**PREPARATION**

exchange application process
There is a lot of paperwork to be done for an exchange, which was more work than I expected. Luckily, the signing of forms and sending of emails is quite spread out over the duration of your stay. You will be reminded by the universities and Erasmus when a form or deadline is due, but you have to closely keep track of the application process yourself as well (the timeline of the International Office will help with that).
counselling & support at Utrecht University
The support of the International Office is very good, although it may take a while before they respond when it gets busy during the semester. I always felt like I could go to them with any questions I had and they are always happy to help you.
academic preparation
I did not really prepare academically for my exchange in Cork. The university courses are on quite a high level at UCC, but they pretty much equal the courses of Utrecht University back home so there is not that much difference in academics.
language preparation
Aside from the mandatory English placement test, I did not prepare before my stay in Ireland. You will obviously need to speak English rather well, but the language used during courses does not differ that much from English courses given in Utrecht. They do speak Irish in Ireland, but it is not necessary to learn that when you already speak English (though UCC does offer special language classes for beginners in Irish when you first get there, which I heard is quite fun!)
finances
Going abroad is quite expensive, even when you try your best to keep the costs to a minimum. I would say that the costs of living in Ireland are quite similar to the Netherlands (which unfortunately is high everywhere because of the current economic situation and inflation). However, rent in Ireland is incredibly expensive due to the ongoing housing crisis (which is where most of the money I saved up went). I saved up by loaning from DUO

and working, I canceled my student OV product in exchange for a public transportation grant and I applied for the Erasmus grant. However, the money from Erasmus covered not even half my rent, so definitely make sure to save up money before going to Ireland.

## STUDY ABROAD PERIOD

study programme (content and organisational issues)

At Utrecht University, I study History of Art. In Cork, I could basically choose whatever course from the Humanities department that interested me. I chose to follow two art history courses, to compare their studies with my own back home. My main focus, however, was to follow courses about Ireland and learn more about its history, culture and people. In the end, I signed up for a course on modern Irish history, an introduction to Irish literature and a course from the architecture faculty about (the Irish) landscape. Signing up for courses was very easy and fun, they offer a range of different subjects at UCC and I heard good things about a lot of them from my friends!

Because you have to gain a certain amount of credits, you do have to take a lot of courses at the same time (I did 5), which can be very intense at the end during the exam period and with the writing of essays (so take a good look at the academic requirements and testing methods).

academic quality of education activities

The level of teaching and academics is high at UCC, comparable to that of Utrecht University I would say (though many of my courses were relatively easier, because they were aimed at internationals). The teachers are very passionate about their subjects and open to answering any questions you may have.

counselling & support at receiving university abroad

The UCC international office is very helpful and responds relatively quickly. At the beginning of the semester, the university organises a few orientation days where you can meet other (visiting) students and get to know the city and the university a bit more - they were very fun! UCC has a good student network of clubs, unions and societies as a whole, so you won't feel lonely during your time in Cork.

transfer of credits

I am still awaiting my test results, but I think the transferring of credits will go smoothly.

## STUDENT LIFE

welcome & orientation programme

Like I said earlier, the university organises a few orientation days which are really helpful and fun. It was very nice to meet with other international students so early on and it is incredibly interesting to hear everyone's stories about their home countries!

accommodation

Unfortunately, accommodation in Cork is incredibly difficult to find and was almost a dealbreaker for me. I started searching very early on, but once I was finally accepted to stay abroad in Cork, I was still too late for signing up for most accommodation services (the Irish students had already sold most of them out). UCC does offer accommodation to certain students, but they do not have enough room and I found that they fell short in giving me the support I needed to find a place & were very uncertain/slow about the distribution of rooms. In the end, I managed to find a privately rented room via StudentPad (which was useful, but you can only sign up for it with your student number - which you do not get until the very end). My rent was luckily not that high, but I would say paying 1000 euros a month for a student room is currently the standard in Ireland, because of the ongoing housing crisis. The whole proces of finding a room in the end proved very stressful for me, so definitely be aware of that and start searching very early on (and save up quite a lot of money beforehand).

