2.3	<p>Colloquium Doctum</p> <p>The entrance examination described in Article 7.29 of the Higher Education and Research Act concerns the following courses at pre-university secondary (vwo) level: English and History, and no more than two of the following courses at pre-university secondary (vwo) level: German, French and Latin.</p>
3.1	<p>Purpose of the degree programme</p> <p>From the first year of the Bachelor's degree, students are familiarised with the theory and practice of academic research.</p> <p>1. <u>The programme aims to provide:</u></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • knowledge, skills and understanding in the field of History, and the acquisition of the exit qualifications outlined in the second paragraph; • general academic education, defined as the development of competencies (knowledge, skills and attitudes) with respect to: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - academic modes of thought, conduct and communication; - using relevant academic tools and instruments; - academic and other forms of communication in the language in which the programme is taught; - application of specific field-related knowledge within a broader academic, philosophical and sociocultural context; - codes of conduct applicable during students' studies and academic careers in general; • preparation for an ongoing academic career; • preparation for professional practice: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - by relating knowledge of the past to current events; - through career exploration. <p>2. <u>The graduate:</u></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • has demonstrable knowledge of the main historical outlines and the relevant related subtopics, in particular of European history in a global context, and is capable of interpreting historical data in that context; • has a demonstrable understanding of academic historiography, in particular related to Europe in a global perspective, and is able to formulate relevant questions in this context and defend his or her own position in the historiographical debate; • has demonstrable understanding of relevant theories and concepts and is able to apply these to the interpretation of historical developments; • has the skills required to conduct research based on relevant historiographical methods into aspects of history, to reflect critically on his or her own working method and the knowledge and understanding thus acquired; • has the skills to apply historical knowledge and understanding in answering questions related to society, to reflect on the meaning of the historiography of specific historical knowledge and understanding in the social sphere; • is able to convey the knowledge and understanding acquired in a clear and varied manner to a diverse public; • has sufficient knowledge, understanding and skills to search for, and find information independently, to assess this and share it with others, doing so in a societal context, performing work at academic level, and in a degree programme at Master's level.
3.2	<p>Programme format</p> <p>The BA History is a full-time programme.</p>

3.3	<p>Programme language</p> <p>The programme is taught in English. All assessments take place in English.</p>
3.5	<p>Major</p> <p>The History programme has two tracks:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. History; 2. International relations in historical perspective. <p>Students choose a specialisation from among those offered within the relevant track (see also the Curriculum (appendix 1 A)).</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. One portion of the programme consists of the major, which has a study load of 120 EC in history subjects. Within the major, the courses listed in Appendix 1, having a total study load of 60 EC, (excluding the thesis, see paragraph 2) are compulsory. 2. The major includes a thesis having a study load of 15 EC at an advanced level (3) (see Appendix 1). 3. The remaining courses for the major, including the 30 EC specialisation, are to be chosen by students from among the courses listed in Appendix 2. 4. The major includes courses that are related to the academic and social context of history. These courses are listed in Appendices 1 and 2. 5. The programme components that fall within the major must include at least 45 EC in advanced level (3) courses. <p>Students who commenced their studies in a previous academic year must complete the curriculum as described in the OER Appendix for the year in question. As certain curricular components are no longer offered in this academic year (2021-2022), transition provisions apply (see Appendix 7).</p>
4.7	<p>Evaluation of quality of the education</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. The Director of Studies is responsible for monitoring the quality of the courses and teaching. To this end the Director of Studies will ensure that quality assurance involves evaluating courses and an evaluation at curriculum level. In ensuring the quality of courses the Director of Studies will draw on the advice and suggestions for improvement of the curriculum committees on promoting and safeguarding the quality of the course. 2. The courses and teaching in the degree programme will be evaluated using one or more of the following means: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • course evaluation: at the end of the course, the participating students are asked to evaluate the course through the digital survey system; • evaluation at curriculum level: through curriculum dialogues (in Dutch <i>onderwijsgesprekken</i>) • by means of the National Student Survey (<i>Nationale Studenten Enquête – NSE</i>) the students will be asked for their opinion on all aspects of the courses, teaching and the facilities. 3. Students who have participated in courses offered by the Faculty of Humanities will be informed of the results of the course evaluations.
