



## Universität Konstanz

<b>PREPARATION</b>
exchange application process
The application process is some work, but the University of Konstanz really helps you a lot. When I had questions and I emailed my contact person at the Konstanz, she would respond sometimes within minutes. They also want you to put everything in Mobility Online, an online platform where everything is very organized and you can see exactly what you still need to upload. If you still have questions about for example, your learning agreement or housing, there are a few online meetings they offer where stuff will be explained again.
counselling & support at Utrecht University
I had great contact with my study advisor at the University of Utrecht. She would respond very quickly and was always willing to help. Sometimes I needed documents to be signed and send directly from the International Office at Utrecht and this would be done very fast. At some point I had more questions and we organized an online zoom meeting where I got all the help I needed.
academic preparation
I didn't really do anything for this.
language preparation
I signed up for a German intensive course over the whole month of September. Sadly, because of covid it was online, but normally you would already be in Konstanz and follow it in a class. Nonetheless I absolutely advise everyone to take such a course. You get put in a group with around 10 people, according to your German level. It helped me make some friends in advance and therefor it was less scary to go to Konstanz alone. Also, my level was B2/C1, so that is alright, but during this course your language skills get even better and you also get accustomed to speaking it every day.
finances
I applied for the Erasmus Grant and received it. Besides this, I also asked for money for public transport. You then stop the money you get in The Netherlands and receive a compensation. I decided to first not get a job in Konstanz, because I had already saved some money in advance while being in at home. After I extended my stay in Konstanz, I did look for a job because I hated seeing money going out and nothing coming in.

<b>STUDY ABROAD PERIOD</b>
study programme (content and organisational issues)
At first you need to get used to the different platforms they use. ZEuS is the platform where you can see the courses this university has to offer. I struggled to find the right courses in the beginning, but at the time I had to look on my own because I needed them for my learning agreement. After coming here and going to the informational meetings from the Law department, it was all clear to me which courses there were. There aren't that many english courses in the Law department, but in other areas there are more options. However, for Law there are a few specially designed courses for international students. They are in German, but the pace is much slower and it is okay if you can't speak it that well.
academic quality of education activities



The quality was very well in my opinion. Luckily we had the opportunity to study at the university and only 2 of my courses were online. With one of my courses we had 2 very fun activities: visiting the Bundesgerichtshof and the Landesgericht in Konstanz. They also really cared about the international students and checked in on us. During the Saint Nicholas (Sinterklaas) period we had a meeting with all of us and had a good chat, while drinking glühwein.

#### counselling & support at receiving university abroad

When going to Konstanz, you will definitely meet Frank Lutzenberger. He is from the International Office and a very nice guy, always willing to help. You can visit his office, call or send him an email and he will respond (most of the time) pretty quickly. Besides that there is the person responsible for the internationals at your own department. In my case that was Codrin Timu for Law and he was also really helpful.

#### transfer of credits

I was really lucky I could transfer all of my credits. The grade system works kind of different in Germany, so I was a bit hesitant at first, but it all worked out. In my case I could follow courses on basically any subject if I wanted (which I didn't do) and my credits would be transferred. Maybe in your case it will be different, but you should ask your student advisor.

## STUDENT LIFE

#### welcome & orientation programme

The University organizes OriPro, this means Orientation Programm, and lasts around 8 days. I would say it is a good mixture between organisational stuff and fun activities. The semester starts really late in Konstanz, on the 25<sup>th</sup> of October and you already arrive at the 1<sup>st</sup> or 3<sup>rd</sup> of October. The OriPro is at the beginning and guides you through your first days. We had a city rally, introductions for sports activities, an excursion to a city nearby and a welcome meeting with other international students from your area of studies. This means you meet a lot of people in a very short time and that is amazing! You can also sign up for getting a buddy, which I advice, and they will show you around the city and help you with signing up for courses for example.

