tour around the city. I met a few nice students there, but apart from that I did not really engage in the Erasmus student life.
accommodation
I found an apartment through a facebook group with two other internationals, which was really nice. There are some websites (also offered by the university) on which you can apply for apartments with other Erasmus students. I think that this is the best way to find a social life. You could also go for the student hotel / dormitory, but I would not recommend that. It is outside of the city and the social life there is not great.
leisure & culture
Budapest is a very vibrant and cultural city. The Erasmus organisation organizes events and parties almost every day, so if that is what you like you're set for the semester. Me personally, I did not really like those types of parties so I found my way around the city apart from Erasmus. Budapest is a nice city with cultural events and a lot of nice bars / cafes / community centers in which you can hang out and meet new people.
suggestions/tips
If you like partying and hanging out with the other Erasmus students I would suggest you invest in the people you meet in the first week. Make whatsapp groups and ask them to hang out etc. If those people are not really your type of people it takes a little more effort to meet people. I met people through my flatmates, queer facebook groups and community centers (like Golya and Aurora). Also; bumble friends is a really good option to meet other internationals who are new in the city.

CONCLUSIONS
would you recommend this university/destination abroad to others? please explain

**Hungary – Károli Gáspár University (Budapest)**

I would not recommend this university because of the great academical courses I have followed, but I would recommend this place if you are looking for a nice semester abroad. Budapest is a very diverse city, with people and places for everyone. It is not so much the university I learned a lot from, but moving abroad and building a new life there has been a great experience. I would suggest going abroad to anyone and I have really enjoyed my time here in Budapest.

do you have any additional advice or comments?

One thing last thing you need to take into account is that the semester is said to last until the end of January (like in Utrecht) but in practice I was already done in the middle of December. I would have liked to stay a little longer, so if you are also looking for the 5 month semester, Karoli might not be the best university for you.

When you arrive you can register for several courses, the university has many options so for everyone something interesting. I followed two courses about Hungary. - Modern Hungary in a Changing International Arena

## language preparation

None. I already had a B2 level in English which was enough too do a exchnage in Budapest. My Englisch improved definitely.

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finances
The Erasmus scholarship. Via the UU you can apply for an Erasmus scholarship. And if it is necessary you can get a loan from DUO.

academic quality of education activities
Better than I expected, the English of the teachers was most of the time also good. I learned a lot of new things. It was not very complex, but better than I expected. All the experiences with my four teachers are great, they are all really kind and helpful.
counselling & support at receiving university abroad
Really good, everyone was so kind, you get really fast reactions on your questions and they are really willing to help solve your problems.
transfer of credits
24 ECT, I already had my bachelor's before going to Budapest. That is why it was okay to follow only for courses and get 24 ECT.

STUDENT LIFE
welcome & orientation programme
Very warm and if I compare it with other universities in Budapest (from what I heard) the welcome programme is very well organized. For example, we did a big tour through the city by bus and we had a workshop to learn the basics of Hungarian which was fun.
accommodation
I lived next to the parliament. I was very lucky with my apartment. I found the apartment 2 months before my arrival on facebook in a group for students who search for apartments. I lived with 2 other Dutch girls, one German girl and one Spanish girl. I loved my neighbourhood. I paid 315 euro excl each month which was pretty fine.
leisure & culture
Really nice, the people are most of the time welcoming. Most of the people can be a little bit shy, but if you get to know the people they are really nice. I would really recommend to go to the museum House of Terror. In this museum you will learn a lot about the history of Hungary and you will understand why older Hungarian people not always be happy. Of course it is really different if you compare it with the Netherlands, but you will learn a lot.

There were a lot of courses you could choose at Károli Gáspár University, the curriculum was well prepared and organised.
academic quality of education activities
The academic quality wasn't that high. I think that in the Netherlands we are used to a high level. Here it was different, with the least effort I got an excellent. I am not going to say that that is a problem but it was a little frustrating sometimes, mostly when they could be said so much about a certain subject and/or the literature and the teacher just did not know or the students had no proper basis to have a conversation about it.
counselling & support at receiving university abroad
The counselling and support was there when I needed it. Not that I needed it much but they there were also very quick with answering to e-mails etc.
transfer of credits
Directly after I got my last grade, they emailed the Transcript of Records to Utrecht University so that they could implement the grades.

