PREPARATION	
exchange application process	
	The application process was quite extensive, as you had to apply twice; once for University of California in general and then again for a specific location. You are required to make a study plan for each of your top three choices and are not guaranteed that you'll be accepted to any of them. However, it is really worth putting in the work and the study advisors and exchange coordinator also help you along the road.
counselling & support at Utrecht University	
	Once you are accepted to University of California, there will be preparation meetings considering the VISA and application processes with the exchange coordinator of North America. You can also reach out to your faculty's study advisors any time.
academic preparation	
	It is important to keep in mind that the credits at UCSD are not the same as in Utrecht. Therefore you need to plan how you want to make up for the credit insufficiency. Because I wanted to graduate after my third year, I had to take an additional course before my exchange and another course with 2.5 ECTS during my exchange. Make sure to double check your plans with your board of examiners.
language preparation	
	If you are studying in English, I believe you do not have to provide any proof of language proficiency. If not, then you need to do a language test, for example TOEFL or Cambridge.
finances	
	San Diego and the US in general is very expensive, which is why you should have a clear plan of how you are going to finance your exchange before going. I had a side-job and saved for traveling and other unplanned expenses.

STUDY ABROAD PERIOD



study programme (content and organisational issues)
You can enroll in any courses you want during an assigned time slot. Students often get waitlisted and change courses right before the quarter starts so everything is more flexible than in Utrecht. I had to take courses of specific levels to match the requirements of my programme, so the courses I could choose from were quite limited because not all courses from the course catalog are actually offered.
academic quality of education activities
In general I would say that the level is a bit lower than in Utrecht but it really depends on the type of course that you take. It's very likely that classes are small and interactive and that you are able to get extra credit easily. However, especially if you take four courses at a time, you do need to make an effort to keep up with assignments and papers.
counseling & support at receiving university abroad
UCSD has an international office that all exchange students can reach out to during their time abroad. Additionally, you can also contact the exchange coordinator in Utrecht any time. I would also recommend taking the course "Intercultural Learning" because it gives you the opportunity to connect with other exchange students and also helps make up for the credit insufficiency.
transfer of credits
As mentioned above, it is important to keep in mind that the credits in San Diego are not the same as in Utrecht and you will come back with a credit deficit. If you know this in advance and plan accordingly, this is not a big issue but you still might have to take an additional course.

STUDENT LIFE
welcome & orientation programme
The international student organization ISPO organizes some events for internationals to mingle, such as coffee hours and bus trips. However, there is no get together with only the exchange students, as they always address international students in general at UCSD. Furthermore, during the first week of the fall quarter, UCSD organizes an introduction week with a festival and other events where you can meet a lot of new exchange students. They also arrange specific information meetings about things like class registration, student organizations and the healthcare plan.
accommodation
I lived in the International House on campus, which I would highly recommend. The application process is quite extensive but totally worth it because you live alongside a lot of the exchange students and locals, are close to the beach and directly in the middle of campus. People who were not accepted to I-House lived off-campus in shared apartments in La Jolla or even further downtown.
leisure & culture
Generally, everything is much more laid back in San Diego. People go surfing, go to class in their pajamas and just live day by day, which is really chill. Living in I-House is like living in an exchange bubble where many different cultures come together, so you quickly make friends and become part of a community. The campus really has everything you need; a Target, a gym, the health center and so on. You also get free public transport from UCSD which makes it easier to get downtown and off-campus. However, distances are much greater than they are in Utrecht and especially if you plan to take road trips and travel around during your stay, it might make sense to share a car with some people.
suggestions/tips
Keep in mind that the prices are way higher than here and be financially prepared. Furthermore, definitely apply to I-House, as living on campus with all of your friends really is a great experience. If you want



to learn how to surf, make sure to apply to the recreational classes before the quarter starts because they are booked up immediately. If you rent a car, "Dirt Cheap Car Rental" is the way to go, as they have the lowest fares and they don't charge a fee for being under 24. One last thing, you can catch the best sunsets overlooking the ocean at gliderport, only 10 minutes walking from campus!