#### accommodation

They offer housing for every international student in Seezeit. These buildings are spread out over the city and, having seen almost every one of them, they are very good. You get a bed, desk, closet and another closet for your books and such things. You can live alone or with roommates. If you don't want a room from Seezeit you don't have to, but finding something on your own can be tricky. I would advice you to get a room from Seezeit. Cause it means living with a lot of students closeby, german and internationals, and getting a sort of campus vibe.

#### leisure & culture

There are so many great things to do. After the OriPro at the beginning of October you have 2,5 weeks left of doing things before the semester starts. I went to Milan, Strassbourg, Liechtenstein and other great places. The location of Konstanz is great. Surrounded by Switzerland, Austria and Liechtenstein, the alps are so close. On good days, when it is not cloudy, you can see the alps from not that far away. The Bodensee also offers many great activities, especially in summer. You can go swimming, sailing or rowing. In the winter there is the Weihnachtsmarkt in Konstanz. The culture here is, I would say, a mixture between Bavarian, Swiss and Austrian. Very typical german food and the architecture is how you would expect a Bavarian city to look like. There are many sporting opportunities, hiking places nearby, clubs, bars and enough shopping places.

#### suggestions/tips

I would really get a bike here. The busses mostly stop driving after midnight and only start until 5/6am. The city is not that big and very very bike friendly. You can get a good one for around €70/80 and then sell it when you



leave. I really would advice the language course in September, just to meet some people. And if you like skiing or snowboarding, and you come here in the winter semester, don't forget to bring your stuff because it is so close.

## CONCLUSIONS

would you recommend this university/destination abroad to others? please explain

I definitely would recommend this university and city to others! The surroundings are amazing and so different to Utrecht. If you enjoy water and mountains, this is definitely a good option for you. Also for people who prefer smaller cities Konstanz is very nice. The Erasmus experience is great, housing is taken care of, the university is gemütlich (with an amazing view on the lake and mountains in the cafeteria) and your friends or family could even visit if they wanted to, since it is not too far away.

do you have any additional advice or comments?

I think I pretty much covered it all.



## PREPARATION

### exchange application process

The application process exists out of everything that has to do with filling out forms that are needed for your study abroad. In my opinion there are three important institutions that show up in this phase: the 'home' university (so for me and you Utrecht University), the university where you want to stay during your exchange (so for me Universität Konstanz) and Erasmus.

In the beginning is the 'home' university by far the most important institution you have to deal with. That's logical, because before you can stay abroad, you first have to be qualified suited for studying abroad by Utrecht University. Concretely this means you will have to write a motivational letter. It is good to take this serious, because it is a good exercise and gives you a better idea about why you want to study abroad, but since I know no-one who has been rejected by Utrecht University, you don't have to worry. On the other hand can the motivational letter be important for the assignment of a University. So if you really want to get to a specific University, it is wise to give your best in this motivational letter.

After this important first deadline there's a period in which you have to fill in forms in order to get assigned to a university and upload some documents on Osiris. From the moment you get assigned to a university abroad, the exchange university gets more important. Instead of uploading information for Utrecht University, I had to upload all kinds of information for Universität Konstanz. Of course the exchange university needs a lot of information of you to get you enrolled, it is not the best part of the exchange. Although you're given much time to take care of everything, there's always a deadline for something that's pressing on you. Now, these things have to be done, but if you want a university that guides you very well, you should choose for the Universität Konstanz. I, and with me many internationals that I met here, find that we have been guided very well through the process of uploading and signing documents. The website of the Universität Konstanz is clear and the employees responsible for Erasmus students are very helpful and send quick reactions on all kinds of questions.

At the end, also the Erasmus institution gets important. You have to upload (again) some documents to Osiris to be able to get a purse and do a language test in the language you are going to study. Although the last named test is obligatory, it is of no importance for your possibilities to go abroad. Therefore, I liked making this test. It gave me a good insight in which level of language competence I have. The interesting part of this test is that you also have to take the test once you come back from your exchange. I am very excited about the improvements I will have made!