exchange application process

Overall the exchange application process was not hard if you follow the deadlines and make sure you figured out which classes you want. The exchange office provided a lot of information making it a smooth process.

counselling & support at Utrecht University

I did not need a lot of counselling, but found that the exchange office at Utrecht University always is quick to respond with useful information.

academic preparation

The signing up for classes happens when you've arrived in Budapest, so you won't have to prepare a lot. Do make sure you've figured out which courses are available for the semester as you have to fill in your learning agreement.

language preparation
The language used at the University in Budapest is solely English, so there is no preparation needed. It is recommended to try and learn some Hungarian, as most people in Hungary don't speak English fluently.
finances
If you have all your documents ready in time it is not hard to apply for the Erasmus grant. Do not forget to temporarily cancel your public transport card.

STUDY ABROAD PERIOD
study programme (content and organisational issues)
The content of the courses differed from course to course. Some courses were quite superficial while others would go more in depth. One thing I noticed is that the way exams are shaped often isn't communicated well to the students, making it hard to prepare for exams.
academic quality of education activities
The academic level in Hungary is a lot lower than in Utrecht, so the studying itself isn't that hard.
counselling & support at receiving university abroad
The exchange office at Károli was very helpful and quick to respond. They made sure you had all the information needed.
transfer of credits
The transfer of credits was an easy process.

STUDENT LIFE
welcome & orientation programme
There was an introduction week organised by the University giving us lots of information about how things worked/ how to enroll in classes etc. There wasn't really an orientation for the courses but the online website has enough information for you to figure it out yourself.
accommodation
It is possible to receive accommodation from the University, which is around 100 euros per month. However I heard from other students that the shared rooms are quite small and the student flats are at least 30 minutes by public transport from the city center. I found my room through an organisation. I started looking in November so I was quite early, but this made it that I had lots of options left.
leisure & culture
Budapest is a busy city with lots of things happening everyday so there always will be something fun to do. I did not experience a big culture shock living here.
suggestions/tips
When studying in Budapest I would definitely suggest joining the 'Erasmus Life Budapest' organisation. They host lots of activities, and it's an easy way to meet exchange students outside of your own University.

## exchange application process

Exchange application progress was quite easy. Not too many thresholds. Budapest actually was my sixth choice in destinations. so don't put too much effort in picking one. where ever you go you will have a good time!

## counselling &amp; support at Utrecht University

Clear preparation. One or two meetings about what to expect and how to deal with the cultural differences. Beforehand a meeting was scheduled with all students going to eastern european countries. it was very nice to talk about it and there were a lot of good ideas shared in the meeting.

## academic preparation

Again not too much work. I signed for courses once a arrived. as my exchange was not within the same faculty I had the freedom to pick which ever courses I wanted. followed some sociology, some history and studied Hungarian language. Would recommend them all.

**Hungary – Károli Gáspár University (Budapest)**

language preparation
None. As most of bachelor courses were given in English I had the right preparation for the language level given at the courses. You should not focus too much on this. Even when your English is not outstanding you will be able to manage your way through. I experienced a lot of people with way way way worse English levels, especially French and Spanish.
finances
Eramus scholarship (280eu/month). As the EU supports exchange programmes within the EU you can apply for a grant. this consists of about 280eu a month, but it depends on which country you're attending. because prices in hungary are extremely low this scholarship is lower. This scholarship combined with DUO or others funds will be sufficient. One should be able to live with about 600 - 700 eu a month.

STUDY ABROAD PERIOD
study programme (content and organisational issues)
5 courses, each 6 ECT, from different faculties. Two sociological, two historical and one linguistic course. These courses lasted the whole semester. Courses I followed: the sociology of organizations, the renaissance in florence, introduction to social network analysis, hungarian language for absolute beginners and past and present of budapest
academic quality of education activities
Very good, high standard, almost comparable to Utrecht Universitt level education. Not very complex though.
counselling & support at receiving university abroad
Outstanding, very cooperative and willing to help solve problems.
transfer of credits
30ECT, this actually was a very tiring process. UU did not directly accept my courses taken. Took about four mails with the examencommissie and three attempts in Osiris. Please realize that although the exchange university is part of the UU exchange program list, this does not assure that your courses will be accepted by UU.