leisure & culture
The culture of Cork, and Ireland in general, is UCC's main selling point for me. There are pubs with live music everywhere, there is a lot of art spread throughout the city and the people are incredibly friendly. Cork as a city is quite small, which makes it easy to navigate and allows you to truly make it feel like home by knowing every street and corner of this charming city. It is perhaps less beautiful than other Irish cities such as Dublin, but living in Cork will really allow you to experience what living in Ireland and Irish culture is like. The student life here is great (although night clubs always close at 2am!). Definitely look up some of the local festivals and activities, such as the Jazz festival and the film festival if you're there in semester 1.
suggestions/tips
Definitely join some clubs and societies, UCC has a lot of them and they are a great way to connect with other (Irish) students. Most of the sport facilities of the university are free and very accessible: the clubs are completely welcoming towards beginners, which means you can try out sports you would never have done back home (I did archery and mountaineering for example). The Cork international student group is also incredible: they organise a lot of nice events and trips, which allows you to explore Ireland with fellow internationals and connect with people from all over the world!

<b>CONCLUSIONS</b>	
would you recommend this university/destination abroad to others? please explain	
Yes, I would definitely recommend Cork and UCC as an exchange destination. Although the housing crisis makes looking for accommodation very tough and the weather is perhaps not always as lovely as other Erasmus exchange places, UCC is a great university with a beautiful campus and Ireland has an incredibly rich culture to explore. Living in Cork will allow you to experience first hand what it means to be a young person in Ireland nowadays and will give you a great starting point to explore other places within the country as well. There is a very active student life at UCC, with lots of clubs, unions, activities and societies. And ofcourse, the pubs of the city are not to be missed (Beamish is better than Murphy's in my opinion, but you have to find that out for yourself haha)!	
do you have any additional advice or comments?	
If you're up for it, I would recommend to get a bike to get around the city (f.e. via an app such as DoneDeal). The public transport system of Ireland can be a mess. Though Cork is a very walkable city, a bike proved very useful for me. And if you love nature, definitely bring your hiking boots!

## PREPARATION

### exchange application process

The exchange application process was relatively straightforward. After completing the application at UU and getting confirmation about being nominated with UCC, they emailed me with the further steps. These included the learning agreement and some online steps. The complicating factor is that you will already need to consider which courses you want to take, but you do not yet know whether the courses will actually be available in the upcoming academic year.

### counselling & support at Utrecht University

I did not need any additional counselling from UU, but in general the support was pretty good. Emails were always replied to in a timely matter and the international office was able to answer any questions I had.

### academic preparation

The academic level at UCC is comparable to or even a bit easier than that at UU. Even though I took courses unrelated to my Bachelor at UU (PPE), I was still able to enter the modules I wanted to take and did not experience any difficulties with the level of the courses at UCC.

### language preparation

My Bachelor at UU is in English and all courses at UCC are also taught in English, so I did not really need preparation for the language at UCC. In general, if you are able to read and write in academic English you will be more than fine.

### finances

While the prices in the supermarket etc. in Ireland are pretty comparable to the Netherlands, student accommodation is a lot more expensive. Expect to pay 600-1000 euros a month. For me, this was a lot, but luckily my parents were in a position to help me out. Outside of that, the Erasmus grant covers a lot of the cost of living, especially if you have some savings.

## STUDY ABROAD PERIOD

### study programme (content and organisational issues)

I took courses in art history, film studies and philosophy. All of the courses consisted of two one hour lectures a week. Some teachers really used both hours as a lecture, but most also made time for discussions in class, which was nice. In general, I would say the teaching is a bit less interactive than what I am used to at UU. I also did not have to do any group work, but obviously this will depend on your courses. The fact that courses go on for the entire semester was also new to me, so I had to adjust to that compared to the block system at UU. The content of the courses was good, but sometimes quite different from the description in the book of modules. In general, everything was relatively straightforward in terms of the syllabus, readings, lectures and assessments.

