| PREPARATION |
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| exchange application process |
| The application process at first was relatively simple, you just had to write a motivation letter. But once I got into the university, it was a bit harder. There were so many documents, combined with applying for the Erasmus grant, that it was sometimes a bit hectic and chaotic. The guest university and home university also both wanted different documents. But, once all that is done, you don't have to worry about it anymore for 4 months. |
| counselling & support at Utrecht University |
| Luckily, during the application period, the people from the exchange office helped me a lot. They responded very kindly and very quickly to any question I had, which made the process a lot easier. |
| academic preparation |
| I don't recall needing to have any academic preparation, other than the usual procedures such as a minimum of credits. |
| language preparation |
| You need a certificate of language that you're able to speak B2, but the exchange office can give you that. |
| finances |
| I received the erasmus grant, which is around 250 euros per month. Important to note is that you receive about two-third at the beginning, and the rest of it at the end of your stay. Besides that, I got the compensation for the public transportation in the Netherlands, which is 120 euros per month. |

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| study programme (content and organisational issues) |
| You can choose bachelors courses which are 5 ects, and master courses for 7 ects. I needed 30 ects, so I choose 3 master courses and 2 bachelors courses. One problem was that when I had to make my learning agreement, the courses I could choose from were still from the previous semester, so I had to make some changes once I arrived because some courses were deleted from the program |
| academic quality of education activities |
| The academic quality is a bit different and in general lower than the education I receive at the UU. The exams looked more like high school exams, in terms of that you don't really need to understand the topics, but overall you have to memorize more. The lectures and seminars differed per professor, some were very interesting and other were a bit hard to follow. |
| counselling & support at receiving university abroad |
| The support of the university was very good. I could always email the student mobility coordinator or drop by her office, she would help very quickly and was very nice. |
| transfer of credits |
| There were no problems with the transfer, but it's good to keep in mind that the grades don't get transferred, only the credits. |

welcome & orientation programme

The welcome programme was okay. We had two kinds of welcome programmes, one was organized by the university and the other one by ESN. The one from the university was good enough, we had a tour of the city and some lectures. The ESN welcome week was very nice, with all kinds of different activities. The downside was that the welcome week from ESN started 3 weeks later, when most people already found some friends. Nevertheless it was fun.

accommodation

I stayed at a private accommodation, but I heard good stories about the dorms. You can choose from 3 kinds, they differ from how big they are and how much they cost. And some dorms are more party dorms than others.

leisure & culture

You can do many trips from Zagreb. I went to Zadar, Krk, Rijeka, Split, Ljubljana and Belgrade. The flixbuses are good and often very cheap. You can also rent a car very easily, which is very fun if you're with a group. You can hike the mountain Sljeme, park Maksimir is very beautiful and there are some good museums. There are good clubs and parties in Zagreb. Every Monday there's an ESN party in one of the cafes. Keep in mind that it's still allowed to smoke in the cafes and clubs.

suggestions/tips

The coffee is cheap compared to the Netherlands (2,40 for a cappuccino), and these are my recommendations for drinking coffee/studying/eating: Quahwa, Cogito coffee, Filteraj, the boogie club, Melt, Figa garden, Drugi program Burek: since 1967.

CONCLUSIONS

would you recommend this university/destination abroad to others? please explain

I would recommend it! I had never been to eastern Europe and it was a great experience. I learned so much about the culture, saw beautiful places and met beautiful people. I stayed with a Croatian girl, which was great because she showed me a lot of local places. What I did underestimate is the fact that they still have a different lifestyle when it comes to smoking inside, the city has a lot of cars, and in most places you can pay by card but I recommend always carrying some cash. Also, if you are choosing a place based on academic value, I wouldn't recommend Zagreb, as I mentioned before. But it's a beautiful city, I felt very safe and it's a great place for exploring other countries, also Greece, Italy and Hungary.

do you have any additional advice or comments?

Maybe a cliché, but: go to the seaside! It's about 2/3 hours and it's totally worth it. I really recommend renting a car and driving to Belgrade, you can stop at Novi Sad and other places and you're way more flexible. And another cliché: Don't give up with all the documents, it's only at the very beginning and at the end, and it's all worth it;).

| The exchange application process was well organized. Within every step, in my opinion, the student was informed properly. The people that were responsible for this process were always friendly and well guided. They also responded fast if there were some inconveniences. |

| The academic quality were good. The lectures were given by professionals and they made the learning materials clear. Also, the level of difficulty is lower than in the Netherlands so it is good to follow. The exams were, in combination with the quality of the lectures and the level of difficulty, good to do. |

| The counselling & support at the University of Zagreb were good. The people were very helpful and they informed you well. |

| The transfer of credits was published quick. They also gave you a good estimation when they expected to gave it to you. |