STUDENT LIFE
welcome & orientation programme
Very warming, both by university and student organization. Highly recommend to apply for Eramus Life Budapest student association. Great friendships and adventures came from the activities organized by them.
accommodation
Downtown Apartments Budapest, bit expensive but very clean and good service. Recommend to book an airbnb or hotel during the first week. During this week you will be able to find a flat with others.
leisure & culture
Awesome. Very welcoming. Stereotype of mid-eastern European as not welcoming and closed is partly true. What I mainly learned is that people tend to be closed in first but once you get to know someone, this can be seeing them a second or third time, they tend to be way nicer and comforting compared to someone from the Netherlands. You sort of have to break through a barrier.
suggestions/tips
Join ELB (eramus life budapest, check their Facebook and Instagram in advance)

**Hungary – Károli Gáspár University (Budapest)**

During the preparations, the International Office of Utrecht University guided me through the process. Everything was explained step by step and they were always available for questions. Utrecht University also organized a lot of information lectures, to give us an idea of what we could expect. These were very helpful too.
academic preparation
I did not do academic preparations, because the level of education is much lower in Hungary.
language preparation
I did not do a lot of language preparations. I needed to get the B2 level in English, but I already reached that by then.
finances
To finance my exchange, I requested the Erasmus scholarship. Moreover, I saved some money before and I requested a studentloan. Lastly my mom paid me a monthly amount to help me. I did not have any problems with money during my exchange.

study programme (content and organisational issues)
<p>During my stay, I took five courses:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>- Hungarian Art History</li> <li>- 19<sup>th</sup> and 20<sup>th</sup> Century Hungarian History</li> <li>- History of Ancient Iran</li> <li>- Public Relations</li> <li>- Hungarian Language for Absolute Beginners</li> </ul> <p>All courses had a credit of 6 ECTS, so 30 in total. I chose these courses, because I wanted to get to know more about the country and language. I chose the course Public Relations, because it is out of my comfort zone and it was a nice opportunity to challenge myself. I chose the course History of Ancient Iran, because I am very interested in the Middle East. I liked all of the courses, but they were very easy. I would prefer to be challenged a bit more.</p> <p>I had to apply for the courses through the Neptun system, which is similar to Blackboard. I had no issues with the application. The courses itself were very chaotic. Most of them did not offer a syllabus, so the organization of the courses was very unclear. It turned out I just had to get used to this, because after a while it went fine.</p>
academic quality of education activities
My experience is that the quality of the courses was not very high. The content was interesting, but there was not a lot of pressure. During the course 'Hungarian art history' we visited a few museums, which was a very nice experience. I loved to evaluate and analyze the artistic works of Hungary.
counselling & support at receiving university abroad
Also the Erasmus office of the receiving university communicated very clearly. They sent me emails regularly, to keep me updated about new forms we had to fill in. The university organized an introduction week and explained the system (although it was chaotic).
transfer of credits
We received our grades through the Neptun system. In Hungary they use a 1-5 scale, with 5 as the best.

Besides the introduction week that the university organized, the student union also organized events to welcome us. For example, they showed us around the city and planned a big welcome party. They were very welcoming and open for all questions.

**accommodation**

When I arrived in Budapest, I went to a dormitory I applied for. However, I did not like the place. It was too far away from the city centre and not cozy at all. It had no wifi, too little showers and toilets. I therefore decided to look for an apartment. I found a very nice place in the city after one day already, a flat with three flatmates. I enjoyed it a lot there, because I had a close relationship with my flatmates. The communication with the landlord was a bit difficult though. He did not react to our texts, for example. Besides that I had a very good experience in this accommodation.

**leisure & culture**

Budapest is a great city to party, relax and explore. The city is famous for its public baths, where you can relax and enjoy the view. Furthermore, there are ruin bars in the centre, which have an industrial appearance and an amazing atmosphere. Also the 360 bars are worth a visit, because they offer a beautiful view of the city. Margareth Island is a great place to relax. It is filled with old trees and wide fields, so it is an amazing site to chill with friends. There are festivals hosted in summer too.

There are a lot of cultural sites to visit too. The parliament of Budapest is the second biggest one of Europe and has a majestic appearance. Second, the museums are worth a visit too. At the Buda side of the city are some great buildings, like the Buda castle and the Fisherman Bastion.

**suggestions/tips**

- Visit the ruin bars.
- Go for iceskating in winter in the citypark.
- Chill on Margareth Island
- Visit Balaton Lake (outside Budapest)
- Make sure you form a network in the beginning of the semester.

