PREPARATION

exchange application process

I remember that the application process took long. However, the paperwork was really straightforward and everything was explained well in the mails to help me with the application process. This university was my second choice, and I am happy that I got elected to go here.

counselling & support at Utrecht University

All the international coordinators at Utrecht University replied fast to any questions and were really helpful. They helped me prepare for this journey really well.

academic preparation

In terms of academic preparation, the course that I took here was not really in the same boat as to what I am used to back in Utrecht. So I had to change a bit in the way that I tackled papers etc, but that really helped me to have more skills when writing, so that really helped me.

language preparation

There was no need for language preparation. All the courses were given in English, and the people in this city speak really good English too, so I had no urgency to learn Swedish and I decided to not learn it at all in the end.

finances

I saved up money for more than a year before coming here. It is good to have some backup reserves before coming here, because most of the times there will be surprise expenses that you can not calculate before coming here, like damages or stuff you need.

STUDY ABROAD PERIOD

study programme (content and organisational issues)

I studied International Relations here. We got lectures about different theories that are in this departments, as well as real life examples. Furthermore, we wrote a lot of papers that had to be specific to this paradigm of theory, which was weird at first, but I got used to it in the end.

academic quality of education activities

I felt like the academic quality was not per se lower, but different as opposed to back in Utrecht. They use less seminars here, and more lectures. And you are guided less in the process of doing exercises, which I had trouble with in the beginning.



counselling & support at receiving university abroad

Same as in the Netherlands, the counseling here replied fast, most of the times even on the same day. This made sure that all my questions were answered and I could hand in the needed paperwork on time.

transfer of credits

Malmö University's online platforms are really handfull, there is a website for everything. In the click of a few buttons, I can create the transcript of records. So the moment I get my final results I have this transcript easily and I can transfer my credits.

STUDENT LIFE

welcome & orientation programme

We had a few welcome lectures in the first 2 weeks, which were helpful. They explained life in Sweden, as well as the academic life. They gave some useful tips to survive in this country, and that was really helpful. As for the orientation programme, I signed up for the student union and the organized multiple events in the first weeks which were helpful for making new contacts etc. And my accommodation organized some events as well, which is nice because you get to actually know the people that live in your dorm. They all helped me to have a nice time here.

accommodation

I opted for a private accommodation, rather than the student housing. This is because I signed up for the student housing, but I was put on like the 70th position of the waiting list. They would give me a message if I was elected for a room, but during the summer no messages came. That is why I decided around the end of June that I would choose for basecamp, the private accommodation. It was a more expensive option, but I was guaranteed a room and I had not found one with two months left. Then, at the beginning of August, I got a call from the student housing that I actually was elected for a room. But then, I had already book basecamp. That felt as a bummer at first, because now I had to pay more rent for my room. But looking back now, I am glad that I chose for this option, because I met life long friends and my girlfriend in this dorm, so I guess it is good that I was put on the waiting list in the end :).

leisure & culture

In my free time in the weekend, there were enough things to do in the city. We went to parties with friends, I went to the cinema and Copenhagen is closeby too, so we could always go there as well. As for the culture, Sweden is a quiet country from what I have the seen. The people need to warm up to you as well, they take some time to get used to new people. But when you get to know them and break the ice, they are really nice people. We did a lot of 'fika's' as well, which is a swedish cultural thing where they get a coffee and something sweet everyday around lunchbreak in the afternoon. It is basically getting coffee and chilling with friends.

suggestions/tips

I would suggest to pack warm when you go here. Swedes use everything in the power to make sure that you are as cold as possible. All jokes aside, there are national rules that the owners of the building can decide if they turn up the heaters or not, as long as the rooms average around 18-20 degrees. For me, this meant that the heater almost had no warmth coming out of it, and I was basically walking around in my room with 2 socks all the time.

CONCLUSIONS

would you recommend this university/destination abroad to others? please explain

Yes, I would recommend it. I think there are better options in Europe, and even Sweden itself, but for me this destination was really decent. For someone like me, who never lived abroad, I wanted a destination that was not too far away, and was a bit like home as well. And Malmö lived up to those expectations. It is a relatively



small city, and has a certain modern and quiet charm. For people who do not care about nightlife, busy rustling cities too much, this is a really decent place to stay for a couple of months and I am going to miss it. Copenhagen is close by too, like 40 minutes away as well with a big international airport, so that is a big plus too.

