2.1	<p>Requirements for admission to the programme <i>As of 1 September 2016 it is no longer possible to enrol in the programme Modern History (1500-2000). Students who have started this programme before September 2016 have until 31 August 2018 to graduate with mention of the name of the old programme on their degree.</i></p> <p>1. Consideration for admission to the degree programme History (research) requires a Dutch or foreign diploma that demonstrates knowledge, understanding and skills at the level of a university Bachelor's degree and that shows its holder has the following specific knowledge, understanding, and skills:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none">a) knowledge in the field of History, as demonstrated by a minimal of 45 EC in a relevant field at BA level;b) understanding of basic concepts in one of the above-mentioned fields and insight into relevant qualitative and quantitative methods;c) intellectual curiosity and motivation for further research;d) skills pertaining to the conduct of independent research in primary and secondary sources;e) a high standard of academic achievement as evidenced in academic transcripts and references;f) ability to use English as a working language. <p>2. The following conditions for consideration for admission apply to the various programmes.</p> <p>Programme Ancient, Medieval and Renaissance Studies:</p> <p>The holder of a Dutch or foreign higher education degree who demonstrates knowledge, insight and skills in the following fields will be admitted to the programme Ancient, Medieval and Renaissance Studies</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none">- BA-degree (or equivalent) in the Humanities;- a clear interest in Ancient, Medieval, Celtic or Renaissance Studies as evidenced in a minimal of 45 EC in a relevant field at BA level;- knowledge of basic concepts in Ancient, Medieval, Celtic or Renaissance Studies and insight into relevant methods.- For Ancient Studies, competence in either ancient Greek or Latin; in case of deficiency, language skills must be acquired. Competence is defined as having completed either the Greek II or Latin II language course on offer in the Minor Antieke Cultuur. Students are encouraged to acquire named language skills before embarking on the programme; if students enter the programme without named language skills, they are expected to acquire them during the first year of the programme. <p>Programme History:</p> <p>Consideration for admission to the degree programme History requires a Dutch or foreign diploma that demonstrates knowledge, understanding and skills at the level of a university Bachelor's degree and that shows its holder has the following specific knowledge, understanding, and skills:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none">- BA-degree (or equivalent) in History, or another relevant field in the

	<p>Humanities or Social Sciences;</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - a clear interest in historical research as evidenced in a minimal of 45 EC in a relevant field at BA level; - knowledge of basic concepts in history and insight into relevant methods. <p>2. Students will be selected on the basis of an assessment of the following core competencies:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> a) motivation and talent (also on the basis of GPA and student progress monitoring); b) level of required knowledge and the mastery of methods and techniques used in the subject area; c) general high level of professional and intellectual ability; d) command of the language(s) used in the programme. <p>This information is used to consider whether the student concerned is in a position to complete successfully the Master's programme within the nominal time period.</p>
2.3	<p>Admission procedure</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. Admission decisions are made by the Admission Committee Research Master Programmes of Utrecht Graduate School of Humanities, Chamber Master Degree Programmes (MA and RMA). 2. In order to determine eligibility for admission to the programme, the Admission Committee will carefully consider and evaluate the knowledge, insights and skills of the applicant. The committee may request experts within or outside the university to assess the applicant's knowledge, insights and skills in particular areas, in addition to a review of written documents of qualifications gained. 3. In order to determine eligibility for admission to a study programme within the programme, the Admission Committee will check if the applicant fulfils or will fulfil the requirements referred to in art. 2.1 before the established deadline date. In its evaluation the committee will use the core competencies set out in art. 2.1 third paragraph when assessing as well as the applicant's command of the language in which the programme is given. On the basis of this, the admissions committee will assess whether the candidate is capable of demonstrating sufficient commitment to be able to achieve the Master's degree qualification within the prescribed period. 4. The programmes have a rolling admission between 1 October and <u>1 June</u>. 5. A request to be admitted to the study programme, must be submitted with the Admission Committee before <u>1 June</u>. The Admission Committee will make an admission decision within 17 working days from the date of receipt of the complete file. For foreign students who need an early notification of admission, a request to be admitted to the study programme must be submitted to the Admission Committee before <u>1 December</u>. 6. Admission will be granted on the condition that by the starting date of the study programme the applicant will have satisfied the knowledge and skills requirements referred to in art. 2.1., as evidenced by qualifications obtained. 7. The applicant will receive written notification that he/she has been admitted to the degree programme and a particular study programme. The possibility to appeal to the Examinations Appeals Board is pointed out in this notification.