If you've taken care of all this, you can finally start to enjoy your stay abroad. And that's where the good part starts :)

### counselling & support at Utrecht University

The International Office has always been contactable and in almost every case responded very quickly. It was very useful for me, since I sometimes needed information on a short term.

### academic preparation

Academically I didn't prepare that much in advance. Although I had to look up courses I wanted to follow during my stay abroad and I had to find out which courses would fit into my law study at home, I didn't spend to much time on it. It took a little bit of effort to get known with the course system of Konstanz, but in the end it appeared to be very structured, so it was easy to get a good overview of the course book. This of course is not a necessary feature, but it helped me when selecting the courses I intended to take. Most difficult was it to get the courses fit in my (still fictional) time schedule.

### language preparation



Language preparations might be a bit different for me than for most of you, for I wanted to study in German and I think most of you are going to study in English. For studying in German at Universität Konstanz you need a language competence of level B2. Dutch students usually take exams at B1 level when they finish high school. Luckily, at my school there was the opportunity to follow an extra German course, which would give you a certificate – Goethe-Zertifikat – that proves you have B2 level. I followed this program and therefore I could already say I mastered the required German level to get access to Universität Konstanz. I don't know which route should be followed when you are not yet in the possession of the Goethe-Zertifikat or a similar document, but I am happy I did not have to find this out.

To conclude, for me there was not much language preparation needed, even though I wanted to study in German instead of English.

#### finances

One of the things you have to upload on Osiris before going abroad, is a financial plan. For the creation of the financial plan, I had to guess a bit in the beginning. That's why the financial plan I handed in at Utrecht University is not very accurate. During time I got more information and therefore was able to get more precise on my financial plan. Although I did not have to hand it in on Osiris anymore, my parents (and me with them) wanted to have a good overview of what the expected costs and incomes are. For example, I've decided not to work while staying abroad and I want to travel back home at Christmas. These things affect my normal pattern in a negative way and it is therefore good to know how to deal with them. In the end I think I got a good financial plan, but it's still a 'plan' and I don't know how things will work out in the end. I've just arrived now and see already that there are some unexpected costs like excursion that I want to join.

So I liked to have some insight in the incomings and costs of staying abroad. The format that is given to me by Utrecht University was a good starting point, because many things that have to be taken into account, were already given and only needed to be filled in by me.

## STUDY ABROAD PERIOD

### study programme (content and organisational issues)

The way study programmes are shaped in Konstanz is very different from the way they are shaped at the Universiteit Utrecht. First of all, most courses take place for the duration of the whole semester, opposed to the Universiteit Utrecht, where courses only take place for halve a semester. This automatically also brings changes with it concerning the exams. Whereas at the UU there are in a semester more exam periods, at the Universität Konstanz there is only one. During the rest of the semester, the courses at the UK have one to no grading assignments, and when they have one, it's mostly in the form of a presentation and not a written exam.

Secondly, the courses I followed in Konstanz had a totally different setup than my law courses in the Netherlands. Until my exchange, I was used to this set schedule of one lecture and one seminar per subject a week. In Konstanz, there is no working group at all. Moreover, the lectures differ from course to course. At one course, there were even only six attendants! This made the education almost private. Three other courses I followed (a German and Italian language course and a law course given in English) had around 8-12 participants. The preparations of the courses exists always at reading some literature, except for the language courses, for which you have to make some exercises as well. This setup is different for me as law student, for I always had to prepare exerises for my seminars.

Then there's one last point that can be useful. In Konstanz there are two types of courses, lectures (Vorlesungen), and seminars (Seminare). Lectures are finished with an exam. Seminars are finished with a paper.



academic quality of education activities

The quality of the German educational system is good. It is comparable to the Dutch educational system.

counselling & support at receiving university abroad

The counselling and support at the Universität Konstanz is really great. During the first weeks there are plenty of meetings which make you aware of the things you have to do on arrival to get settled at the university and the city in general. Also, there are some meetings at which you have the opportunity to get to know other exchange students. I met a lot of my best friends at those meetings, so they were very helpful to me.