CONCLUSIONS

would you recommend this university/destination abroad to others? please explain

I would definitely recommend UCSD to anyone planning on going to the US. I feel like people underestimate how nice San Diego is in comparison to the most popular UCs like Berkely or UCLA. You have the beach right there, a huge campus and a great city with amazing weather. It is more academic than for example UCSB in terms of night-life, but living in I-House, you will always find something going on. Generally speaking, San Diego is the right choice for anyone looking to meet great people and live the laid-back Californian lifestyle.

do you have any additional advice or comments?

While the application process is very extensive and it takes a lot of preparation, it really is worth it in the end, so try to power through! Lastly, it is so easy to travel through California and to neighboring states (and countries) from San Diego so make the most of your time there and enjoy everything the US has to offer!

PREPARATION	
exchange application process	Be prepared to do a lot of research. Mainly you are doing the research on the website of the University you are selected for. I had to research the website of the UCSD for things like insurance, courses, introduction, start dates etc. Besides that I started the application for my Visa a bit late and I would recommend to start with that ASAP to avoid a lot of stress.
counselling & support at Utrecht University	I had good contact with the study abroad advisor. Every time I had questions about things like Visa, starting dates etc. I could get a meeting with her really fast which clarified a lot of things for me. Good to know though is that, although she was very supportive, she knows the most things only from the side of the University of Utrecht and doesn't know everything about the specifics of the University you are going to on an exchange. This is why I decided at some point to directly contact the University I was applying to (UCSD) via their contact information on their website for questions around courses, housing and other things.
academic preparation	I didn't do any academic preparation, good to know though is to know what courses you want to follow and signing up for those courses as fast as you can. I almost got into trouble for not getting into the courses I wanted because the waitlists for these courses were really long. So the sooner you can enrol in the courses you want, the better.
language preparation	I was already comfortable with writing and reading in English, the main thing for me was getting used to speaking English, but in my opinion the best way to become fluent is to speak it as much as possible. So just going abroad and setting the goal for myself to try and learn to speak English as well as possible and mostly hanging around the people who are speaking English too, went really well for me.
finances	It is good to look up what expenses you are going to have and what the price is of those expenses. I didn't prepare to much for this so it was quite a shock how expensive for example my rent and the groceries were in San Diego. I tried to find out how much my rent was but I didn't get a response from the University, but if you really want to know you can put some more effort into trying to find out.

study programme (content and organisational issues)	



I was only there for one quarter, but the organisation of the courses was pretty straightforward. They use the platform canvas for all their course information. They make a lot of use of mandatory quizzes and other assignments in between the midterms and finals to be better able to recall the information which I found quite helpful although the kind of assignment you get is entirely dependent on which course you follow. Also they always have teaching assistants available to whom you can ask questions.

academic quality of education activities

I found that the quality of the education really depended on the course. I got one course with a really smart and well organized professor which I thought was of really good quality and another course where information was missing and there were a lot of mistakes in her PowerPoints.

counselling & support at receiving university abroad

The exchange program was pretty well organised from the side of UCSD, which meant I got a lot of informative emails from them so I didn't have to contact them that much. Also they had a few trainings via canvas, for example to help me with my Visa to get into the US and a training for dealing with their academic integrity rules.

transfer of credits

It might be good to know it wasn't really possible to get my 30 credits for one semester at the University of Utrecht because 4 courses of 4 units (which is the normal amount of courses for the UCSD) was worth less than these 30 credits at my home University. This means I am going to have to do one extra course on the University of Utrecht to get my bachelor degree. I would recommend you look into to this since this wasn't on the website when I applied and this took me by surprise.