### academic quality of education activities

Obviously not all teachers are equally good, but most of my courses I really enjoyed and I feel like I learned a lot. And all teachers were clearly qualified. I thought it was really cool to get the opportunity to do courses in film studies, which is not really available at UU. Generally, the level is a bit easier than at UU, but it really depends on the course and whether you already have some background knowledge on the subject.

### counselling & support at receiving university abroad

The people from the international office at UCC reply fast and will help you out where necessary. I did not require any special counseling, but the support for me was adequate and comparable to the interactions with UU.

transfer of credits

As I have not yet received my transcript of records, I cannot comment on this, but seeing as UCC is in the EU I do not expect any problems in this regard.

## STUDENT LIFE

welcome & orientation programme

There is not really an elaborate orientation programme, there were just two information sessions hosted by the international office where you get to know more about the university, the courses and a bit about the student life. If you are there for the autumn semester, the nice thing is that all student organisations like the clubs and societies are having intro sessions, so there is a lot going on on campus to get you introduced, but it is more for first year students than international students specifically.

accommodation

I stayed in an accommodation called Melbourn Point, more out of necessity than because I really wanted to, because it was the only accommodation that let me book for 1 semester only. There is housing from the university, but they cannot guarantee that you will get a place so I did not want to risk it. In general, the accommodations are expensive, up to 1100 euros a month. The benefit of a place like Melbourn Point is that everything is included in your rent and there are a lot of Erasmus students living there, so you will probably be able to make some friends there. However, in terms of atmosphere and location it is not amazing.

leisure & culture

Cork is a relatively small city, so there is less going on than in Utrecht in a regular week. However, there are events such as the Jazz festival and a film festival and there are quite a few pubs which you can visit. Most of my leisure activities came from the clubs and societies at the university, which are all completely free to join. So it is really easy to try out new sports and hobbies and it is also a nice way to make some friends and get to know some Irish students.

suggestions/tips

The clubs and societies are really nice! In the end I spent a lot of time with them. Also, there is an account on instagram, @corkinternationalstudents, which organises parties and day trips, which is nice for getting to know other Erasmus students. It is a nice way to get set up when you have just arrived and don't know anyone yet.

## CONCLUSIONS

would you recommend this university/destination abroad to others? please explain

I would definitely recommend the university, the campus is beautiful, the courses I did were very interesting and the clubs and societies are really nice. However, when coming to Cork do take account of the fact that it is smaller than Utrecht, so your options in terms of events and cultural things are a bit more limited. Ireland is a really beautiful country to explore, but the public transport does not work amazingly well, so that might sometimes also limit your options.

do you have any additional advice or comments?

The exchange is a perfect opportunity to try new things so I would advice to choose a destination where you feel that you can do so, whether in terms of academics, sports or hobbies, or something else! Ireland has beautiful nature and history, if you are interested in this Cork is definitely a good place to go!

### PREPARATION

exchange application process	The exchange application process went smoothly for me. There is quite a lot of work and you must sign a lot of documents.
counselling & support at Utrecht University	The study abroad desk at Utrecht University replied swiftly whenever I needed their signature. This ensured that I was able to hand in all documents on time.
academic preparation	I did not do any particular academic preparation. I chose courses open to exchange students about Irish culture, for which no prior knowledge was needed, or courses within the school of English.
language preparation	I did not do any particular language preparation, other than take the language test Erasmus requires.
finances	I used my DUO finances and I made sure to cancel my student OV product in exchange for a public transportation grant. I also applied for the Erasmus grant.