PREPARATION

exchange application process

The exchange application process was fairly easy. Whenever I wasn't sure what to do I could always contact the International Office from the UU or call one of the International Coordinators of Malmö University.

counselling & support at Utrecht University

The counselling & support at Utrecht University was really good. On Monday and Thursday afternoon you can call them if you have questions, and of course they can be contacted per e-mail as well.

academic preparation

For the academic preparation, I did not do much. I didn't need to buy any books at Malmö University for my courses. Then again, my courses were quite practical with lots of outdoor lessons. As a ski trip was part of the course 'Physical Education and Sports from a Swedish perspective', I made sure to pack lots of gym clothes and warm sweaters.

language preparation

Everyone in Sweden speaks English. The Swedes do appreciate it when you know a few basics in Swedish, which can easily be learned by using Duolingo for example.

finances

I knew that Sweden would be more expensive than the Netherlands. Therefore I went a lot to thrift shops and used the app 'too good too go' for groceries. The thrift stores in Malmö are really good!

STUDY ABROAD PERIOD

study programme (content and organisational issues)

Originally, I was supposed to follow a programme in politics. When I showed my interest for two other courses in the Education Faculty, I was allowed to switch. For the course 'Physical Education and Sports from a Swedish perspective', I had a lot of practical lessons, but also a few theoretical ones about the education system in Sweden and sports history. We went on several hikes and a Ski trip (it was very intense and cold, -25 degrees Celsius, but absolutely worth it!). The theme of the final paper we had to write was for the course was quite flexible and the paper was a good learning possibility. For the course 'Outdoor Education', we also went outdoors several times. The teachers were amazing and showed me how handy it can be to know how to educate others in and about the outdoors. I can safely say that both courses taught me lessons and skills not only valuable for my academical career, but my personal life as well!



academic quality of education activities

I'd say that the academic quality of the education activities was quite high. The teachers were very dedicated and enthusiastic about their subjects. Sweden has a very good work-life balance, which is also well reflected in the lessons we got.

counselling & support at receiving university abroad

When you are in need of support at Malmö University, the threshold to get it is quite low. Several international officers are willing to assist you. They communicate well and answer their e-mails on time.

transfer of credits

The transfer of credits goes smoothly. I do not have much to say about this matter.

STUDENT LIFE

welcome & orientation programme

The welcome & orientation programme was thorough and well organised. There were fun activities to get to know your fellow exchange students, but also practical ones, like a supermarket tour or a lecture from a Swedish police officer.

accommodation

My accommodation was in Rönngården, one of the student accommodations. If you like having 24 housemates, I highly advise you to apply for it. I liked it a lot since there was always someone to hang out with and we organised parties and movie nights.

leisure & culture

There is plenty of leisure & culture in Malmö! If you'd get really bored you can of course easily go to Copenhagen. Especially when the weather got better, I'd go to the parks and the beach all the time. If you dare, you can already start practicing ice bathing in the winter, but make sure you don't go alone in case something happens. There's also some museums, enough shops and nice cafés. Make sure you have enough 'Fika' (coffee break) moments, and try the Falafel!

suggestions/tips

As the work-life balance in Sweden is so good, try to pick up a new (outdoor) hobby. Make enough trips to the other cities and villages in Skåne (that is the region Malmö is in) and go to Copenhagen of course!

CONCLUSIONS

would you recommend this university/destination abroad to others? please explain

Going abroad to Malmö was one of the best decisions I've ever made. I've had such an inexplainable happy semester in Sweden and I wish everyone could experience this.

do you have any additional advice or comments?

When I arrived in Malmö in January, it would be dark at 4 pm, whereas when I left in June, it would only be dark for a couple of hours per night. If you are very sensitive to this and you do not want to mess up your circadian rhythm, think twice of going there. Also, Malmö is quite a windy city, so bring enough warm clothes to layer up and a hat! Otherwise, it is an amazing city and I hope that if you go, you'll have an amazing time just as I did.

