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Orientation

1. Who can apply for the Joint Programme with LUISS?

All students who are enrolled in the first year of the bachelor's programme Economics and Business Economics can apply. Selected students will spend the second year of their Bachelor's programme in Rome at the Italian university [Libera Università Internazionale degli Studi Sociali Guido Carli](#) (LUISS).

2. How and when should I apply?

To apply, you should send (1) the compiled application form, (2) a motivation letter, and (3) your CV to studentdesk.use@uu.nl before the deadline.

Applications for this programme close around the beginning of the 3rd term. Check [the website](#) for the exact deadline for the current academic year.

3. I have applied for the programme. What to do next?

A committee will revise all applications and select the (maximum) 20 best candidates to participate in the programme. Selected students will be notified in April. They will be invited to have a first meeting with the coordinator of the programme, Dr. Stefano Lugo.

4. How many ECTS do I need to go to Rome?

You need to have 52.50 ECTS by the time you leave for Rome.

If you did not receive the required amount of ECTS during your first year, you have to drop the programme. Sometimes exceptions can be allowed on an individual basis for highly motivated students who have obtained 45 ECTS.

5. Do I need to apply for my exchange online (Osiris)?

Yes. You can find the procedure on [our website](#) > 'Submit you application by following these steps'.

This application is used for all students who go abroad and therefore does not entirely fit our requirements. Osiris will ask you to upload documents. Since you are part of the Selective Excellence programme, you are allowed to **upload blank pieces of paper** for this.

You will also need to choose a 'minimum of 2 destinations' (otherwise you cannot save your application). You may select a destination at random, as you have already been accepted to LUISS.

6. Can I participate in the Honours Programme?

Yes, you can combine the LUISS programme and the Honours Programme, provided you meet the requirements. Special arrangements will be made to combine a stay in Rome with following the Honours Programme. For general information about the Honours programme, see the [website](#). 7. Can I combine this programme with an approved optional minor?

No. This programme can only be combined with the Honours Programme (see FAQ 16). If you apply also for an approved optional minor and you are selected for the joint programme with LUISS, you will be deregistered from the optional minor.

Preparation

9. Will housing in Rome be arranged?

LUISS does not take direct responsibility for providing accommodation, but it provides students with the chance to apply for a room/apartment through its residence service (Luiss residences or private apartments). During the enrolment procedure, you will be asked to submit a form in case you're interested in receiving some proposals from the residence service. According to availabilities and to your personal preferences, the residence service will suggest some possible solutions. The average cost is between € 400 for a place in a double room and € 500 for a single room a month plus utilities (telephone, electricity, heating, gas).

In general, housing will be slightly more expensive than you might be used to in Utrecht. Students that wish to take care of housing themselves are advised to come to Rome at least one week before the arrival date. Students selected for the programme will be put in contact with LUISS and U.S.E. students from previous cohorts; they could advise you on finding some accommodation.



Often students also find their rooms through Facebook pages (such as these: [Stanza Singola](#), [Casa Studenti Roma](#), or private [groups](#)), where you can respond to advertisements or post your own. You can also find rooms on [Subito](#) (kind of E-bay). Location-wise (for the university and the city centre) it is convenient to live near metro stations Bologna, Policlinico or Sant'Agnese/Annibaliano.

10. When do the lectures start in Rome?

Courses start approximately around mid September. There are Welcome and orientation days before this, for which you will be invited by LUISS.

11. Do I need to register for courses in Rome?

You do not need to register for courses. The International Development officer in Rome will arrange this for you.

12. Can I take an Italian language course in Rome?

LUISS will offer a free-of-charge optional Italian language course during the first and second semester. Interested students must check their emails and reply within the deadlines.

Besides this, Luiss collaborates with the Trinity School – Accademia Linguistica: <https://www.trinityschool.it/>.

Of course, there are many other schools in the city, but LUISS does recommends referring to this one first.