STUDENT LIFE

welcome & orientation programme

I expected more from the welcome & orientation program. I went to the first coffee hour and met a few people there, but outside these coffee hours there weren't that many events in the introduction week. I met a few people at the coffee hour though and with them I went to parties where I did meet the most new people. In my experience it's good to be open to meet a lot of new people and exchange your contact information so you can go to events together inside and outside the University. Luckily a lot of new students want to meet new people as well so it shouldn't be that hard to find people to connect with in the first few weeks. The first few weeks are the best time to network though because when the courses start people tend to study more and be with their friend groups they already made in the first few weeks.

accommodation

I got into the international house of the campus and this was pretty well organised in my opinion. A benefit of the international house was that I was assigned 4 roommates with whom I could connect. The apartment had a shared space and bedrooms which was alright. Also in the buildings around mine where a lot of other international students which was the main source of my social connections. A benefit of living on campus is that you have all the facilities like classroom, supermarket, gym, sport fields and food on a walking distance which is why I would recommend it. Although you can also look for student complexes outside of campus where I knew a few people who had really good experiences as well.

leisure & culture

A lot of events were organised by the University, for example sport events like basketball, volleyball and football were quite fun. I also went to do a lot of activities outside of the campus. You can just google and ask people what the best things are to do in the city and you'll find there is more than enough to do for sightseeing and activities.

suggestions/tips



Join a club/team to meet new people if you have the time for it. If I would have stayed longer than one quarter I would have done this as well. In my opinion the people make the experience of studying abroad the best so I tried to invest a lot of time in meeting new people

In the US a car is a lot more necessary than in The Netherlands, so depending on what you want to do, renting a car might be a good option, it'll make you free to do a lot of things which are harder to do by bus. We had free University access to busses and trolleys though which worked decently but I took a lot of Ubers/Lyfts as well.

If you are on campus and you want to make the investment, having a skateboard, bike or e-scooter is a thing which can help you save a lot of time walking.

CONCLUSIONS

would you recommend this university/destination abroad to others? please explain

Yes, I think San Diego as a city is one of the best cities in California, because the weather is almost always good and warm, the people are really nice, the beaches are amazing, you can easily go to cities like LA, Las Vegas or even to Mexico and doing sports is really accessible and celebrated. UCSD was a really academically oriented school though, so if you are academically oriented I would really recommend it. On the other side a nickname for UCSD was UC Socially Dead since most people are only there to study. So if you are looking more for a more social life and parties, going to another school might be better. The school has around 40.000 people though, a really nice location and campus and if you are above 21 you have a lot of nice clubs to go out to. So it means you can still have a really good time like I did if you make use of the opportunities the city brings. It all really depends on the goals you set for the time you are there and how well you make use of your opportunities to achieve those goals.

PREPARATION	
exchange application process	The application process is quite straight forward. For your visa you do want to start early so you won't have a lot of stress. But if you are late and you can't get an appointment as far in advance as you want I suggest you check if new appointments become available. For both of mine appointments I had to initially pick a date somewhere after I should already be in the US but new dates far before my departure opened up pretty quickly.
counselling & support at Utrecht University	It is really easy to get into contact with the University if you have any questions. The information sessions are also very useful especially about the visa part. As my exchange got cancelled twice because of covid we got quite a bit of contact with the international office which tried very hard to help us even if everything was unclear. Fellow students are also usually open to help you.
academic preparation	I did not have any specific preparation and I also did not feel like needed it. I followed courses strongly related to my courses back here in Utrecht, so they were good to follow.
language preparation	I did not need to do any preparation except that they do require you to have proof of your level of English. This can be done with for example a TOEFL test. They are not hard but you want to schedule on time because you might have to wait for a bit before you can do the actual test and then again for the results. I never considered myself especially good with English but I easily got a very high score for the test. With the level of English we are using in Utrecht you will be easily able to do it so you don't need to stress about it.
finances	In my experience San Diego is very expensive. I believe they assume you need around 10.000-12.000 dollars for 2 periods (so half a year). In my experience you definitely want that as minimum but you will probably spend more especially if you want to explore San Diego during your exchange.