PREPARATION

exchange application process

The application process was some work, but when you make clear for yourself when the deadlines are it is not too difficult. The universities abroad all responded quickly to my questions. There is a lot of information online about the Erasmus grant which helps a lot. When you take sometimes some hours to really look at what you have to do and fill in all the documents, everything will be fine.

counselling & support at Utrecht University

The UU provided a lot of information during the introduction meetings and also to every email i got a quick and clear response. I liked the organised meeting with students who went on an exchange before and could tell and explain us about their experiences.

academic preparation

I didn't do any academic preparation.

language preparation

I didn't do any language preparation. I only had to do the english language test but this was quite easy.

finances

The prices of housing in Malmö were similar to the prices in Utrecht. The prices of groceries are a little more expensive, but if you know where to go you can save some money. I kept my loan from duo on the same amount of money as i have in The Netherlands, and got the Erasmus grant as well. With the money of the Erasmus grant and some savings i had enough money to not have to work during my exchange and travel around.

STUDY ABROAD PERIOD

study programme (content and organisational issues)

In Malmö i studied Peace And Conflict Studies. I joined the first half year of a bachelors study, so this was together with many first year students. The program was more difficult than i expected, and even more self-study than i was used to in Utrecht. I would've like to had more classes and less self-study. I also attended the swedish language course, which i really liked.

academic quality of education activities

Overall the academic quality was good, but some of the tasks we had to do didn't really make sense. There



were sometimes weird requirements for papers we had to write, and the correction of it didn't always make sense.

counselling & support at receiving university abroad

If you are looking for counselling and support, i think there were a lot of options in Malmö. But personally i didn't need this so also didn't use it.

transfer of credits

Between 3 weeks after finishing the module, the transcript of credits is sent by email. They also sent it to the international office, actually i didn't had to do anything.

STUDENT LIFE

welcome & orientation programme

On the arrival day there was a whole team ready to welcome you and explain you everything. When you had accomadition in university housing they even provided transport to it. The orientation program was a full week (end of the holiday) with different activities. I really liked the orientation programme, it was a good combination of helpful seminars and university tours and a lot of fun activities. This fun activities existed for example of barbecuing at the beach, a welcome in the city hall and going to the ikea. We were very lucky with the weather and every day we ended up at the beach to play beachvolleybal, swim and watch the sunset. Most of the friends i had during the whole exchange were people i've met during the introduction week.

accommodation

In the beginning i've had some struggles with finding accommodation. There was no place in university housing and online it was difficult to arrange something. I decided to go to a hostel first and find out there how i could find accomodation. So the first week i've spent in a hostel. During this week i heard that i still got a place in university housing for 1 month later, even though they told me before that there was no chance i would get a place because i was far on the waiting list. Many other students had the same experience. So if you don't get a place directly, there is still an opportunity you will get one later. When i knew this it was easy to find an apartment for one month through facebook. I really enjoyed staying in the university housing, although it was with 28 people and not the cleanest. I had a lot of fun there and almost all the parties for exchange students are there. I lived in Rönnen, but if you want a place without a lot of parties you can choose for Celsius!

leisure & culture

There are different student associations and sport through the university. They are not as active as i was used to in the Netherlands, but still worth to have a look at. Also the housing organised multiple activities to get to know the surroundings. Lund and Copenhagen are super close and easy to visit by train. Also there are some national parks where you can go to if you want to hike, this will take 1-2 hours by public transport. ESN wasn't really active when I was there, but that differs every year. I still joined an organised trip to Lapland with friends through timetravels, i can definitely recommend to go to Lapland!

suggestions/tips

Go to all orientation activities, even if you are not interested in it. That is the moment and the place to meet people and make friends for the rest of your exchange.

CONCLUSIONS

would you recommend this university/destination abroad to others? please explain

I would recommend the university and destination to others. The univesity helps you with everything and organises a lot. I had a lot of fun in the university housing and made good friends. There are many exchange students in Malmö I wasn't always happy with the program and others around me had the same, but also some friends were super happy about their program.

PREPARATION

exchange application process

The best advice I can give is to start in time with doing research about your exchange destinations preferences. Because there are so many options it will give you a good overview if you begin in time. I knew that I wanted to go to Scandinavia so I compared all the destinations within Scandinavia and finally Malmö seemed to match my preferences the most. After that I wrote my motivation letter and got accepted.

counselling & support at Utrecht University

First of all, I started with doing research on the site of Utrecht University. There is a big list of optional destinations faculty related but also destinations for all students of the university. You can find a lot of information there. For example the student experiences helped me a lot to make my decisions. Furthermore the International Office gave good support. You can ask anything and they genuinely want to figure it out for you. They also answer very quickly.

academic preparation

I had to do an English proficiency test for Erasmus and I had to get my login to university accounts. It is important to do this in time.

language preparation

I had to do an English proficiency test.

finances

As you will probably have noticed, Sweden is a relatively expensive country in Europe. I would really recommend to save some money for going on small journeys to Lapland or the Norwegian Fjords etc. This can be quite expensive ofcourse but is totally worth it.