All the nice things from the city were in the Centrum, because Zagreb is not that big. However, this was in my opinion nice. There are a lot of museums and places to go out for drinks or coffee. There are also a lot of cheap and good restaurants.

suggestions/tips

Zagreb is very centralized in East-Europe. I travelled a lot to other cities in and around Croatia. It was cheap to travel but you can see a lot of other countries. I would recommend that.

would you recommend this university/destination abroad to others? please explain

Yes, I would recommend it. Zagreb is a small city but still very nice. The locals prefer to stay on themselves but are very helpful if you need them.

do you have any additional advice or comments?

| Applying for university was very easy. The UU website states what you have to do and when the deadline is. |
| counselling & support at Utrecht University |
| I had some practical questions about the application process and practical preparations. You can always contact Hetty Faber with questions or email / call / visit the international exchange office. |
| academic preparation |
| I didn't prepare anything and I don't think it's necessary. I was in my third year of my bachelor when I went on exchange and I already understood from the experiences of other people that the academic level of the courses in Croatia is lower than in the Netherlands |
| language preparation |
| From Erasmus you have to take an English test (the result doesn't count for anything), so that was my only preparation. In Croatia, most people (especially at the university) speak good English, so you'll be fine. Speaking English is also very easy there. The first few days you may have to get used to it, but after that it's automatic. |
| finances |
| I lived in the cheapest dorm and only paid €67 per month, so I could cover that and more things with my Erasmus grant (€240). You also receive compensation because you don't use your transportation card (for me this was €104 per month). Croatia is quite cheap compared to the Netherlands, so with your scholarship and possibly DUO or some savings you will be fine. You can also eat (morning, lunch, dinner) at a so-called 'menza', which is a school canteen where you can eat very cheap because you get discount with your Croatian student card. An average evening meal with drinks and dessert costs around €2. It really is a kind of school canteen idea, so don't expect a star restaurant quality, but I certainly thought it was perfectly fine to eat for the price and it's easier and cheaper than cooking yourself. |

| STUDY ABROAD PERIOD |
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| study programme (content and organisational issues) |
| I studied the following courses: Electoral Systems, TV Newsroom, Political Science Fiction, Media and Diversity and Economic Criminal Law (this course I followed at the law faculty). There are 'tutorial' courses and those are only given to Erasmus students and are therefore the level is relatively easier than the 'regular' courses, which you follow with Croatian students. In a 'regular' course you often have 1.5 hours of lecture and 1.5 hours of seminar in succession. I personally found keeping your attention for 3 hours straight pretty long. Luckily I only had one course where this was, the other courses were tutorials. I found all courses interesting. TV Newsroom is a journalism course where you shoot and edit documentaries with a group. This was a very practical course, so that was nice. Another thing that you could take into account is that compared to the Netherlands there is much less interactivity during class, so in some courses you mainly listen to the teacher or to a presentation. What I really liked about the system is that you can try all the courses you want in the first three weeks and after that you make your final choice and change your learning agreement if necessary. |
| academic quality of education activities |
| The academic level is in my opinion much lower than in the Netherlands. It's not that you don't have to do anything, but what you have to do is easier in terms of content than in the Netherlands. The tutorials are |



generally easier than the 'regular' courses. What you need to do to pass differs per course. In one course, I only had to write a paper, in the other course I had to present twice, hand in a small paper every week and take two exams. This sounds like a lot, but in the end it will all work out. I barely studied and passed all the courses with either a 4 (=very good) or a 5 (=excellent).

counselling & support at receiving university abroad

I was pleasantly surprised about the counseling and support from the University of Zagreb. You will receive all practical information by e-mail. You can always pass by the international office or email the contact person of the faculty. I always got a quick response back.

transfer of credits

Went pretty easily as well. Once you get there, everything will become clear by itself. Because you study within Europe, all the courses you take are in ECTS and are converted to level 3 in the Netherlands.

STUDENT LIFE

welcome & orientation programme

A welcome day was organized by the faculty and the University of Zagreb organized a welcome week, including a city tour through Zagreb. Fortunately, the Erasmus (ESN) in Zagreb is very active! The first few weeks there was an event almost every evening ('speed dating', pub crawl, karting etc.) and in the weekends they organize many trips to for example Plitvice Lakes, Budapest, Ljubljana etc. I experienced this as a huge plus, because in this way you can easily get in touch with a lot of people in the first few days of your exchange. I didn't know anyone when I went to Zagreb and in the first days I met a lot of people who later became good friends of mine.