STUDY ABROAD PERIOD	
study programme (content and organisational issues)	I really liked my courses. They were very engaging and we had a lot of practical exercises and lab excursions. My courses were way more focused on actually bringing us into contact with the research that was being done, especially on campus. What I do advice is to be very early and flexible with registering for courses. Ideally you want to have at least one back-up course per block because some courses fill really fast. The course times are



also not as nicely divided in clear time blocks like here in Utrecht so it can be a real challenge to pick courses that work together. Often two courses you might want to pick overlap just a tiny bit somewhere or don't allow you enough time to travel between them. You will definitely want to take some time to plan this. Also, if your course of choice is full use the waitlist because a lot of people still drop classes, mostly in the first one or two weeks of class.

academic quality of education activities

I found the academic level really good. I did not have a lot of stress and I had a lot of free time to explore and visit the beach. But even if I did not had to spent a lot of time on my courses, I feel like I learned a lot. In my experience classes were more interactive as I am used to and students are generally more motivated. This causes a very nice learning environment.

counselling & support at receiving university abroad

Everyone in really helpful. I did not have a lot of time where I really needed counselling but ISPO (the organisation that helps all international students) sends our regular emails with some useful information or reminders which is very nice. All professors are also always willing to help. They are very engaged with the students.

transfer of credits

I have not gotten my grade back yet.

STUDENT LIFE

welcome & orientation programme

When I arrived the first two weeks of winter quarter were still online and people were advised to not come to campus until closer to the end of January. Therefore the campus was pretty empty and there was not really any orientation or welcome programme. They did organize some digital meet-and-great for the incoming exchange students but unfortunately I could not make that.

accommodation

I lived in student housing on the campus. Housing was probably the part that I found most stressful when planning my exchange. I applied to the I-House originally and I got in but after I had to postpone my exchange due to covid I lost my place there and had to reapply. That second time I did not make it but I was advised to register on the waiting list for on campus housing. Luckily I got housing that way pretty quickly which meant I had a place to live before I actually went there. The rent was pretty high, around 1,300 a month for a shared room. Living on campus meant I had very short travel times and that I had housing before I left for the US which were two very big advantages for me. Housing on the campus also includes dining dollars for the dining halls and once a week the common parts of our appartement actually got cleaned. The campus is also a nice place to travel from if you don't have a car. From here you can get multiple busses and they have a trolley station which brings you to downtown San Diego pretty easily.

leisure & culture

I spent a lot of my time at the beach. Even if I can't surf the beaches are beautiful and since it is almost always warm the beach is always a nice place to hang out. They have for example seals and sea lions hanging out on the beaches in La Jolla only a short bus ride away. An student organisation called 'The Zone' also organises multiple fun, usually creative, activities every week. They are free and a nice way to meet new people while relaxing after you classes. Something I wish I knew earlier is that the Outback Adventures organises some trips/hikes throughout each semester. They fill really fast so you ideally want to be there when they registration opens but they are a really nice way to see some more of the beautiful nature around San Diego. Finally, sport events are a lot bigger there so you might want to check out one of the sport games.



suggestions/tips

You will get a free pass for free traveling with the busses and trolleys in San Diego which is really nice. Most popular places in the city are easily accessible with busses or the trolley. So if you don't have a car or you don't have to struggle with parking you can take a lot of advantage of this. Also, in America they use discord a lot. A lot of classes or majors/minors have their own discord servers where people meet and help each other. It is a very easy way to get into contact with you fellow classmates for any questions you might have from course planning to homework or even finding people to hang out with.

CONCLUSIONS

would you recommend this university/destination abroad to others? please explain

Yes, it is a really nice university. I feel like I learned a lot even though my time there felt also like a vacation. The location is really beautiful with it taking only around 15-30 minutes to get to the beach depending from where you travel. I really liked the atmosphere, how enthusiastic my fellow students were and how helpful the teachers were. They are very engaged in your study process.

do you have any additional advice or comments?