STUDY ABROAD PERIOD

study programme (content and organisational issues)

I took the course European Political Cultures (15ects) and the Teaching for Sustainability course (15ects). European Political Cultures was a really interesting course and I learned much during it. All the students were enthusiastic to share their ideas and the teachers were motivated to share their academic knowledge. They taught in a way so that everybody was involved in discussions which led to active participation during seminars and lectures. The Sustainability course was less interesting for me because it was a course where almost every students was engaged in education for becoming a teacher while I thought this aspect would be



less important during this course. However, the cases about sustainability were still interesting.
academic quality of education activities
The way of teaching at Malmö University is different from the traditional approach. Teachers and students are both participating a lot. During my first course in European Studies I was impressed by the academical knowledge of the teachers. It was obvious that they wanted to tell everything they knew which made it really interesting. The second course about sustainability was quite different, there the students had to much more with each other instead of listening to the teacher telling about the material.
counselling & support at receiving university abroad
Support at Malmö University was good. Everytime when I sent a mail they replied really fast and helpful.

The welcome in Malmö was nice. leisure & culture

suggestions/tips	
I would suggest to buy a bike and discover the city, there is a great biking infrastructure. Lock your bike everywhere, otherwise it will be stolen. I also would recommend to go to a match of Malmö FF and to an ice hockey game!

This way you get to know a lot of different people and whenever you feel like hanging out with people you can always go to the living room. We organised a lot of activities and everyone was always welcome to join. The housing is an international house which makes everyone really keen on exploring the country.

To give a short description of the housing, it was an old hospital so there were 5 floors, on each floor there were 27 people living there. This might sound like it would be really chaotic and messy but that was not the case since there was a weekly cleaning inspection by the landlord. Besides, you have your own bathroom so that helps a lot.

leisure & culture

Sweden is known for their nature and outdoor activities. Malmö however is really south so it is not actually what you expect from the Swedish nature since it is all the way in the south. But this provides you of a nice beach in Malmö and if you do some research you can find some really beautiful places. The public transport is really good so that makes it easier to move around. There is definitely some culture in Malmö and you can always visit Copenhagen since it is only 40 min by train.

suggestions/tips

I took the courses Special Needs Education and Sports Psychology (both 15 ECTS). In Special Needs Education we mostly learned about what SNE looks like in different countries, where the barriers are and what we should work on in the future. In Sports Psychology we learned about the aspects of social psychology that can be applied in a sports context, like communication, leadership etc. In special needs education, the final examination consisted of writing an essay on a topic of your choice. In sports psychology, we had to do two take home exams, one presentation and one written report.

academic quality of education activities

At Malmö University, there is less of a traditional approach to teaching. Seminars were held in small classrooms where both teachers and students participated equally. This ensured I engaged with the material a lot more and so I can say it stuck with me better. In this sense, I think the quality of education is very good in Malmö. However, I did feel like teachers were less knowledgeable and weren't able to delve into the material as deeply.

counselling & support at receiving university abroad



This was both very good in Malmö. The international office was very helpful and very quick to respond.

transfer of credits

The international officer in Malmö emailed the International Office in Utrecht my transcript of records, which will be converted to pass/fail. I didn't need to do anything for this myself.

STUDENT LIFE

welcome & orientation programme

I missed part of the orientation programme as I caught covid right before I was supposed to leave. However, the last part of the orientation programme was very nice. There were several activities planned to get to know other students, like a buddy programme and a BBQ for all new international students. There were also some lectures on practical stuff like safety, budgeting etc.

accommodation

There weren't enough places available in the student housing (Rönnen and Celsius), and so I had to look for something myself. I ended up at Malmö Student Hus, a big building with unfurnished studio's in Rosengård. This meant I had to furnish my whole room, which was not very nice, but in the end it was nice to have my own place while still living with many other students in my building. However, if you have the choice I would opt for Celsius or Rönnen.

leisure & culture

In my free time, I met up with friends and did all kinds of stuff. We went for fika a lot and discovered new parts of the city. We also took lots of daytrips, for example to Copenhagen, Ven Island or Ystad. As we didn't have a lot of class, we also had the time to take some bigger trips to see the rest of the country, which was extremely nice. As the weather got better towards the end of the semester, we went to the beach a lot or chilled in Slottsparken. At night we either had house parties at Rönnen/Celsius, or we went clubbing.

suggestions/tips

Start planning your (day)trips early on! There is so much to see in Sweden and you don't want to run out of time to see everything you want to see. Also, buy a bike at one of the second hand shops and also buy a good bike lock. Malmö is a great city to explore by bike!