### STUDY ABROAD PERIOD

study programme (content and organisational issues)	In Utrecht my main focus of study is Linguistics. However, Cork does not offer Linguistics courses. Thus, I picked courses in the department of English that interested me, such as a course on Shakespeare and a course on medieval monsters. I also picked courses such as Irish Literature, Irish Folklore and an introduction to the Irish
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Language. Registering for courses went smoothly, you have a lot of time to make up your mind and can even change your courses easily in the beginning of the semester.

academic quality of education activities

I was very impressed with the academic quality of the courses I took. The teachers are very interested in and passionate about what they teach, which I thought was very refreshing and helped me to keep motivated.

counselling & support at receiving university abroad

The International Office is always available for help when you need it, but the whole process of moving to Cork and figuring out how everything works was very easy. The International Office organised some introduction days for visiting students to explain how the university works, but also how Cork is and tips for social life.

transfer of credits

The university uses the same credit system as in Utrecht.

welcome & orientation programme

The programme organised was very helpful in understanding how to register for courses, but also helped in finding social footing and making friends. There are a lot of extracurricular activities you can take part in, so this is great as an international student.

accommodation

Accommodation in Cork is tough to find. The organisation Uninest offers 3 huge housing complexes scattered around Cork. Otherwise there is University accommodation, and a lot of students rented out AirBnb's or stayed in houses with hosts.

leisure & culture

Students go out to pubs almost every night, and there are nightclubs, although these closed at 11 o'clock due to the coronavirus rules. There are a lot of shops and buses to towns. There is a lot to do. The International Student society also organises parties and gatherings in pubs every week, so you'll never be bored.

suggestions/tips

Get accommodation near the city centre. I stayed in the Uninest accommodation Lee Point. This allows you to go to the pub or into the city centre at a moments notice. Other accommodations are much further, and this means that you can't go out as easily.

## CONCLUSIONS

Yes, Cork is a wonderful city and the people there are very kind. It's got a wonderful character. The university is amazing, there is so much to do and it is easy to fit in as a visiting student. The academics at the university are very good too.

accommodation
I stayed at a private company called hatch, it was a good location and had lots of amenities. it was vey expensive though. but as I said before this really depends, you do get one accommodation offer from the university, that's all, accommodation is hard to come by and even from the university you might not get a great offer/location. however utilizing private housing can be expensive and difficult. regardless do not leave it up to the last moment, but don't stress to much, there will be help even if you arrive without a place to stay.

exchange application process
The application process was is long and involves allot of steps and attention to the deadlines. Therefore it is useful to closely watch the time schedule provided by the international office.
counselling & support at Utrecht University
The international office did her best to help me during the entire process. They would answer email quickly and help make contact with there partner universities if this was neseccary.
academic preparation
I didn't need as much academic preparation because I would only did my minor abroad and my English was already rather good. Even though it can be useful to speak the language of the country you are going to or at least to make sure you can follow lectures in English. Also for the university of Cork I found that entry requirements can be loosened if you ask the lecturers nicely
language preparation
I didn't need much language preparation therefore I only completed the erasmus language test. But if you need language preparation the tool from erasmus is very usseful and the UU does offer some extra help too.

finances

Before I knew I wanted to study in Ireland I already had some money saved up. After I got accepted I worked to have more of a buffer. For Cork you need access to some money because in student accommodations from the university you need to pay the whole sum before hand. Which could be around 3.000 euro for one semester. You do get some money from the erasmus grant (around 1.000) before this time usually. I recommend having at least 3.000 euro saved up for accommodation and other things before you go.

study programme (content and organisational issues)

I did courses in different schools: 3 from Applied psychology, 2 from philosophy and 1 from Celtic studies. At UCC as a visiting student you have to arrange yourself that your time schedule doesn't clash. Before you go to Ireland in the summer break you will need to fill in provisionally what courses you want to do with the help of the course selection site for visiting students ([insert link](#)). When you come to Cork just before you start until the beginning of the semester you need to revise these choices. Then you have to check yourself using the timetable site you will get if your courses won't clash, if they do you have to choose something else. It is important to check this because sometimes courses are cancelled and you won't get a notice from the UCC for this.