Have a lot of fun on your exchange and make sure you start visiting all the places you want to see on time and don't wait until the end of your stay 😊

PREPARATION

exchange application process

The application process has a lot of steps, but if you follow them strictly it's very doable. Deadlines are just highly important and postponing your work is not the best idea.

counselling & support at Utrecht University

I really liked the help of Cathelijne and she always answered questions in the best way even though all the UC's have different policies.

academic preparation

language preparation

I took the Duolingo English test, which was new, and it was super easy and fast. Also, much cheaper than the other certificates.

finances

I knew this exchange was going to be expensive, but I still underestimated it. I made a budget expectation overview, but also the exchange rate went totally crazy so in the end it costed more than expected. Also, travelling plays a big part of the experience, so I spent a lot on that. Saving money in advance, is necessary.

STUDY ABROAD PERIOD

study programme (content and organisational issues)

I definitely underestimated the first quarter enrolment of courses because I was so busy trying to get the visa etc. In my second quarter, I did a bit more investigation and took some decent courses. The level of education is a bit different, and they make it very hard for you to fail a course.

academic quality of education activities

UCSD has a lot of schoolwork during the week and the period. This is a little bit stressful sometimes, but on the other hand, the exams only count 20% on average (in my courses). Keeping up with the work is the best strategy and you will for sure pass the course. Also, all my lectures are both in-person and recorded which makes traveling a lot easier.

counselling & support at receiving university abroad



I emailed a couple of times with the university, and they are always super helpful. Also, ISPO is a useful way to get to know the campus and other international students.

transfer of credits

My grades have not been transferred yet at the moment of writing, but it should happen automatically.

welcome & orientation programme

ISPO hosts a lot of welcoming activities which are great for meeting other international students 😊

accommodation

When arriving, I did not have a room yet. I didn't get into the campus dorms and just decided to rent a room in a hostel until I found something. Honestly, this was not even expensive as the room rental prices are extremely high. I joined several Student Housing Facebook groups and found a place within a few days. I even liked this way because I visited the place before committing and there are many scams. Prices nevertheless are not funny, so prepare to pay a lot; even for room sharing.

leisure & culture

San Diego is huge, but I rented a car which made my life much easier. The weather is all year perfectly sunny and there is a lot to do! A lot of people buy a surfboard because the ocean is so close and easy to reach. Taco Tuesday is definitely something San Diego and my favourite taco place is by far the Taco Stand. I also took (free!) yoga lessons in Sunset Cliffs (just look on Eventbrite) and the food market in the harbour every weekend + farmers markets during the week are recommendable.

suggestions/tips

Talk to a lot of people, and even though you are not having the best time, in the beginning, everything will be in the end. It took me some time as well to feel at home in such a big city and meet the right people but go to events! The students host a lot of bonfires, and you can easily go by yourself; everyone is more than happy to welcome you. Also, don't study too hard and take advantage of everything around SD like LA, SF, Hawaii, Las Vegas and the national parks. Lectures may seem difficult, but exams are doable so don't stress too much.

CONCLUSIONS

would you recommend this university/destination abroad to others? please explain

Yes, for sure. I had a great experience and no bad experiences (I felt very safe, even alone being in the city). San Diego has everything and even Mexico is around the corner. The city is big enough to explore, the campus is beautiful, and the people are super chill. Get ready to get broke, but I can assure you it's worth every penny.

do you have any additional advice or comments?