CONCLUSIONS

would you recommend this university/destination abroad to others? please explain

I would definitely recommend this destination. The modern way of teaching really spoke to me and I met lots of great people. I will look back on my exchange period as being the best time of my life!

do you have any additional advice or comments?

If you're looking for a real student city where student life is more active and alive, I would suggest you choose Lund over Malmö

Eventually I also needed to do some exams of Utrecht University while I was already abroad. That was stressful, because I was busy packing my bag and preparing for departure and when I arrived here I wanted to start living here and enjoying my exchange.

language preparation

I had no struggles with the language preparation because there were none, since everything in Sweden is in English. I did take a Swedish course when I arrived here and I tried to learn some, but it was not necessary.

finances

It takes some time to get the Erasmus grant, but it is definitely worth it. For me it was also useful to keep track of what I spend, also to be able to compare it to the Netherlands.

study programme (content and organisational issues)

I had a course in political science. That was an experience, coming from social science. But the organisation of it was very similar to the Netherlands. In Sweden everything is really well organised. That is also what I experienced in the support services at the university.

academic quality of education activities

The work load is not too high, the teachers are very considerate of your wellbeing. The academic quality is good and is comparable to that of the Netherlands, same structures of seminars and lectures. In Malmö I experienced a bit more freedom in work and scheduling. They really want the academic work to be of your own



responsibility.
counselling & support at receiving university abroad
Support at Malmö University is really well organised. I have dyslexia and I was really well advised and welcomed at the university. I had a meeting with an supporting employee to discuss the available help they could provide me. They helped me and it made me more relaxed about starting at a new university.
transfer of credits
The credits are transferred easily as the organization is well structured and the contact is very easy. The credits are transferred as pass or fail mostly.

welcome & orientation programme	The welcome and orientation programme was not so extensive and for me a bit disappointing. At the time, education was still online and it was difficult to meet new people, especially because I wasn't in university housing from the beginning. I expected a bit more from the first weeks.
accommodation	At Malmö University they have studenthousing, but it is not enough for all the students. When I signed up I was wait listed, but after living two months in an private room in the city I got a room in university housing and I moved. It was difficult to find a room on my own, I found on a website, called Blocket. But I'm happy that I moved to university housing because it enabled me to meet more people and enjoy the time in Malmö more.
leisure & culture	Malmö is nothing like the student city Utrecht is. It is a nice city to live in, a lot of green and the beach is in the city. It is amazing to enjoy the beach so nearby if the weather is good. The city is not as vibrant as Utrecht or any other student in The Netherlands, there are almost no options to go out during the week. Since Malmö University is a quite young university the student culture and history is not really seen throughout the city. Sweden in general is a beautiful country and there is lots to explore. Swedes are not that socialable before you get to know them, but they are very friendly. Since everything is so well organised it is very easy to find your way in Sweden. Malmö is located very close to Copenhagen so it is also very nice that you are able to explore that aswell!

study programme (content and organisational issues)

I participated in the course Storytelling - Narration across Media. This course took the entire semester and was worth 30 ECTS. Storytelling taught me how stories are structured and how they change across different media. In the practical track of the course I learned how to record sound, edit films, write comics and much more. It was a fun course to do and I learned a lot. Because I was in the first class to ever take this course, the teachers had to figure out how to teach the course during the program itself. This caused quite a few organisational issues but everything turned out well in the end.

academic quality of education activities

Malmö University is a very young institution. This means on the one hand that it is very modern; the traditional student-teacher hierarchy as is maintained in Utrecht was way less, which I appreciated a lot. There were no big lectures in my course, only discussions between students and teacher in small classrooms. I learned a lot but this may be due to the fact that I was completely new to storytelling. Most of my friends in Malmö taking other courses within their discipline were quite disappointed by the academic quality.



counselling & support at receiving university abroad
Counselling & support was good in Malmö. The international coordinator was kind and helpful.
transfer of credits
Not applicable, my credits aren't transferred yet.

welcome & orientation programme
Welcome was quick and helpful. I got the information I needed to get to the right place to start the orientation programme the day after. The orientation program itself was alright. There were a lot of activities organised of which some were helpful (cheap grocery shopping tour) and fun but others weren't useful at all. During this week, I took a Swedish course every morning. This was very helpful and made me feel at home more easily.
accommodation
I lived in Rönnen International. My room was very nice: big windows, a bathroom for myself and conveniently furnished. I lived on a floor with 25 others, whom I shared a very crappy kitchen with.