13. When are the vacation periods?

14. Do non-EU students need to apply for a visa to go to Italy?

Yes, you need to apply for a student visa at the Italian embassy. It is your own responsibility to arrange this on a timely basis. To get the Italian visa, you need to provide at least the following documents:

- An official bank statement proving you have financial resources sufficient for all your stay in Italy. This money should be available in a bank account inside the EU area under your name or your family name (in which case you should be able to demonstrate that you have full access to this money);
- A certificate of accommodation. The real estate agency or the private landlord of the apartment you rent should declare that you have a place where to live once you will be in Rome;
- A health insurance valid for the whole period of your stay in Italy (1 year).
- An invitation letter provided by LUISS (you can contact the International Development officer and ask for the letter).

The whole process takes at least three weeks, so start your procedure in time. Any delay in your departure to Rome is your own responsibility. Please be informed that, in case you need a visa for Italy, you might also need to follow other procedures according to the Italian Ministry for University and Research's rules (you will receive more information on this matter from the International Development officer).

You will receive more detailed information regarding this from LUISS.



15. Is there any need for extra insurance?

16. Can I receive an Erasmus scholarship when I go to Rome?

Yes, all students are in principle entitled to an Erasmus grant, including students who have a non-European nationality. You can find the amount on the [website](#) under the heading Grant Amount. The usual requirement is that students have obtained a minimum of 60 ECTS in order to receive the Erasmus grant; for the students participating in this programme this is exceptionally set at 45 ECTS. 17. Travel Green Grant

Utrecht University aims to be CO2 neutral by 2030 and wants to limit student travel by plane. Together we have the responsibility to reduce our impact on the climate. That is why the University encourages students to travel to their exchange destination in a green way. In this way you help us to reduce our ecological footprint and you start your exchange in an adventurous way!

For the next Academic year, Utrecht University offers a limited number of scholarships (Travel Green Grants) of max. EUR 185 per student, for those who choose to travel by train or bus to their European exchange destination. For more information check the [Link](#) and sign up in Osiris from 15th of May up to and including 26th of June.

18. Is my OV Chipkaart still valid when I live abroad?

When you live abroad you have the right to receive a reimbursement for your public transport card. This is approximately €95,- per month. [Here](#) you can find more information. You cannot use your OV Chipkaart during the months that you receive the reimbursement.

19. Do I keep receiving my normal monthly scholarship from Dutch government while abroad?

During your stay abroad you remain enrolled as a U.S.E. student. Therefore, you are entitled to your usual scholarship or student loan. There are no extra costs involved in studying in Rome. You also pay your tuition fees at Utrecht University.

20. How is public transport arranged and what about the costs?

Public Transportation is your own responsibility. [This](#) page shows all the public transport routes in Rome. It is possible to buy a **year pass** for the whole of Rome which costs €250,-. The year pass is a personal one (including picture, which you will have to bring with you) and can be bought at [some metro stations](#) with ATAC offices, such as Termini, Laurentina, Lepanto and Conca d'Oro. This pass is very convenient as you will never have to worry about buying tickets anymore.



You can also buy a monthly card for €35,- valid for a calendar month. The monthly card is personal and can be bought at regular ATAC offices, ticket machines and Tobacco shops.

A single ticket, valid for 100 minutes, costs €1,50 and must be bought before boarding the bus/tram/metro and validated at the beginning of the journey. A free shuttle bus service connects the LUISS campus at Viale Romania with the one at Via Parenzo and vice versa from Monday to Friday, every 10-15 minutes.

21. Where can I buy books for courses in Rome?

Professors will typically inform you which book you need to purchase during the first week of the course.



22. Can I get special provisions?

Yes, though LUISS might not be able to provide the same provisions as U.S.E.

U.S.E. will inform LUISS up front about the students who need special provisions, so that you can have time to provide the required documents and start the academic year knowing exactly the provisions and support that can be given.

Students need to provide 1) a certificate (in English) given by a public or private structure, not older than three years, in which the learning disability parameters are written, as well as the measures expected or advised for the specific case. 2) A declaration of U.S.E. stating what measures they are given.

These two documents should be sent to the Student Office and the Tutoring Office, possibly by the beginning of the semester. Then, the Tutoring Office will evaluate each case and assign a tutor who will explain in detail the measures/support that can be given to the student throughout the year.