Start on time with the visa application. I did it last minute and it gave me an unnecessary big amount of stress

PREPARATION	
exchange application process	The overall application process is quite extensive. At first, you write a motivation letter for Utrecht University to get into the whole California program. Then you need to give your preferences for the campuses. You need to pick three. For all three you need to make a study plan with all the courses you want to follow. Furthermore, you write another motivation letter and upload your resumé. I have heard that it's hardest to get into UCLA and UC Berkeley.
counselling & support at Utrecht University	I was very disappointed by Utrecht University when they cancelled my exchange 5 days before my departure, in September 2021. The communication was very poor and it was a very stressful time, as I had already spent a lot of money on flights, rent, and visa. Apparently Utrecht University is allowed to cancel the exchange until the very last moment. I did not feel supported by the university at all, which was very disappointing. Luckily, I applied again 6 months later, and this time my exchange did not get cancelled. Hopefully Utrecht University will not cancel more exchanges at the last moment, as the covid situation has gotten a lot better.
academic preparation	You need to enroll in the courses at UCSD through 'webreg'. You get an assigned time in which you can start enrolling for courses. Be in time, because some fill up super quickly. Before you can enroll you need to check the prerequisites. If there are any, you can upload your transcript of grades in an online platform called 'Easy'. If you don't manage to enroll in time, you can always just go to the first class and ask if you can still follow this course.
language preparation	-
finances	The only downside about an exchange in San Diego are the high living costs. Rent is around \$1000 a month, and groceries are more expensive than in the Netherlands. Make sure you have enough money so that you won't have to hold back in taking fun trips. I would say, make sure you can spend \$10,000 for a 6 months exchange.

study programme (content and organisational issues)	



I took all my courses at the Scripps institute of oceanography, which I would highly recommend. The courses were very interesting and not too hard to follow. If you follow the upper division courses, the level can be quite high, so take that into account. The lecture halls are all next to the ocean so the whole vibe and the views are amazing.

academic quality of education activities

Generally, the courses are easier than in the Netherlands, but it highly depends on which courses you choose. There are many more homework assignments, deadlines, and attendance requirements. If you do the assignments it's pretty hard to fail a course.

counselling & support at receiving university abroad

All my professors were very kind and eager to help. There is more of a personal touch since classes are smaller. Furthermore, there are TA's with office hours to ask all your questions. For counselling outside the courses you can go to the international office. I heard that they are very friendly and helpful.

transfer of credits

I am still working on this but you can request an official document from the student portal and send this to Utrecht University.

welcome & orientation programme

I would highly recommend the Solana beach host family program. You get a host family assigned for the first few days until you have housing. The family picks you up from the airport and gives you a warm welcome in a new country. I was staying with another girl so immediately made a friend, which was very helpful. I arrived in January and there were many other new people as well. It was super easy to make new friends so I wouldn't worry about this too much. You can join orientation programs from the international office or go to clubs in the university (like the surf club).

accommodation

I stayed in International house (I-house) on campus. I would definitely recommend this because it makes it so much easier to meet people. I met all my friends here, and it was so fun that we lived close together. It's also really nice to get the whole typical American on campus experience. Make sure to check the application deadline so you sign up in time. Also, don't worry if you don't get in. I also heard from student who lived in Pacific Beach and had a great time.

leisure & culture

San Diego is an amazing city as there is so much to explore. Every neighbourhood has a completely different atmosphere, so we went to a different one every weekend. The weather is amazing so you can also do many beach days with a bbq at the end of the day. San Diego airport is in the middle of the city so it's very easy to take amazing trips. Western America has amazing travel destinations. It has great cities (San Francisco, LA, Santa Barbara, Las Vegas), and beautiful nature (Hawaii, Yosemite, Grand Canyon, Arches np, Joshua tree, etc.).

suggestions/tips

Make sure you don't stay on campus too much. Go out and explore, it's amazing! Also, San Diego is amazing, but it is one of the only campuses which doesn't allow house parties. This makes it harder for underaged students to go to parties. This is easier in Santa Barbara and LA. There are ways to still go to the clubs, but it might be more stressful.

CONCLUSIONS



would you recommend this university/destination abroad to others? please explain

Yes I would highly recommend UCSD as an exchange destination. San Diego is an amazing city, and much more clean and safe than LA and SF. It really has got the full package: beaches, big city, terraces, good weather, easy to take trips, great university rankings, and beautiful nature. My exchange truly was everything I hoped for.