In my free time I usually met with friends. At the start of the semester, the weather was very beautiful so we used to bike to the beach often. At night, we sometimes went out for drinks and almost every weekend one of the Rönnen floors hosted a party for all the international students in Malmö. Malmö is quite small so after a couple of months you have to take the Oresundståg to Copenhagen to expand your view and see something new.
suggestions/tips

Before the exchange I asked if I could take one of my (two) courses at the faculty of education and society and this was totally fine. During the introduction week I asked if I could take my other course at the faculty of education and society as well, and this was fine too. So don't be afraid to ask if you can take a course at a different faculty!

academic quality of education activities

I took the courses 'children's literature in a global perspective' (15 credits) and 'children's rights' (15 credits) Children's literature was not very difficult and there were only two meeting in a week (3 hours each). Besides that there was a bit homework each week, but it was not a lot. In the end we had to write (a part) of a children's book. This was the most difficult part, but also very fun to make. This course was very fun, but not very difficult. The course children's rights had more academic literature, in the end we had to write an essay



about a topic within children's rights. The most challenging part, for me, was writing an academic paper in English.
counselling & support at receiving university abroad
I did not need counselling or support, but the people of the international office were very nice and asked multiple times if they could support you with anything.

exchange application process

I started looking at countries i might want to go to months before the application deadline. I looked at the country, city, courses, cost of living, level of education and many more things. I ended up putting Malmö on the second place, because scandinavia intrigued me, the courses seemed fun and i didn't think many people would apply there so i would have a bigger chance. I got accepted for my second choice, Malmö and i was really happy.

counselling & support at Utrecht University

There was an information day a while before the application deadline in december. We were in a big lecture hall with many semi-interested students. We got a lot of general information about studying abroad and where to find more information. It was a good starting point and i could start orienting myself. There were a couple more information days before the application, but they didn't make an impression. When we all got placed there was one last info day where old exchange students spoke and afterwards you could meet people going to the same university as you. This was very usefull to me and i kept in contact with the students going to the same university my whole exchange.

academic preparation

There was no real acedemic preperation. I did some research into the Swedish acedemic system by my self and it seemed pretty simmular to ours in the Netherlands. I also read this in the online student experiences on the university website. I think studying in the Netherlands prepares you pretty well to study annywhere, because our educational standards are pretty high.

language preparation

All the coures that i was going to follow were in English and Swedes are known to be good at English. Sinds my English was pretty good already i did not do annything to prepare my English. I did download duo lingo to start learning Swedish, but i stopped pretty quickly. I knew i would take a Swedish course in Sweden, so i had no motivation.

finances

I took courses from the department of education in Malmö. The first couse i took was "Children's literature in a



global perspective". This course was fun, the teacher was super nice and the group we had was very cozy. However the course was very easy, it didn't challenge me enough and i didn't feel like i was learning something. The second course i took was "Children's rights". This course was a little more challenging and informing, but still not a lot and it focused a lot on history.

academic quality of education activities

There is very little guidance at the university and the educational level is low. It is possible to take extra courses in writing, grammer, spelling and stuff like that, but no one does. the university is young and the department i studied at is a bit underfunded. That was noticeable. But the atmosphere is great, i had a good time and the library is beautiful.

counselling & support at receiving university abroad

When we arrived at the university we got a lot of information from ESN and the university about organizations linked to the university where you can go when you have certain kinds of problems. Most used i think is student union, where you can send complaints about everything and they can give you legal support. they also have student health survices, where you can get help with mental and physical problems. For example burnout, getting birthcontroll or free STD testing.

transfer of credits

At this point my credits have not been transferred yet and i do not have my last mark back yet. The grades are in letters though and not in numbers like i am used to.