accommodation

You can choose to sign up to live in one of the dorms. You will then share a room with another (probably Erasmus) student. Prices range from €67-110 based on which dorm you are in. I signed up for the dorms and was eventually placed at the smallest dorm 'Student dormitory "Dr. Ante Starčević'. This was not my first choice and this dorm is pretty small to share with 2 people (around 12m² for 2 people), but you get used to it after a while. I would rather have stayed in one of the larger dorms and I recommend that you sign up early for the dorms, but I don't regret it because yes, it is small and you have little privacy, but I paid only €67 a month and was hardly ever in my room because I was either at the university, chilling with friends or at the club and on weekends I was often away on a trip and you save so much money compared to a 'normal' room with a private host (the average price of a private accommodation room is around €350). What I also considered as a plus about the dorms is that most of Erasmus students live there, so you also meet a lot of people there and you often have someone to travel with after a night out.

leisure & culture

As I said earlier, especially in the first few weeks, ESN organized a lot of activities and weekend trips. Zagreb is a city that is quite centrally located so you can easily and cheaply travel by bus or even by plane to other cities and countries. We even flew to Milan and Bratislava. I would definitely recommend that you not only stay in Zagreb (it is a nice, but relatively small city), but also make trips to other cities such as Budapest, Ljubljana (and Lake Bled!) and also the Croatian coast (Split, Rovinj, Zadar, Dubrovnik) is highly recommended. In Zagreb itself you can go out well and in my Erasmus there were fixed days where people went to certain clubs. One thing I would've liked to know beforehand is that it is normal in Zagreb/Croatia to smoke inside a club :(

suggestions/tips

Eat at the menza, it's cheap and saves you a lot of money. In Zagreb you have the national theater and sometimes performances (opera, dance, a play) are held there and that is very nice to see. Zagreb also has a lot



of museums you can go to and when the weather was nice we often went to Jarun Lake to play beach volleyball. But the best tip is to go on many trips to other cities and countries. There is not often a moment where you can travel to so many great places for relatively so little money, so take advantage of this!

CONCLUSIONS

would you recommend this university/destination abroad to others? please explain

100%! I really had the best 5 months of my life in Zagreb. When I had to make my choice for an exchange destination, I wanted my destination to have 4 things: not too expensive, a central location so that you can easily travel, not super high academic level (I didn't just want to study but also enjoy it) and nice weather. Zagreb fulfills all these things and that makes it such a great place for your Erasmus.

do you have any additional advice or comments?

Cliché but true: enjoy every moment of your Erasmus because it's going to be one of the best times of your life and it will be over before you know it.

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| exchange application process |
| During the first semester of the masters' program Policy and Governance I asked whether it was possible to apply for an Erasmus exchange as a masters student. I was very happy to hear that it was possible. I applied to go on exchange in november 2018 and after a while I got the good news that I got the opportunity to study in Zagreb for five months. Zagreb was one of the destinations where I wanted to go because it was a capital city within Europe. I wanted to stay within Europe because there is so much left to explore on our own continent. |
| counselling & support at Utrecht University |
| I received all the help and information I needed from the counselling & support officers of Utrecht University. Everyone that I sought contact with reacted very quickly and I was provided with all the information that I needed for the application process and for my time abroad. |
| academic preparation |
| I knew beforehand which courses I was going to take at the Faculty of Political Science and what the academic requirments were needed for those courses. I did not look for particular academic preparation before going abroad. I think that studying in the Netherlands academically prepares you well enough to study abroad. |
| language preparation |
| I have been studying English since I was 10 years old. Starting at a young age really helps you to learn a language. Some of my bachelor courses were given in English and I wrote both my bachelor and master thesis in English. This helped me to prepare to study abroad in English and to live with people from different countries for five months. |
| finances |
| I received an Erasmus grant which helped me finance my time abroad. Besides the grant I could used the money I saved over the last years and financial help from my parents to pay for my expenses. The prices in Croatia are on average lower than in the Netherlands. I spend most of the money on traveling, on providing for myself, on education and on going out. |

| In Zagreb I followed four courses: Theories of Nationalism, Religion and Politics in the Middle East, Democracy and Economic Development and Pop Politics. I really enjoyed taking these courses and I have learned a lot about topics that I did not study before. The topics of these four courses were diverse and offered me the opportunity to discuss differnet topics related to politics with fellow students. It was very interesting to hear the viewpoints of students from different countries with different backgrounds. Most courses were well organized. We received our grades quickly and knew what to expect at exams. |

| The professors were all clearly experts in their fields. I must admit that some professors were more conservative than the professors that thought me in Tilburg or Utrecht. I had to get used to that in the beginning. We were provided with good reading materials. The exams covered the topics that we spoke about during the lectures. I do think that the exams were easier to pass compared to the exams I had to make at Utrecht University and Tilburg University. The faculty organized a welcome day during which we received information about the faculty and the courses that were available to us.