Furthermore, the support isn't limited to the first weeks. In the Facebook group of the exchange students, the International Office posts a message whenever it organizes a meeting on a certain topic. This can be about everything, from how to get a job in Konstanz to signing up for exams. Visiting this meetings has been very useful to me.

Except for the international office, my study mentor also was available at any time I needed his help.

transfer of credits

My credits have still to be transferred. I am home now, but I still have to finish a seminar paper and hand it in. Before I get my last notes some time will elaps. This is why I leave this box open. My experiences tell me that it will not deliver many administrative problems to get them transferred. The most important question might be in what way they will be transferred, since the German grading system is totally different from the Dutch.

**STUDENT LIFE**

welcome & orientation programme

The orientation programme took 1,5 weeks and offered great possibilities to get to know other people. Especially the 'Stammtisch' organised by the International Office was a succes in this perspective. These so called Stammtisch are meetings in a restaurant where the complete floor is hired for all new exchange students. During the first 1,5 week, there are also a lot of compulsory meetings where you will meet others, as well as excursions. Since the orientation programme starts at the 1<sup>st</sup> of Octobre, but study starts only at the end of Octobre, this means that there's a gap between the orientation programme and the beginning of the semester. Although it might not be asked to fill the time between with the welcome & orientation programme, it was for me difficult to fill my time in between. It was weird to be there on my own with almost nothing to do and only people around me that I barely know. As I said, I don't know how this can be improved, but I want to mention it.

accommodation

Accommodation is taken care of by Seezeit. If you are in time to apply for a dorm or other student room, you will 99% sure get one. Thereby the costs are way lower than in Utrecht. For example I payed only €257 a month for my student dorm, where I lived with three other German flatmates. The interior was very simple and a bit old (as is it in most accommodations of Seezeit), but it served its goal, so I saw no problem in living with it for half a year. There are accommodations located near the university (e.g. Sonnenbühl) and locations located near the city center (e.g. livings in the quarter Paradies (Rheingutstraße)). They both have their own advantages and disadvantages, but since the city is not so big, everything is easily within reach.

Accommodation is taken care of very well.

leisure & culture



Where I suspected to have some German friends when returning to the Netherlands, this didn't happen. In the first weeks I met mostly international students and I got befriended with them. Thereby most German students already have their own circle of friends in the 5<sup>th</sup> semester, so they are not so open to new friendships anymore. I think this is a natural thing and the same in every city. My expectations were wrong, but this hasn't occurred as a problem to me. On the contrary, I think it is cool that I met so many people of different cultures - mostly within Europa still. I got to know the German culture better, which is something you have to experience yourself I think and I also got to know a little bit of many other cultures, by the habits and uses my international friends from other countries brought with them.

In my spare time I mostly met with people in the evenings to simply go for a drink in the city or at someones homes. We also went to clubs together and we did bowling and billiard together. Lunching at the university with my friends also belonged to a common way to see my friends. Since everyone eats his lunch at the mensa, I mostly arranged to go there with someone. Since I like cooking, I also spent many evenings having dinner together. As for sports, in the winter semester there are not so many possibilities to build up contacts in this way. When sporting this was for me more a personal thing, whereas it is here in Utrecht a means to see friends. Last but not least: trips, organised by the university or by ourselves, were of course the nicest way to meet my friends.

Except for meeting friends and doing sport, there are many possibilities to do volunteering work. Applying for a job is more difficult, because it is required to have a German health insurance to be allowed to have a job in Germany. But, this health insurance costs €90 a month, which means that working is almost not cost-effective. For this reason and because I also saw my time abroad as a possibility to experience beautiful moments instead of working all the time, I decided not to work.

suggestions/tips

I have no suggestions or tips anymore. Insofar I had them, I already mentioned them above.