The courses I took in the applied psychology school had really strict deadlines but if you have a good reason they will grant you an extension. These courses were fun and educational and had different levels of difficulty. For these courses you mostly had to write essays.

The philosophy courses were a bit easier than I expected we had to write exams and one essay for these. Mind & Machine was an amazing course and I would really recommend it.

UCC offer great courses in the Celtic department, folklore and in the history department if you want to learn a little about the history of Ireland. The course I took was called Ancient Ireland and was fun to learn all these facts about the history of Ireland involving the old chiefs and stories. In this course they even explained the Ogham stones that are displayed around the UCC campus.

academic quality of education activities

The quality of education depends really on the professor I found. The courses I took were not entirely in my area of expertise but I still was able to follow more than entry level courses. Still overall the level of academic education was high.

counselling & support at receiving university abroad

The counselling and support at University College Cork (UCC) is very well organised. They have excellent disability support and the teachers are really helpful and willing to make an extra effort for you. The UCC finds mental health very important and organises many events to help students with mental health problems including a mental health service where you can book an appointment usually within 2 weeks. The UCC also offers free health service (both mental and physical) across from the main campus.

transfer of credits

The credit system in UCC is 5 credits per course. So you will need to complete 6 courses for 30 ECTS. This will feel like a lot but when you keep up it is really manageable. When approved by the board of examiners all credits can be transferred.

<p>The UCC is a university with many clubs (sports) and societies (leisure) the international students association is one of them. In the weeks before the 1e semester strats they organise welcome accivities non stop. Every day activities like a city tour, something to meet new people and a party in the night. The last week before semester starts the UCC orginises information meetings at campus to give you all the information you need and to meet other international students. All the accomodations in Ireland are expensive due to the housig shortedge and many students have difficulties with getting accomodation. I would recommend arranging accomodation through the university it will help you avoid allot of stress. This being said the accomodation is not really up to dutch standarts the appartments are old and only in the kitchen sink there is drinkable water. The rooms come with there own shower and toilet but again this is pretty old. The most important criteria in looking for your courses is ofcourse the content but be mindfull that if you have either only exams or only essay it will be more difficult.

**PREPARATION**

exchange application process
I recommend not to underestimate the amount of paperwork that is needed to officially apply for studying abroad! I also advise to really keep track of the deadlines you need to turn in the documents, and start early with that! You need signatures for certain documents from the international office for example, and that can take a couple of days. I was quite late with getting a signature for my learning agreement for example, and the stress gave me a couple of grey hairs. You don't want to miss out on the experience and fun of studying abroad by being to late in turning in the documents.
counselling & support at Utrecht University
The people of the International Office were really friendly and helpful. They responded very quickly, and really wanted to help me get everything ready for my study abroad. As I mentioned before, I almost didn't make the deadline for turning in one document, but thanks to the help of the people of the international office, I managed to do it.
academic preparation
I had my exchange during my fourth year, so I had enough academic experience. But I also think that a third year student is definitely enough qualified.
language preparation
Reading and speaking was easy enough, but writing was challenging. The History bachelor in Utrecht is in Dutch, so I never had to write on an academic level in English. The more I did it, the easier it became though, and I could also ask my American roommate to check my essays. Besides, the lecturers knew that I was an international student and took that into account when they corrected my essays.
finances
Life in Ireland is not really cheap, unfortunately. Especially the rent (more than 500 euros per month) was a lot, but the semester is only 4 months so it was fine for such a short period. I made sure that I had the OV-vergoeding, the Erasmus fund, money from my family and I had saved some money as well. I also made sure that I would have a little bit too much money at the end of the month in case of emergencies. In Ireland, there were ways to make life cheaper, shopping at Lidl for example, and walking everywhere instead of taking the bus (Cork is small so that was very doable). It's up to you if you want to drink a lot of pints, or buy good food instead ;)