This went oke. There is a nice scheme where you can see what you have to do and when you have to do it. Just make sure you pay attention to this, and to all the deadlines so make sure you start on time. I think when you're motivated to go abroad, you will have no problems with this because you're excited about organizing everything.
counselling & support at Utrecht University
The UU is very much willing to help you, so if you're in doubt or you have a question, send them an email. But I think you can find all the answers to your questions in the documents they provide. The only thing I'm not happy with is that I proposed 4 courses in my Learning Agreement, because I thought I was supposed to have 4 per semester (like at the UU), and apparently I had to take 5 because you only get 6 ECT per course at my university in Budapest. Would've been nice if somebody would've told me that the amount of courses/ECT could differ per university.
academic preparation
I didn't really know what I could prepare on the academic parts. I knew the education level would be lower, so I wasn't nervous about the level being too high or the exams being too hard. The only important thing is that you have to realize that the education probably will be different, like in every country you will go to.
language preparation
I didn't do any extra courses to prepare my language. My courses were in English, and when you're following a Bachelor at the UU you automatically have a B2 level. You can also download a language app on your phone like duolingo, to get used to the language of the country where you're going to live in.
finances
I had to make a financial plan, which maybe feels a little bit unnecessary but it's actually nice to have an overview over what incomes and what costs you have. I saved some money before going, and worked at the faculty of Dutch at my University.

study programme (content and organisational issues)
The first week there was an introduction week, where you met all the other international students, you walked through the university and city, and met students from there. I was really excited about the courses I signed up for. At my arrival 1 course was cancelled, so I asked which course was similar. The course they said was really different than what I expected and I did not really enjoy it, but I finished it anyway. The other three courses were interesting. Before I arrived I was a bit nervous about the university being too Christian, but during my stay I didn't notice anything of it.
academic quality of education activities
The quality of education is not really high. I had one teacher whose English was really good, but the other two teachers were bad in English or their English was hard to understand because of a strong accent. Some of the courses were quite oke, but some seminars existed of a teacher almost reading a powerpoint to us. In the semester we had one week of 'Trainingsweek', where you could choose what you wanted to do. They offered really interesting things, like a lecture about the Brexit or a visit to the National Hungary Museum.

The university had a international office. They were always there to help me and responded quite quick to my emails. I didn't really need them that much, but it was nice that they we're there. When I left I had to go there to get things signed, which was done in 2 minutes.

The transfer of credits went really easy. I send an email to the international office, and the week I left I went there to sign my certificate of attendance and get my transfer of credits. She send it to the UU while I was sitting next to her, so we were sure it all went well.

There was a nice orientation programm, where you had lectures about how the university works, to which people you have to go depending on the question. You got linked to a 'buddy', but I didn't do anything with that actually. It was also easy to get to know the other international students because there were activities and groupo projects to get to know eachother. In the evening there were some parties you could go to.

**accommodation**

I had a really nice accomodation in a nice area in the center. I really think you should search for a appartment with other international students, instead of living in the dorm. The dorm is far away from everything, and there are a lot of affordable appartments. I found mine through a Facebook group of Erarmus Budapest and lived with 2 french girls, 1 german guy and one dutch girl. It was amazing and i really felt at home. I paid around 330 euro's each month. The only stupid thing was that the deposit was really high; 600 euro's.

**leisure & culture**

The city is amazing!! There are so many nice places to go in the city; musea, café's, festivals, performance, hikes. I loved going for walks around the city, because I always saw new things everytime I walked somewhere. It's also really nice to visit other countries/cities around Hungary. I've been in Bratislave, Vienna and Prague and some smaller villages around Budapest.

**suggestions/tips**

Go and see the sunrise from the Gellert hill or from the castle. It's the most beautiful and it's really quiet around you. And do evening walks along the Danube, it's the best. And because Budapest is really cheap, it's also really easy for your friends to come visit you there.

**CONCLUSIONS****would you recommend this university/destination abroad to others? please explain**

I would recommend this city to everybody. It's really beautiful, there is a really big group of international students, it's a cheap city and really upcoming. There are more and more events and things to do everyday. ## exchange application process

This was okay. The problem for me was that I did not receive the correct information brochure and for that reason it was quite hard for me to figure everything out. I still managed to arrange everything and it should not be too hard once you have received the correct information. It can be a lot of work and quite confusing because you need so many different documents. It is really helpful to organise all these documents in a structured way from the beginning. It would be nice if they made it easier with the signing of documents. So make sure you email everybody on time if you need documents to be signed.