## CONCLUSIONS

would you recommend this university/destination abroad to others? please explain

The city is beautiful, with an old city center and idyllic roads alongside the Bodensee. Everything is within reach, from the University to the city center to the lake sides. It is a small city with 81.000 inhabitants, so it's easy to get to know the city very well. For me the size was good and there was enough to explore. After this halve year I think I know everything though. The city has all the facilities that a huge city has, from bowling to playing biliard, a industrial place with clubs, pubs in the city center and a big amount of restaurants.

Concerning the university I can see that it has nice architecture. It has opened in 1966, so the university is very young. The mensa offers a big variety off foods, although mostly meat dishes. The university can be reached easily by bus and by bike (although it is located on the top of a hill) and as the rest of the city not so big. All in all very recommendable.

do you have any additional advice or comments?

I would recommend to do trips in the beginning of your stay. Everyone has still time at the beginning of the semester and it is a good way to build better contacts. I did a lot of trips, but almost all in the last weeks of my stay. I loved the trips, but it was also stressfull, because me and my friends were busy studying for our exams. I realised that I had much more time in the beginning, but didn't use it that effectively.

exchange application process
I had to put quite some time in the application process, making a study plan, writing a motivation letter etc. However, the instructions were very clear and it went smoothly.

The International Office is very helpful and always there to answer your questions. They helped me a lot during my application process.

Other than planning the rest of my studies, there was no academic preparation necessary.
language preparation
I orientated myself in the German language, but this was out of interest and not because it was necessary. The International Office provided me with proof of my English language skills.
finances
I made a financial plan. This was not too complicated.

<b>STUDY ABROAD PERIOD</b>
study programme (content and organisational issues)
The Universität Konstanz was extremely helpful during the organizing period. I did the orientation course GoKonstanz. There, they will help you organizing everything. They were able to answer all my questions during very frequent visiting hours. The progress of choosing courses is somewhat unclear and vague but I managed it very well with the help of the International Office here. I choose courses of different faculties. This was no problem for the Universität here and also not for the UU. The courses are all stated in an online Syllabus. I took quite a lot of German courses. There is a lot of German courses for foreign students available.
academic quality of education activities
Most of the classes were of good academic quality. There is classes provided just for international students and you can participate in the regular academic courses. The language courses are very helpful.
counselling & support at receiving university abroad
Especially during the first month the Universität is extremely helpful. They will always answers your questions very fast and you can drop by everyday. They help you not just with academic issues, but also with bureaucratic or personal difficulties.
transfer of credits
For most courses you will receive 6 ECTS and for most of the language courses 4. As there are only 2 semesters instead of 4 periods, this means you have to take a lot of classes at the same time. However, this is very doable and the workload is in accordance with this.

I took part in the GoKonstanz program and I highly recommend it! The language course is interesting and helpful and also the help they provide you with organizational issues is extremely useful. However, the part I appreciated most about it, is the opportunity it gives you to meet so many other international students from all over the world. A lot of activities are organized, mostly during weekend days. This keeps you busy during the first month in Konstanz and you get to know a lot of new people.

accommodation

Seezeit provided me with accomodation. It is not too expensive and the rooms are furnished and very decent. You do not get to choose your roommates. You will be mixed with both German and other international students, male and female. All the residences are in a good location.

leisure & culture

Konstanz is a beautiful city. Especially during summer there is a lot to do. For a small city like this they have a very big and entertaining night life. There is something to do almost every day of the week. There is a lot of jobs available in the city, mostly in gastronomy. Perfect knowledge of the German language is not required and finding a job, even for a couple of months, is very doable.

suggestions/tips

I highly recommend you to take part in the GoKonstanz program.

## CONCLUSIONS

would you recommend this university/destination abroad to others? please explain

I would highly recommend this university. I was supposed to only stay for one semester, but because I was having such an amazing time I decided to stay for the summer semester as well.