accommodation

I stayed at one of the dorms in Zagreb. My dorm is called Ante Starcevic and is one of the oldest and smallest dorms. I had to pay only 500 kunas rent a month which is about 77 euros. I had to get used to the relatively small rooms. After decorating the room it started to feel more like home. I had the most amazing roommates and I loved living with them. I shared my room with a girl from Spain and we shared our bathroom with a girl from France and a girl from Italy as well. I hope that we will stay friends for the rest of our lives and that I will see them again soon. The other dorms in Zagreb are a bit more expensive, have more facilities and the rooms are a bit bigger.

leisure & culture

I visited a lot of places during my free time. We went to many of the different museums that Zagreb offers. I went to see a ballet show at the beautiful national theater. I would recommend people to walk around the city and see all of the beautiful buildings, go to the park for a walk and to go to the Sava river and Jarun lake. I went out for dinner quite often and for drinks with friends. On Friday I usually went to the swimming pool to swim for a while. In December Zagreb is turned into one big Christmas market. | There were not many courses provided, but the courses provided were overall well-organized It's bureaucracy at the university was sometimes a bit problematic, but with some guidance from the university mixed with some of my own patience, this was not unbearable. |

| The educational level of the bachelor Erasmus courses provided is a bit lower than what I was used to in Utrecht. You can compare the level of a master course to the level required for a second year's bachelor course in Utrecht. Tutorial courses were relatively easy. |
| counselling & support at receiving university abroad |
| Very good counselling! Contact with the host university was easy and fast, everybody was always open to help out. All information needed was well provided. Guidance was offered whenever something new arised. |
| transfer of credits |
| Different scale of grading, so it took some time at my home university to transfer it but overall it was not a big problem. |

PREPARATION

exchange application process

The exchange application process is quite a lot of work, but I don't think it differs from other universities. There are a lot of files you have to hand in, but it's not that much work for each of them.

counselling & support at Utrecht University

The support of Utrecht University is very good. They are knowledgeable about the whole process, even though it sometimes take a lot of time for them to repond to e-mails. Apart from that, don't shy away from asking questions, because it's better to ask more questions than to make an unnecessary mistake

academic preparation

Not needed. The courses are mostly on political science, so it's good to be interested in this topic, but you don't need any prior knowledge to attend the courses.

language preparation

I didn't know any Croatian and you don't really need it. Most of the people speak good English and all the education is of course in English.

finances

If you plan to live in a dormitory, you save a lot of money. The costs for living there are usually lower than in the Netherlands, but at the same time, you will probably make a lot of trips and do fun things, so save up some money for that.

study programme (content and organisational issues)

Most of the courses are about Political science. The course Religion and Politics in the Middle-East is one I very much recommend. Furthermore, they have some journalism courses, which were not very appealing to me. All the courses of the faculty are in the same building and in smaller groups (30-60)

academic quality of education activities

The academic quality of most of the courses was lower than in Utrecht. Some of them are very repetitive and only about knowing some factual stuff, in opposition to what we do here, where understanding is not as important. Also the master courses I followed sometimes were not of a great level.

counselling & support at receiving university abroad

The international office of the faculty is in the building and you can always go there to ask questions. Next to that, the international coordinator responds to his emails very quickly and clearly.

transfer of credits

They work with ECTS, so that's easy.

I wasn't there during the welcome program unfortunately. ESN Zagreb organizes a lot in this week, so I guess it's a very good week to meet a lot of people.

accommodation



I decided to live in the dormitory. This is very cheap (€67,- per month), but there is a reason for this. You will have a shared room with one roommate and it's very small (I guess around 10 m², maybe even less). I had a great roommate, so for me it was fine, but you can always decide to leave after a month and find other accommodation. Private accommodation is a bit more expensive (somewhere between 200 and 350 per month).

leisure & culture

Zagreb is a very nice city, especially to live. There are not that many touristic attractions, so exploring the city as a tourist in your first weeks is done quickly, but Zagreb has a lot of great restaurants, bars, clubs and coffee bars. It also has some nice parks and the mountain Sljeme next to Zagreb offers the opportunity to hike and in the winter to go skiing.

Next to that, Zagreb is a great place to make trips to other cities and countries. Be sure to do that and of course also explore Croatia itself (Split, Zadar, Rijeka, Krka, Plitvice and so on)

suggestions/tips

Definitely go to Budapest, great city! Also, for some good cheap restaurants, definitely try Nokturno, Curry Bowl and (a bit more expensive) Submarine.

CONCLUSIONS

would you recommend this university/destination abroad to others? please explain

Yes. It's not that challenging when it comes to academic courses, but it's a great place to meet a lot of nice people from different nationalities and make loads of trips. | For me the exchange application process was not so hard. Yes, you have to do a lot of paperwork, but the University gives a clear overview of the things you have to hand in. If you just keep in touch with the admission office and check the UU website, everything will be okay. |

| The counsel and support of the University was good. There was always someone from the admission office available to answer questions. |