<b>study programme (content and organisational issues)</b>	<p>Since I only needed courses to fill up my elective part of my bachelor, I could pick every subject I wanted. Cork works with a semester system, instead of the 4 blocks that the UU prefers. That means that you follow six courses at the same time, each course is worth 5 ECTS. That also meant that during the semester you do not need to study a lot, but at the end of the semester, during a couple of weeks, all courses have their final examinations. It was not particularly difficult, since I also had history classes for people who had never studied history before, but it was a lot of work all at once, so careful planning was needed! The courses were very interesting. Since I didn't know a lot about Ireland or Irish history, I made sure that I followed courses that mainly dealt with these subjects. Cork offers a lot in that area! Courses about Irish literature, culture, history, etc. They also have classes especially for international students, so I made friends while going to lectures as well. When you take courses, it consists mostly of lectures, instead of seminars. I'm not sure whether I preferred that, because sometimes I was drifting off during class because you don't really participate. It is only during the welcoming programme in Cork that you are able to pick classes, and sometimes there were last minute changes when there were not enough students in a lecture for example, but in the end it always worked out!</p>
<b>academic quality of education activities</b>	<p>;When I picked my classes, I was able to choose what level I wanted them to be. Since I took a lot of introductory classes about Ireland, my classes were fairly easy. I didn't have to study/prepare classes a lot during the first couple of months, so I had a lot of free time I could really use! I had one lecturer who had a very strong Irish accent, but I felt really proud when at the end of the semester I was able to understand everything he said! ;) But most of the lecturers were fine and easy to understand. Some courses were more interesting than others, but you don't really know that until you actually go to the lectures.</p>
<b>counselling &amp; support at receiving university abroad</b>	<p>UCC provided a lot of services, including IT, a disability office, a GP health centre, workshops about referencing etc., counsellors, etc.etc.! The international office was very accessible and friendly, and responded very quick. They were also on facebook, so it was easy to get in touch with them.</p>
<b>transfer of credits</b>	<p>I went to UCC during the first semester, that means that you get your final results in February, and they will send the official transcript with the results to you at the end of february. While waiting for the results, you have to ask special permission from the board of examiners at UU.</p>

Cork is definitely big enough to entertain you for a semester, but small enough to be able to really get to know it. The pubs are amazing and very diverse, there are a couple of big shopping streets, a cinema, some concert halls, etc.! On Tuesday and Thursday evenings you can mingle with the local Irish students on their nights out (It is a flabbergasting experience, think Geordie Shore). I didn't have a bike in Cork, because I wanted to live (the streets are not made for biking, and there are a lot of cars in the city centre), but I could do everything on foot! I lived almost in the city centre, so I had enough choice in supermarkets etc. The Irish people are very friendly and curious, which made me feel at home very quickly. It was not uncommon to go to the pub and talk to random people.

exchange application process
It can be quite difficult to keep track of all the documents you have to apply, but make sure you are aware of all deadlines! Especially when you have arrived! I would advice you to neatly research all of the deadlines before

going and write them down somewhere, because when you arrive there will be so many things on your plate that you will completely forget important deadlines of your grant or your application.
counselling & support at Utrecht University
I had some problems during my stay with the deadlines, but international office at UU was very kind to me and always helped me out. They offer lots of help wherever needed, organize an information evening where you can ask all of your questions, and if needed you can always walk into their office to get some help.
academic preparation
The BA English literature will prepare you perfectly well to be able to study in Ireland. I noticed that some fellow international students were having a harder time by keeping up with the pace of the language and writing essays in English, while I was already well used to that due to my study. I think you will absolutely be fine if you already have some experience with academic writing in English.
language preparation
The Irish accent in Cork can be quite hard to follow at times, but if you are used to having lectures in English and writing essays in English you will be fine. Moreover, they always give you guidelines regarding citation styles and essay formats and are very eager to help you out in Ireland, you only have to ask!
finances
Ireland can be quite expensive. However, the Erasmus grant is already helping a lot, and you can loan quite some money as a student. I would however recommend to save some money beforehand, because you wouldn't want to miss out on an amazing trip in Ireland or a cozy night in the pub due to lack of money! You have this experience probably only once!

