2.3	<p><b>Colloquium doctum</b></p> <p>The entrance examination described in Article 7.29 of the Higher Education and Research Act concerns the following courses at pre-university secondary (vwo) level: English and Dutch, and no more than two of the following courses at pre- university secondary (vwo) level: German, French and History.</p>
3.1	<p><b>Aim of the programme</b></p> <p>1. <u>The programme aims to provide:</u></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>• knowledge, skills and understanding in the field of Literary Studies, and the acquisition of the exit qualifications outlined in the second paragraph;</li><li>• general academic education, defined as the development of competencies (knowledge, skills and attitudes) with respect to:<ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>- academic modes of thought, conduct and communication;</li><li>- using relevant academic tools and instruments;</li><li>- academic and other forms of communication in the language in which the programme is taught;</li><li>- application of specific field-related knowledge within a broader academic, philosophical and sociocultural context;</li><li>- codes of conduct applicable during students' studies and academic careers in general;</li></ul></li><li>• preparation for an ongoing academic career or professional practice.</li></ul> <p>From the first year of the Bachelor's degree, students are familiarised with the theory and practice of academic research.</p> <p>2. <u>The graduate:</u></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>• has knowledge and understanding of the field of Literary Studies in its international context (<i>Dublin descriptor: knowledge and understanding</i>)</li><li>• has knowledge and understanding of the theories and principles (methods) of Literary Studies (<i>Dublin descriptor: knowledge and understanding</i>)</li><li>• has the academic skills required to apply his/her knowledge and insight in a manner that demonstrates a professional approach to his/her work in Literary Studies. (<i>Dublin descriptor: applying knowledge and understanding</i>)</li><li>• is able, when addressing a problem in the field, to formulate a clear and feasible research question; the concepts in this question are adequately operationalized; a subject is approached both theoretically and empirically; a coherent argument conveys results and is brought to a close in a clear conclusion; results are used to answer the original research question or to clarify, and where possible contribute to solving, the problem it explores; judgements consider relevant societal, scientific or ethical aspects of findings. (<i>Dublin descriptors: making judgements; applying knowledge and understanding</i>)</li><li>• can communicate (convey) information, ideas and solutions to both specialist and non-specialist audiences. (<i>Dublin descriptor: communication</i>)</li><li>• has knowledge and understanding of the possibilities and limitations of using digital sources and methods within the discipline, and have the ability to critically compare digital sources to a range of sources. (<i>Dublin descriptor: making judgements</i>)</li><li>• has developed the learning skills necessary to start a Master's degree (<i>Dublin descriptor: learning skills</i>)</li></ul>

<b>3.2</b>	<p><b>Attendance mode</b></p> <p>The BA Literary Studies is a full-time programme.</p>
<b>3.3</b>	<p><b>Language in which the programme is taught</b></p> <p>The programme is offered in Dutch and English.</p>
<b>3.5</b>	<p><b>Major</b></p> <p><b>Students starting from 2021-2022:</b></p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> <li>1. One portion of the programme consists of the major, which has a study load of 120 EC in Literary Studies. Within the major, the courses listed in Appendix 1, having a total study load of 75 EC, (excluding the thesis, see paragraph 2) are compulsory.</li> <li>2. The major includes an undergraduate thesis having a study load of 7,5 EC at an advanced level (3) (see Appendix 1). This completed thesis serves as an aptitude test of the required knowledge, skills, understanding and attitudes. There is a preparatory course for the thesis.</li> <li>3. The remaining courses for the major, including the 30 EC specialisation, are to be chosen by students from among the courses listed in Appendix 2.</li> <li>4. The major includes courses that are related to the academic and social context of Literary Studies. These courses are listed in Appendix 2.</li> <li>5. The programme components that fall within the major must include at least 45 EC in advanced level (3) courses.</li> </ol> <p>Students who commenced their studies in a previous academic year must complete the curriculum as described in the EER Appendix for the year in question. As certain curricular components are no longer offered in this academic year (2021-2022), transition regulations apply (see Appendix 7).</p>
<b>4.7</b>	<p><b>Evaluation of quality of the education</b></p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> <li>1. The Director of Studies is responsible for monitoring the quality of the courses and teaching. To this end the Director of Studies will ensure that quality assurance involves evaluating courses and an evaluation at curriculum level. In ensuring the quality of courses the Director of Studies will draw on the advice and suggestions for improvement of the curriculum committees on promoting and safeguarding the quality of the course.</li> <li>2. The courses and teaching in the degree programme will be evaluated using one or more of the following means: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• course evaluation: at the end of the course, the participating students are asked to evaluate the course through the digital survey system;</li> <li>• evaluation at curriculum level: through curriculum dialogues (in Dutch <i>onderwijsgesprekken</i>)</li> <li>• by means of the National Student Survey (<i>Nationale Studenten Enquête</i> – <i>NSE</i>) the students will be asked for their opinion on all aspects of the courses, teaching and the facilities.</li> </ul> </li> <li>3. Students who have participated in courses offered by the Faculty of Humanities will be informed of the results of the course evaluations.</li> </ol>