I could write a book about the accomodation. I stayed in Rönnen international, as did most other international students. It is a big student housing with 5 floors, with about 27 people on each floor. you have your own bathroom, but you share the kitchen and livingroom (it is not as bad as it sounds). If you are looking for housing in Malmö, look no further this is the place to be. Honestly, it has been one of the most amazing experiences of my life living here. The people on my floor have become my best friends and my family and i can't imagine life without them. People from all floors interact and Rönnen is like a world of its own. There is always something going on, whether you are looking for a chill night or a party. I lived on the 8th floor, wich is and will always be the best floor.

leisure & culture

Malmö is a very nice city. It takes some getting used to, but you will grow to love it. Biking is a big thing in Malmö, it's the main form of transportation. Another big thing, in all of Sweden, is Fika. It is a moment in the day where you make time for a little cozyness and you eat pie with coffee or tea. There are many cute coffee places in the center to have fika. ESN also organizes activities and trips throughout the semester. Ofcourse there is partying in malmö two. Going out in Malmö is nice, but expensive and closes early. An option is going out in copenhagen, witch is really close and you can visit as often as you want. Another option is going to houseparties in Rönnen. There are a lot of parties there and it is a lot of fun.

suggestions/tips

My tip is to go into it with an open mind and be open to all the amazing people you are going to meet. Don't stay in your room, get out there have fun, remember you are only going to do this once and it might very well be the best experience of your life.

exchange application process

The application processes, both at Malmö and Utrecht, were clear. It is quite some work, so start in time. Both universities sent clear information on what to do when, so don't get to stressed about it. Just make sure you keep an eye on your emails.

counselling & support at Utrecht University

Utrecht University offers some nice information sessions. Go there whenever you have questions. Whether you are doubting about going abroad in general or have specific questions about certain destinations, they will be able to help you.

academic preparation

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language preparation

I did bilingual education in high school, so I was already used to education in English. At UU I also had several courses in English. So for me the language was not really a problem.

finances

Make sure to fill in the financial form that UU offers you. This will help to get a clear idea of the expenses. I would also advice to make sure to have some extra savings that you think you need. Your erasmus exchange is a perfect opportunity to explore more European countries through city trips etc. By having some extra savings you will be able to enjoy your semester fully by exploring your new home town and home country.

STUDY ABROAD PERIOD

study programme (content and organisational issues)

The course 'Children's Literature in a Global Perspective' was really fun. I liked the practical and creative side of this course. However, I was slightly surprised about how practical and non-academic it was. We only had to read one sort of scientific article next to all the children's literature we read. It was a really fun course though! The second course I took was 'Children's Rights'. This course was more academic, but still easier than an average course in Utrecht.

academic quality of education activities

Like I said above, the academic level in Malmö was lower than the average courses in Utrecht. This can be explained by the fact that till 2017 Malmö University was 'Malmö Högskola'. Only since January 2018 it is an official University and I felt like you were able to notice this in some courses.



counselling & support at receiving university abroad

The staff at Malmö University were really nice and friendly. The support in the first weeks was really good. In the introduction week it was clearly explained where to go with your questions etc. They did everything to make you feel welcome at the university.

transfer of credits

Both of my courses were 15 credits and judged as level 1 courses in Utrecht. I haven't transferred my grades yet.

STUDENT LIFE

welcome & orientation programme

The introduction week was really well organised. It was a good mixture of formal and useful information and fun activities. ESN Malmö organizes parts of the programme so that you can meet other internationals as well. The trip to 'åle stenar' is a nice way to see some of Malmö's surroundings. I would definitely advice you to go to the introduction week, because it makes for a great start of you semester which will make you feel welcome at your new uni and get you some new friends.

accommodation

Malmö University offers University Housing, however it is not guaranteed that you will get a room. Living in Rönnen is a great way to meet internationals and find friends for life. Rönnen is known as a party place but this really depends on the floor and also when you are not the biggest party animal, living there is great fun! Living on a floor with people from all over the world is a great experience and might be one of my favourite memories of my time in Sweden.

leisure & culture

Malmö is a lovely city. There are great parks in the city (Pildamsparken, slottsparken) and the beach is 10 minutes from the university and the city centre. It's also a really multicultural city, especially the neighbourhood Mollevangen is a big cultural mixture. (and there is a great food market daily) Malmö also offers some great cultural activities for your free time, like the Konsthall & Moderna Museet.