study programme (content and organisational issues)
Keep in mind you won't be able to follow all of the courses you would prefer or as mentioned in your learning agreement, since many of the courses they offer will overlap and you will have to puzzle your way through to find a combination of courses that will fit. However, they have a broad range of courses available so you most likely will find enough interesting stuff.
academic quality of education activities
Most of the courses I followed were part of a different BA than I was following, and could therefore be quite hard in terms of academic knowledge that should be retrieved before you started the course. Therefore, you have to keep in mind you will have to do some extra work in terms of research in order to pass the course and get on the same level as your fellow students. However, professors will always be very kind to you and offer their help if needed.
counselling & support at receiving university abroad
The people of UCC are very friendly and always willing to help you out. You can always contact international office when you face a problem, when it's more personal you have a big student society, and when you have difficulties with a course lecturers are always eager to help you out on a personal level.
transfer of credits
As Ireland has a different grading system, grades will have to be transferred accordingly. This is all done by international office, you only have to send a transcript of records through osiris. I was quite disappointed that most of my courses were rated as a level 1 or 2 in The Netherlands by my study coordinator, while most of them were third year courses in Ireland and were quite hard for me to follow.

	I really liked the welcome programme, but I felt like the student society of Cork could have done a little bit more effort to make sure no one was left out. 	I hired a room at EazyCity Cork during my stay. Even though I had an amazing accommodation right in the city centre for a really good price, I am not very positive about this organization. The apartments are not in perfect conditions, and since you're staying off campus it can be a lot harder to find a connection with your roommates. I would definitely recommend to stay on campus instead, as I heard of many friends of mine that they were staying in houses for international students and made lots of friends in these places, while I sometimes had roommates that wouldn't even greet me in the hallway.

<b>PREPARATION</b>	
exchange application process	It is very important to make sure you hand in all the requested documents before the deadlines. I found the application process very straightforward: it requires some time to get everything ready and in order but the guidelines are very easy to follow. It is very clear what you are expected to hand in. I would advice anyone who wants to go abroad to think about why they want to go to that specific place and formulate that very clearly in their motivation letter.
counselling & support at Utrecht University	During the office hours the International Office helps you very quickly and they never take long to respond to emails, which is very helpful if you have a question or need a document signed. You will also receive emails with the important deadlines etc. The Utrecht University website is also very helpful: all the required documents are online and the website has very elaborate information on a large amount of topics that are relevant for your stay abroad.
academic preparation	I noticed that the UU more than prepared me for what was expected of me at University College Cork, especially in terms of acadamic writing. It also helped that I had already received almost all of my courses in English.
language preparation	I did not really prepare myself in terms of language because I study English Language and Culture. I was already used to speaking, hearing and writing English before I went to Ireland.
finances	Since I knew I would not be able to work during my semester abroad, I made sure I had enough money on my bankaccount to compensate this loss of income. I saved up around €1600,- to make sure I had around €300-€400 for each month of my semester abroad. Keep in mind that rent and e.g. groceries can be more expensive in Ireland.

<b>STUDY ABROAD PERIOD</b>	
study programme (content and organisational issues)	Since I was taking courses abroad instead of doing a minor at Utrecht University, I could basically choose any course or subject I liked. I decided to not take any courses within the English department, but instead focus more on Irish history and Celtic civilisation. However, I did make sure these courses did not overlap with any of the courses I had already followd at the UU as this is one of the requirements of staying abroad.
academic quality of education activities	The academic quality of the courses I took during my semester at University College Cork was very high and I had very competent teachers. The structure of the courses is quite different from the UU: for each course I had two 1-hour lectures each week, and no seminars. In most cases we were not required to do any specific reading before class, as most of the reading was only recommended, not compulsory. The teachers take into account the fact that there are a lot of international students, so lessons were easy to follow and teachers were always happy to answer any questions. One thing that could be important to keep in mind is that some courses require you to write quite long essays and that your mid-terms and end of term exams can be quite stressful. However, although I had to put in a little bit more work than I was used to at home, the overall workload was quite managable.
counselling & support at receiving university abroad	