## counselling &amp; support at Utrecht University

They were great. During the times that I did not know what to do because of the lack of information they really helped me out and made sure the receiving institution replied to my emails and provided me with everything that I needed.

## academic preparation

I had no clue what to prepare for so I did not really do any preparation. I wanted to get more into psychology and almost only chose psychology classes. I knew the level of education would be lower in Hungary so I figured it would be easier to get into psychology classes here than it would be in my home University. I saw the exchange more as a first introduction for me into psychology.

## language preparation

I did follow an academic English course before I went on exchange. For the Dutch students this is probably more a way to gain more confidence about your skill level and it can be helpful to refresh your mind but most students will probably also be fine without it.

## finances

Hungary is a relatively cheap country to live in. For me it was comforting that I saved up a lot so I at least could pay my rent for the entire time abroad. I saved up enough and could do everything that I wanted to do here. The only thing I wish I had taken more into account was to save up some money for trips.

## study programme (content and organisational issues)

When I read the course content I got really excited. There were a few courses that looked really interesting and I was looking forward to them. When I finally started at the University the courses that I was really excited about were a little bit easy at times. They did not go into depth as much as I would have liked them to have. Besides this I did still enjoy them. Other courses did surprise me in a positive way. The University that I

attended to is known for their practical teaching. I really enjoyed this especially because I do believe my home University is being too theoretical at times. The content covered in the courses was overall good.

The organisation was okay. The introduction week and the buddies were great and this was all well organised. The University itself is quite messy though. They do of course help you out with everything that you need and they explained the Neptun system, but they also cause unnecessary emails and work. The email communication was not that great. First of all it can take quite some time for them to reply and sometimes you even need to send them a reminder to reply to you. Beside this they send me a lot of emails about a Hungarian student card. They made it seem like it was something mandatory, but my own student card from my home University worked just fine and not taking one saves you money. It is just a little bit annoying that they keep mail you reminders for the renewal of the student card. The thing that bugged me most was the emails from the Neptun system message tool. This system was linked to my own email but then I would receive a few emails every week. The problem is that all these messages/emails are in Hungarian. So you have to translate the every mail just to find out that most of them are not relevant for you at all. Later on I just stopped translating them. I think the University should provide emails and messages in English to the Erasmus students and only send them stuff that is relevant for them. The final problem with the message tool is that teachers can message you, but you cannot reply to them. You also can't find the regular email addresses of the teachers online so sometimes I had to wait a week until the next class to ask the teacher a question.

**academic quality of education activities**

I really enjoyed the practical courses that I attended it was a refreshing new way of learning. In my case I noticed that I really remembered theories better because I learned them in a practical way. I also had some more theoretical courses and those could be a little bit disappointing in their academic quality. One of the things that really caught my eyes was that some teachers were not used to critical thinking. (Some teachers were open and used to it but there was a big difference in quality between teachers). They did not really know how to respond at some critical questions and when a discussion was encouraged the teacher would already have stated his opinion about the matter. Something that does apply to every course is that the content is very one sided. I am used to reading different scientific papers and then think about them and be critical about them. The read papers might even contradict each others point of view. During my exchange I would just be presented with the conclusion and it got stated to be the truth. Some courses tried to show different views and contradiction opinions but this would not often go beyond an attempt. I do remember one time when the teacher tried to have a discussion about the credibility of a mental disease but most students were not able to participate because they did not have any background information on the subject. In addition, the teacher had it long made clear what his opinion was. Not every class was like this, because some teachers were great and they gave you room for discussion and encouraged us to think critically but the differences between teachers was huge.

**counselling & support at receiving university abroad**

I did not need the University to help me out a lot. They signed my papers and replied on my emails which could sometimes take a while. The buddies were great though they help you with everything from the neptun system till the best places to go out drinking. The other thing that I noticed was that the teachers were really supportive. You could ask them anything and I even had one teacher that would start every class by asking how we were enjoying our stay, the university and if we needed help with anything. If we did do practical psychology exercises the teachers would also make sure that the classroom was a safe and trusted environment so everybody could really get into the exercises and open up.

**transfer of credits**

I did not receive my transcript of records though but they do work with different credits here so I am not sure yet.