suggestions/tips

Take the train in the weekends and visit cities in the area, like Lund, Helsingør, Helsingborg (Museum of Failure!), and of course Copenhagen.
 And you should not leave without a trip to Ribberborgs Kallbadhus (sauna), more scandinavian is almost impossible.
 Be like the swedes and enjoy fika (a coffee break with a cinnamon or cardemon bun) is any of the many cute cafes. Some tips: Lilla kafferosteriet, Slottstradgarden cafe, kafe Agnez

CONCLUSIONS

would you recommend this university/destination abroad to others? please explain

PREPARATION

exchange application process

The exchange application process went fine. The information on the university website was very clear and it was easy to complete all steps in order to apply. Whenever I needed any help, I could always e-mail or visit the international office.

counselling & support at Utrecht University

Utrecht University offered a meeting where students could gather information and ask questions. This meeting was also the perfect opportunity to get to know other students who are going to study at the same university as you. Furthermore, the international office provided a lot of information of all the steps you need to complete. Also, there is a facebook group where you can contact people who went to the university you have applied for. I would definitely recommend becoming a member of that facebook group.

academic preparation

I did not do any academic preparation before visiting Malmö University. It was not necessary to do extra preparation because the level of the courses I took was not too high.

language preparation

Before I went to Sweden I practiced my Swedish a bit on duolingo. This is quite helpful if you want to take the course 'Swedish for Exchange Students'. I did not do anything in order to practice my English.

finances

I did not experience any struggles regarding finances. The Erasmus grant was very helpful and I used quite a lot of my savings. I would say the cost of living is a bit higher than in the Netherlands but there are a few easy ways to save money. One big tip is to get your fruits and vegetables from the market. Besides this, the university offers a soup lunch for 150 SEK every Wednesday. When making a budget for your studies abroad, keep in mind that there will always be some spontaneous trips with for example ESN.

STUDY ABROAD PERIOD

study programme (content and organisational issues)

I took the courses 'Physical Education and Sports from a Swedish Perspective' and 'Sports Psychology'. Both courses were quite different to what I was used to. 'Physical Education and Sports from a Swedish Perspective' is a nice course if you want to do something more practical rather than theoretical. During the course we did a lot of PE activities such as playing floorball and doing gymnastics. We also went on a 5 day hike in Norway, which was really special. Near the end of the course we went on a canoe trip and during the last few weeks we had to write a paper. We got a lot of freedom when choosing a topic for our thesis and the guidelines on how to



write the paper were less clear than what I was used to.
 The course 'Sports Psychology' was a more theoretical course and was more familiar to what I am used to at Utrecht university. For this course we had to do two group projects and we had to take two take home exams. It was very clear what you had to study for your courses and the lectures were quite interesting in my opinion.

academic quality of education activities

I would say that the academic quality of education is a little bit lower than at Utrecht University. The courses were a bit easier than the courses I was used to. The lectures and seminar were of good academic quality and there was a lot of interaction between students and teachers.

counselling & support at receiving university abroad

Although I did not need that much support during my stay abroad, there are a lot of ways in which you can receive support. You can get academic support but also support related to both your physical and mental health.

transfer of credits

I have not uploaded my transcript of records yet but I am sure this process will go smoothly

welcome & orientation programme

The welcome & orientation programme was a very nice way to get to know different students from all over the world. I would definitely recommend you going to the parties and activities because it is a nice way to get to know the city and your fellow students.

accommodation

During my study abroad period, I stayed in Rönnen. I would recommend this to anyone who likes meeting new people and doing fun activities with people on the floor. I first got told that I could not stay in Rönnen because it was full, but a few days later I received an e-mail that I got a room. I think my study abroad experience would have been less fun if I had to stay in another type of accommodation because the 26 people I lived with felt like a new family at the end of my exchange period.

leisure & culture

The culture in Sweden is not that different to the culture in the Netherlands I would say. When it comes to leisure activities, the university offers a few options. During my stay I played volleyball at IF Academ. This is an association that offers various sports such as football, badminton, floorball and volleyball. If you live at Rönnen you will probably go on a lot of nice trips with your 'floormates'. Also, Copenhagen is only 20-30 minutes away by train so it is definitely worth it to visit Copenhagen.

suggestions/tips

I would really recommend Sea Battle. This is an activity organised by ESN where you go on a three day cruise from Stockholm to Talinn (the destination may vary but it is usually Talinn or Riga).