University Collage Cork offers excellent counseling and support to (international) students. The International Office answers emails very quickly, and is very helpful if you have any questions regarding your stay abroad/Erasmus grant. They also make sure to send you emails throughout the semester informing you of any steps you need to take/ information on important deadlines. Besides the International Office there are also other ways of receiving counselling/support at UCC, which are all very clearly explained during the welcome & orientation programme. UCC also has a very elaborate page on their website where students can find any information they need. I did not have need for counselling or support during my semester at UCC but I am sure I would have had no trouble with getting the help I needed since University College Cork pays a lot of time in making sure students can get the required need when they ask for it.

#### transfer of credits

During your stay you will need to have your courses approved by the Board of Examiners. From my own experience I know that it is important to keep in mind that the Board of Examiners might judge a course to be of a lower level than the level the university you're studying at has judged it to be (even though the course might still be difficult or demanding). At the end of your stay, University College Cork sends the transcript of your credits to the University Utrecht. You will be able to view your grades online as well. After the UU has received your transcript of records, you will need to arrange the transfer of your credits with the Board of Examiners.

## STUDENT LIFE

#### welcome & orientation programme

The welcome & orientation programme was very elaborate and fun! The programme was very clearly structured and everything of importance was explained with care. Besides all the important information it was also the perfect time to get to know the other students. The societies organised many events during this week.

#### accommodation

There are several options regarding accomodation when you are studying at University College Cork. First of all, international students can find accomidation on campus. It is important to keep in mind that most people will choose this option and that you will have to apply before the deadline. Moreover, the UCC Campus Accommodations are not all located near UCC or the city centre, so look up the locations of the buildings before applying for any of the rooms.If you do not want to stay in any of these buildings you can also try to find something on your own, but this might be more expensive. Organisations such as EazyCity offer rooms throughout the city, but might be a little more expensive. I stayed with EazyCity and paid €620,- for a single room month. EazyCity also cannot guarentee you will be located in the house of your choice (you might be placed in a house that is not very modern or close to the city centre). It is very important you arrange your accomodation as soon as possible (and not just a few weeks before your departure)!

#### leisure & culture

University College Cork offers lots of extracurricular activities, such as an enormous amount of societies you can join. I would recommend students to join the International Student Society, since they do not only organise lots of events during the welcome/orientation week but also during the rest of the year. There is also a sports centre called Mardyke, where UCC students can practise sports for free. If you like traveling you can join trips organised by the university or one of the societies (such as the International Society, they organise lots of trips!). There are also other organisations in Cork that organise such trips, such as Irish Experience Tours and Paddywagon. Cork also has amazing pubs, bars and restaurants, and there are several big events in the city throughout the year.

#### suggestions/tips

As mentioned above, I would recommend students to travel during their stay in Cork (especially those organised for/by students). Joining societies and going to parties by the International Student Society really helps you to meet new people.

### CONCLUSIONS

would you recommend this university/destination abroad to others? please explain

I definitely would! The university is very beautiful and the people are very lovely and always willing to help you out. The courses offered at UCC are all given by very competent teachers who will all help you out if you need anything. Cork itself is the perfect city for studying abroad: the city is not too big and the people are amazing!

The most important piece of advice I could give is to write down any deadlines and make sure you hand everything in time. I've stressed out several times because I had almost missed a deadline. Moreover, make sure you have saved up enough money so you can enjoy your time in Cork without stressing about having no money! Travelling Ireland has been the most wonderful experience and it would be a shame to miss out on it because you don't have enough money.
